Berne, Switzerland, April 8—The circumstances under which former King Ludwig of Bavaria came to take up his residence with the Prince of Liechtenatein, in the little principality of that name on the Swiss-Tyrolean border, have recently come to light it appears that, after the second Bavarian revolution at the end of February, the aged ex-king, with only two attendants, went to a health resort at Kufstein, in the Austrian Tyrol, but that he was recognized there and became the object of Spartacan demonstrations so that he retired to the remote Oetz Valley in the Alps, where he lived in a simple village inn, taking the same meals as the peasants, with no luxuries whatever.




