PIUS CODE NEAR COMPLETION.

Pope Doing for Canon Law What Caesar and Napoleon Did for Civil.

ROME, Dec. 31. (by telegram to Cllf. den, Ireland; thence by wireless.)— Pope Pius has set in motion two of the greatest works which have been attempted in modern times—the revi-sion of the Vulgate and the codifica-tion of the Canon law.
