



VACCINATION NOTICE.

The County Board of Health desires to call the attention of School Trustees and Teachers to the following section taken from the Consolidated Statutes of New Brunswick, Chapter 50, Section 86, (2):-

Before entering any child upon the register of any public school, or admitting such child to such public school, there shall be produced by such child, or by its parents, or guardian, or some person acting in behalf of such child, a certificate, to the satisfaction of the teacher of such school, or in case there are more teachers than one of any such school, to the satisfaction of the principal thereof, that such child has been successfully vaccinated within three years from the time of such request for registry or admission; or if such child has been vaccinated within the said period of three years and the vaccination has not been successful, there shall be produced to such teacher or principal satisfactory evidence that by reason of such child having been previously successfully vaccinated, such recent vaccination has not been successful, or that such child is immune."

2 Edw. VII. c. 33, s. 1. No pupil will be allowed to attend school without such certificate




