MISSING

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A BRUTAL MURDER.

SHOCKING TRAGEDY ON SATURDAY MORNING NEAR MONCTON.

MONCTON, Sept. 11.—A shocking tragedy was enacted at an early hour this morning at a place named Meadow Brook, about eight miles from Moncton, on the road to Miramichi. A widow woman named Eliza Dutcher lived in a small house with two children, a boy aged eleven and a girl aged eight. She sold liquor and is known to have always kept considerable money about the house, by some estimated as high as three hundred dollars, which she kept locked in the trunk.

This morning about two o'clock Mrs. Jane Green, who lives about one hundred yards distant, noticed Dutcher's house on fire. She gave the alarm and roused her brother-in-law, Hugh Green, who lived next to Dutcher's. Green, who was in the door of Dutcher's house and going to the sleeping room carried out the eight year old girl, being attracted to the bed by her cries. It was discovered that the left side of the child's face and head had been split open as if by a hatchet. Green was unable to reach the other occupants of the house, and Mrs. Dutcher, aged about 48 years, and her son, aged 11, were burned to a crisp in the building.

The little girl has not yet recovered consciousness sufficiently to tell any thing of the kind, of what took place and all is yet involved in mystery. The general impression, however, is that Mrs. Dutcher and her two children were victims of foul play, the motive being robbery, and that after being left for dead, the house was fired to cover the crime.

Mrs. Dutcher kept a rather rough place and had served a term in jail for violation of the Scott Act. Her house was the scene of many quarrels and it is said she had expressed fear of violence at the hands of one individual. This at least is the story of her brother, Hugh Green, but, strange to say, the residents of the place have suspicious other than the above, though nothing is known as yet to warrant any arrest. An inquest was commenced to-day but adjourned to give time for the recovery of the little girl, who may be able to throw some light on the mysterious affair.

To-day when her wounds were being dressed this girl cried in terror, "Don't kill me again." This, if a conscious utterance, would seem to indicate that she had some knowledge of being assaulted.

The Dutcher family was noticed by neighbors to retire early last night, Mrs. Dutcher complaining of being unwell. They did not keep a light burning all night, and if they had the theory of the accident is destroyed by the fact of the terrible gash in the child's head. The tragedy has thrown the settlement into the wildest excitement and officers of the law are working to discover the perpetrators of the crime.

Dominion Parliament.

OTTAWA, Sept. 8.—The House resumed business at three o'clock this afternoon. Hon. Mr. Haggart at 3.30 resumed the debate on Hon. Mr. Forster's amendment. He took strong grounds in condemnation of the use of the governor general's warrants by the government in the case now under discussion. The debate was continued up to 10.30, when the order was given to call in the members. The galleries were crowded. There was no singing or other demonstrations while the whips were out.

It was 11.30 o'clock when the vote was announced. It stood: For the amendment, 58; against it, 107; majority for the government 49. The result was received with great cheering. The house sat till one o'clock, and then adjourned.

OTTAWA, Sept. 9.—Mr. McLean of East York moved the second reading of his bill for the better protection of the employees of railway companies and others. He explained that it provided after A. D. 1900 all railways shall be equipped with automatic couplers and air brakes. He contended that the saving in property and life would more than reimburse the companies for the additional cost of equipment. The bill was within the jurisdiction of parliament. It had been carefully drawn and he hoped that a new parliament would treat it more seriously than it had been treated by the last house for several sessions.

Mr. Devin held that this was a matter entirely in the hands of the government. Hon. Mr. Laurier said that as far as the government was concerned it did not feel disposed to make a government measure, but he agreed with the mover that the best course would be to refer the bill to the committee on railways.

Col. Tisdale opposed and Dr. Sproule supported the measure. Mr. Lister defended the railway committee from the charge of being influenced by corporations, but who he attributed language to Dr. Sproule which the latter did not use he was promptly called to order by the chair. Mr. Lister thereupon struck a stump speech and howled out that Dr. Sproule had admitted that the government had been under the thumb of great railway corporations.

The debate was continued by Mr. Oliver, after which the motion passed and the bill was referred.

Mr. Taylor moved the second reading of his alien contract labor bill, and wanted it referred to a select committee. Its object was to protect the Canadian laborer.

Premier Laurier acknowledged the importance of the bill, but regarded the principle as somewhat objectionable. He submitted the great discom test created in Canadian border towns by the American labor law, which was of the same type as Mr. Taylor's bill. If their bill was a blot on their legislation, it would be a blot on our statute book to retaliate. To protect our laborers we may be compelled to do the same, but he asked the hon. gentleman not to pro-

Good further at present. Correspondence had taken place between the two governments on this question and he would like time to look into it. He moved the adjournment of the debate. Sir Charles Tupper agreed with Hon. Mr. Laurier as to the great importance of this measure and emphasized the hardship wrought by the United States denying to Canadians the privileges freely conceded to Americans in our labor market. He did not, however, agree that it would be a blot on our statute book to pass retaliatory legislation, but all retaliatory measures were to be avoided if possible, and under these circumstances he endorsed the position taken by the first minister. He trusted the mover would, therefore, withdraw his bill. (Government applause.)

Clark Wallace held that it would not please the people of Canada to wait any longer, as past experience had shown that the longer we waited the more harmful we were treated by the United States. Negotiations would be more effective though if we had an Alien Labor law on our statute books.

The debate was continued by Messrs. Davin, Tisdale, Wood, McLeary of Montreal and John A. MacDonald, Col. Prior, Drummond of Algoma and Ganong of Charlotte. The latter speaker expressed the hope that the bill would not be withdrawn, as he did not wish in any way to hamper the liberal government in carrying out its promise of better reciprocal relations between the two countries. He quoted Mr. Blair's words in 1888 at Ottawa, that there was no Canada play for Canada, and it was for Canadians to say whether they would be treated as strangers or brothers. They could only have the American market by becoming Americans. For the present he (Ganong) would give the government a free hand to take up their promised negotiations. Mr. Ganong's maiden speech was loudly cheered.

After Messrs. Ganong, McGregor, Bennett and Henderson had spoken, Premier Laurier again asked the house to let the bill stand to-night, so that the government could exhaust all diplomatic means before resorting to any other.

Sir Charles Tupper endorsed this view and the debate was adjourned. The house rose at 11.35.

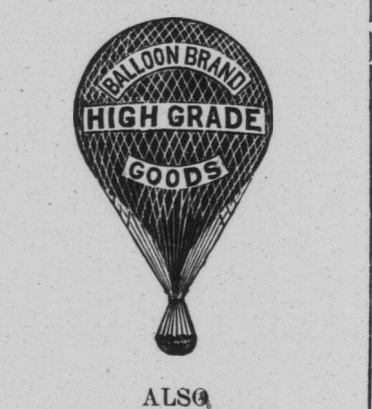

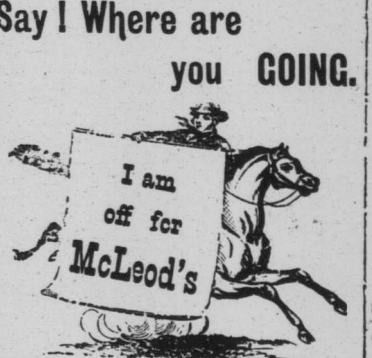
