

BOSTON, Sept. 3.—If there are any members of the Bulger family living in New Brunswick they may get a share of about \$1,000,000. George Bulger, of Fitchburg, Mass., who claims he is entitled to some of the money, recently returned home from Waterford, Ireland, where he has been seeking information about the fortune.

Away back in 1760, or thereabouts, Geo. Bulger, parental grandfather, ran away from Waterford, Ireland, and went to New Brunswick and there married. His descendants are free to admit that he had done soffething in Ireland that made a return there for his money and property unwise, and his riches have been increasing there in banks since that time.

Some years ago, his descendants in the United States, many of whom live in Fitchburg, got together and laid plans to get this money, whose presence in the banks had been a matter of family history and tradition for generations. This recent trip made by Mr. Bulger was the result of conferences and the descendants of great-grandfather Bulger are more enthusiastic than ever because of what their representative discovered in Waterford.
