





INDIA'S PEOPLE 300 MILLIONS

Washington, April 24. — The total population of India in 1921, according to the decennial census taken in that year, compilation of which has just been completed, was 318,948,000, of 247,003,000 belonged British India and 71,940,000 to the Indian native states. In British India there were 126,872,005 males and 120,131,000 females. Due mainly to the stimulus of the war in developing India's industries, the urban population increased from 20,748,000 in 1911 to 32,475,000 in 1921, or 10.2 per cent. With the exception of the large scaports, however, and a few industrial centres, the native cities are generally small compared with western industrial centres, the native cities are generally small compared with western cities, the average population approximating 14,000 for all India, while the population of the villages averages 417.

The outstanding feature of the 1921 census was the small increase of 1.2 per cent. shown in the actual population, as compared with more than 7 per cent. for 1911. The main cause for the difference was the influenza epidemic of 1918-19, in which more than twelve million of the Indians perished.



Another important social change resulting from foreign contacts is the reduction in the number of child marriages. The 1881 census showed that 4.8 per cent, of the females in India between the ages of ten and fifteen were unmarried, compared with 6 per cent in 1921, while the ratio of the unmarried between five and ten years had advanced from 8.7 per cent, in 1911 to slightly over 9 per cent, in 1921.







The last issue of "Prevention," the little monthly publication of the Department of Health, gives the vital statistics of New Brunswick for January. A survey of the birth rate is interesting. Taking Kings county, for example, with 20,399 people, according to the census of 1921, we find 80 births.
