MacDonald Government Nears Crisis on Vital Division

LIBERAL BOSS AT GOOD PRICE

DEPENDENCE ON LIBERALS IS MARKED

Position of Lloyd George in British Political Situation is Stronger.

LIBERALS VEXED

Many Ready to Withdraw Support From MacDonald Despite Consequences.

London, April 24.—The Liberal Government has only a few more weeks in office before a vital division comes that will necessitate its resignation and a general election, declares Sir Kingsley Wood, M. P., writing in the "Wesleyan Methodist."

His opinion is shared by many political observers, who point out that Ramsay MacDonald now is in daily need of at least sixty Liberal votes in the House to protect him from overthrow.

Recent speeches by ex-Premier Lloyd George at Llandaf-Bechan and Premier MacDonald at York have set the political pot boiling faster than ever.

Not having a majority in the Commons, the Liberal Government counts on some votes from one or the other of its opposition parties to support it in divisions.

GERMAN LEADER KILLED IN WRECK

Dr. Helfferich, Head of Nationalist Party, Lost Life When Trains Crashed.

London, April 24.—Bodies of Dr. Helfferich, leader of the German Nationalist party, and his mother have been recovered from the wreckage of the two express trains near Bellinzona, Switzerland, according to a Central News despatch from Geneva.

Soviets Condemn 6 Fins to Death

Leningrad, April 24.—Six Fins were condemned by a Soviet War Tribunal here to death by shooting for alleged espionage. Six others were sentenced to imprisonment up to nine years.

MILLIONS AT STAKE IN MONTREAL CASE

Purchase of Tramways Shares Illegal and Irregular is Contention.

Montreal, April 24.—That the purchase of \$6,000,000 tramways shares by the Montreal Tramways and Power Co., authorized by its former directors, was illegal and irregular, is alleged in an action taken by the Montreal Tramways and Power Company against its former administration.

The declaration states that the plaintiff company was incorporated in London in 1910.

In November, 1910, defendants incorporated to absorb the majority interests of both the last named companies, as "the Montreal Tramways Company" and purchased the shares of the street railway.

By contract passed at that time, the Montreal Tramways Company authorized the \$6,000,000 to emit debentures of the \$1,000,000 at five per cent.

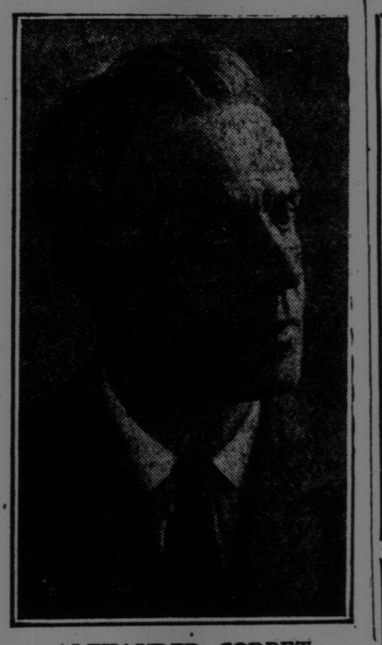

INDIA'S PEOPLE 300 MILLIONS

Washington, April 24.—The total population of India in 1921, according to the decennial census taken in that year, compilation of which has just been completed, was 318,943,000, of which 241,000,000 belonged to British India and 71,943,000 to the Indian native states. In British India there were 126,872,000 males and 120,131,000 females. During the last decade, the native states are generally small compared with western cities, the average population approximating 14,000 for all India, while the population of the villages averages 437. The outstanding feature of the 1921 census was the small increase of 1.2 per cent shown in the actual population, as compared with more than 7 per cent for 1911. The main cause for the difference was the influenza epidemic of 1918-19, in which more than twelve million of the Indians perished.

FAVORS ST. JOHN FOR NEW COKING PLANT

Deputy Mines Minister Will Confer With Stanley Elkin in Montreal.

That St. John was to be preferred to Montreal as the place to establish a large coking industry was the statement of Charles Cammell, B.A., L.L.D., P.R.S.C., F.G.S.A., Deputy Minister, Department of Mines, Ottawa, and chairman of the Federal Fuel Board, who passed through the city yesterday en route from Halifax to Ottawa.

Because of St. John's position on the coast, and the fact that the harbor is open the year round, permitting the importation of coal by steamer during the whole of the 12 months of the year, this city was to be preferred to Montreal, the harbor of which is accessible only part of the year.

As Deputy Minister of the Department of Mines for Canada, he was naturally interested in anything that would make for better conditions in the mines of the Maritime Provinces. The establishment of a coking industry here on the scale planned, he said, would mean the stabilization of the mining industry in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and would beyond a doubt result in the working of the mines in these provinces 365 days every year.

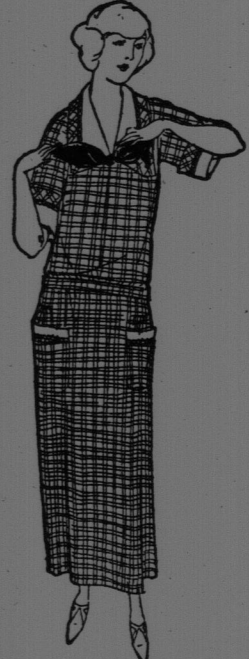

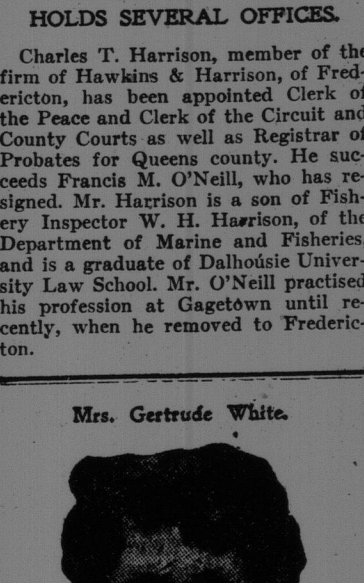

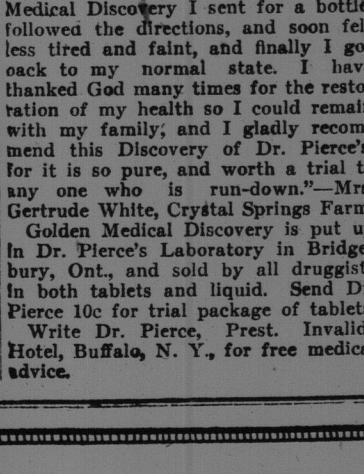
