## THE SMALL POX SITUATION.

Joint Meeting of County, Chatham and Newcastle Boards of Health

### COMPULSORY VACCINATION

This will be Enforced and Stringent Measures Taken to Stamp out the Disease

A joint meeting of the County, Chatham and Newcastle Boards of Health, was held at Chatham on Sunday afternoon to discuss the small pox situation and to devise means to endeavor to stamp out the epidemic now prevailing at Chatham.

The following gentlemen were present: Chairman Maltby, Dr. Desmond, and Geo. Watt, of the County Board, Messrs. Strang, Hilderbrand, Murray, Sinclair, and Fraser, Chatham, Dr. Nicholson and H. B. Anslow, of Newcastle, with Dr. McDonald, who is in charge of the patients at Chatham.

Chairman Strang, Dr. McDonald, and Mr. Hilderbrand, explained what the Chatham Board has been doing and the proposed steps which would be taken and asked for suggestions from others to forward the work. They also asked the County and Newcastle Boards to dismiss the guards placed in different places and thus remove the embargo from the town, which had done much to enrage the town's business.

Mr. Watt, explained that these guards were considered very necessary to keep the citizens of Chatham from going out into the country districts and spreading the disease. He severely criticized the Chatham Board for its laxity in not ordering compulsory vaccination at the outbreak and for not making a systematic visitation of the town to discover if possible any cases which were being concealed.

Dr. McDonald, reported that in all there had been fifty-two cases in the town. At the present time there were thirty-four, but many of these were nearly recovered. Ten or twelve cases would be removed to the new hospital on Monday or Tuesday. It was thought that if no new cases developed in the meantime the schools and churches could be opened in the course of two weeks.

Chairman Maltby suggested that compulsory vaccination be ordered at once and that doctors be appointed to do the work, each being given certain districts or wards. He also suggested that restriction be placed on peddlers and junk buyers.

These suggestions were kindly received by the Chatham Board and they decided to follow them out. The County Board then agreed that if the Chatham Board would enforce compulsory vaccination, and make a systematic house to house visitation in Chatham that all guards would be taken off except on trains and boats.

This was agreed to and after the passing of a vote of thanks to the County and Newcastle Boards the meeting adjourned. We may add that the meeting was a very harmonious one. The Chatham Board seemed anxious and willing to do anything in their power to endeavor to stamp out the disease. If they have been lax it was because they did not thoroughly understand the work, this being their first experience. They have had a very suitable hospital erected and no doubt will be able now to keep the disease in check.

Mayor Nichol, was present as a spectator and made a few remarks. We gathered that the Board would have the support of the Council as it should of every business man in Chatham. Sackville has received an offer of \$7 for \$35.00 of the water and sewerage bonds from J. M. Robinson, St. John, and referred it to the finance committee with power to act.

## ISOLATION HOSPITAL

One to be Erected here if Suitable Site can be Secured at Once

### HARD TO PROCURE

Citizens Will not Part with Their Property for this Purpose, Why?

At the special meeting of the Town Council Thursday night Ald. Lawlor moved that the chairman and secretary of the Board of Health be heard.

Secretary John Clark explained that it was very necessary as smallpox existed in Chatham that Newcastle be prepared for an outbreak. The Board of Health with a committee of the council had been endeavoring to buy a piece of ground suitable on which to erect an Isolation Hospital. They had an option on a piece owned by Mrs. Mason in the rear of the Crocker-Anslow lots which he thought if sufficiently isolated make a good site.

Ald. Ritchie did not think that isolation would be sufficient.

Ald. Desmond would not agree to having a hospital placed in such a location. There was not sufficient space between it and surrounding property holders. It would also be impossible to get sewerage as the brook running through the property was affected by the rise and fall of the tides which would be dangerous. He suggested that an effort be made to secure a lot on the new highway.

Chairman Maltby said he had been away from town and was not in touch with what was being done, but thought that the location was not a desirable one as it was not sufficiently isolated. He thought that renewed efforts ought to be made to find a suitable locality as there was no telling when such a building would be necessary.

This matter was referred back to committee of the council and the Board of Health to report at Monday's meeting. The council then adjourned to meet Monday evening at 8 o'clock.

### MONDAY EVENING

The Board of Health and committee of Council reported that they had endeavored to secure property for Hospital but had not been successful and they were instructed to continue their endeavors and report at next meeting.

## A POPULAR APPOINTMENT.

John Robinson, Appointed Chief Game Warden

Mr. John Robinson, of this town was last week appointed Chief Game Warden of the Province at a salary of \$900.00.

The appointment is a very popular one. Mr. Robinson, being generally admitted to be the right man for the position. During his connection with the province as a warden, dating back some years, he has taken an active interest in the preservation of our valuable game animals and birds.

## AFTER BEARS

Rev. Sanford, Reported to be Hunting at Newcastle

St. John, May 5.—It is said the Rev. Sanford, head of the Holy Ghost and Us sect, is hunting near Newcastle. No one on his yacht, the Coroner, which still lies in this harbor, will give any information about the absent leader. When Capt. Perry was making a verbal declaration at the customhouse of the yacht's arrival. He said, "The head of the association that owns the boat has gone to Newcastle to shoot bears." The reporter called on Capt. Perry, last evening but questions as to Sanford's whereabouts were carefully evaded.

The Advocate reporter can learn nothing of "Rev." Sanford in this locality.

The Salvation Army will run an excursion to Millerton, by the Steamer Rustler, on Friday night May 12th, as this is the first moonlight excursion of the season no doubt there will be a large crowd. The boat will leave Newcastle at 6.45, returning will leave Millerton, 9.45. Fare for round trip only 25c. If the weather is unfavorable the excursion will be run on the following Monday night.

## ELECTRICIAN APPOINTE

Mr. John A. Follansbee of This Town to be Given a Trial

### EXPERT ENGINEER

To Examine Entire Plant and Report on its Present Condition.

A special meeting of the Town Council was called for Friday evening.

There were present Mayor Miller and Alds. Ritchie, Lawlor, Grenley, Russell, Williston, Wyse, Desmond, McMurdo.

His Worship explained that the meeting had been called to consider the resignation of Electrician Waddell, also a matter which the Board of Health would bring up, and general business.

A communication from O. G. Anderson re water supply was read and handed to Water and Light committee.

A communication from Mr. Doyle for quotations on two lights for public wharf was handed to Light and Water Committee.

A resolution from the Fire Company was read. This was asking for an increase of remuneration.

After discussing this was handed to the Park and Fire Committee.

The account of John Sargeant for services Board of Health \$10 was passed.

Ald. Lawlor read petition of Thos. Holman asking for rebate of taxes on income as he had not been able to work last year. Handed to Committee of Petitions.

His Worship read the resignation of Electrician Waddell, which was held over until next meeting or such time as a successor could be appointed.

The following applications for the position of Electrician were read:

J. T. Ackhurst, Halifax Jax. A. Follansbee, Newcastle, Hugh Andrews, St. John N. B., Warren D. Reynolds, Stellerton, Arthur S. Smith, Londonderry, R. P. Bray, Campbellton, J. B. Russell Newcastle and Jas. Fraser, Pictou.

His Worship stated that Mr. Follansbee had authorized him to state that if given a months trial and he did not give satisfaction he would step out and not ask the town for salary for that time. He was confident he would be able to run the plant.

Mr. Follansbee's application was backed up by a petition signed by a large number of citizens.

Ald. Lawlor stated that this application and petition had been up before the Water and Light committee. It was the general feeling that as the town had an expensive plant and should get the best man for the least money. He thought the Council should go into committee of the whole and discuss this matter thoroughly.

Ald. Ritchie said it was very necessary to have a capable man. He should like to see Mr. Follansbee given a trial if he was thought capable of running the plant. There were a number of applications but nothing could be told about applicants until they had been given a trial.

Ald. Williston thought this was a serious matter. The town had once hired an electrician by recommendation and had been badly taken in. The plant was present in just such a condition that the poor man was engaged. It would mean the downfall of the plant whereas if the right man was engaged it would mean the progress of the same. Thought it would be better to spend a little money and have some of the applicants come to town and see what they were capable of doing.

Ald. Desmond stated that only two applicants had named any salary. Would it not be advisable to ascertain salary expected.

His Worship stated that Mr. Follansbee would expect same salary as present electrician.

On motion of Ald. Ritchie this matter was laid over until Monday night.

Ald. Lawlor said one applicant was willing to come up.

Ald. Grenley—If he does come up who is to know whether he is capable or not.

Adjourned until Monday night

### MONDAY EVENING

The council assembled at 8 o'clock.

There were present the full board.

Applications were made from Jas. R. Thomson, Westville and Edward Doyle, Joggins Mines for position at Power House. These were placed with other applications to be dealt with later.

Ald. Lawlor suggested that ordinary routine be disposed with and that the town officers be appointed.

His Worship explained that it was not necessary to appoint these until the first regular meeting as the officers appointed last year held office until their successors were appointed.

A petition from Frank Mason asking that the outlet of Castle Street sewer

## GREAT REVIVAL

Claim that the World is Becoming Good.

### NOTED PREACHERS

Revival Meeting Being Held in all Quarters of the Globe

Is the world on the eve of a great religious revival? This is the question which is being eagerly discussed in many quarters, and hopefully answered in the affirmative by people like Evan Roberts, General Booth, and Dr. Newell Dwight Hillis. Those of us who are no more than middle-aged are old enough to remember the religious re-awakening associated with the names of Dwight L. Moody and Ira D. Sankey, twenty years or so ago. The signs and omens which portended this revival are to be seen again today, and from these it is deduced that the year 1905 or 1906 will see the phenomena which made the eighties memorable. Another reason is found in the undoubted need of spiritual house-cleaning and stock-taking.

### PROTEST AGAINST UNRIGHTEDNESS

The existence of these phenomena has been apparent to the most casual observer, but different have been the interpretations thereof. In Canada and the United States there has never been a time when the protest against corporate and political dishonesty was so strong and so much in earnest. There is hardly a newspaper or magazine but has secured enormous circulations because they are showing or pretending to show up the evils of graft and dishonesty. In Ontario there has been an election which resulted in one of the most remarkable condemnations of political iniquity in our history. The moral sense of the province was roused as never before. Socialistic outbreaks have occurred in many quarters. These, among others are the signs of some unseen heaven. One soothsayer interprets them to mean a growing belief in Socialism, another declares them to pre-announce the ultimate triumph of public ownership.

### REVIVALS OF PERMANENT ADVANTAGE

Now there comes the religious hypothesis, and these stirrings are said to be indications of a new spiritual life. What, say the apostles of the last explanation, are all these strugglings toward a new light but proof that the old fails to satisfy? Socialism and public ownership are untested cures. Religion has been proved thousands of times, and has never yet failed. Pursuing the simile, they argue that to effect a permanent cure religion must be adopted as a habit, not as a fad, to be taken up for a season. This brings us to a consideration of the claim that the effects of religious revivals are not permanent, that when they pass away people sink back as far as they have risen, and that there is no real gain. Scientific men argue, ever, that the sensual exaltation which is a well recognized feature of most revivals is a source of weakness in itself; and that real harm is done by periodical waves of religious excitement.

### SOME NOTABLE MANIFESTATIONS.

Without more than indicating the existence of these conflicting claims, we may proceed to note some phenomena which are certainly not traceable to any other cause than that of religion. We name the Dowie crusade in New York last year, only to dismiss it as a flat failure. Next there are religious meetings held by Torrey and Alexander in England, more recently in London, where there was certainly a keen interest on the part of thousands of people. It is a question whether the methods of the American evangelists are well adapted to the needs of those whom they are trying to reach; but the fact that so many

thousands of people are apparently willing, even anxious, to be reached proves the existence of a general feeling. Most important of all is the great Welsh revival, in which Evan Roberts, a young collier, is the leading figure. It is a fact not open to question that the physical and mental condition of whole communities has been transformed by the young man's preaching. Where once the ruderst sports, the roughest language, the most degraded social standards reigned, there is reverent talk, high aspirations, and devout behaviour. It is idle to say that this will not last; for that matter, nothing is petrified. But that thousand upon thousands of Welsh folk are living better, cleaner lives is a decided gain for every hour that it continues.

### THE MOVEMENT IN THE UNITED STATES.

In the United States within the year there have been notable revivals in several cities—at Los Angeles, Kiokuk, and Denver, for examples. Indeed, on account of the meeting in Denver, the Colorado Legislature adjourned one day. Dayton, Louisville, Atlanta, Schenectady, Kansas City, and Jackson have each in their turn been visited, most of the meetings being in charge of the Presbyterian evangelistic Committee. The latest city to be reached by the wave is Brooklyn, where Rev. Dr. Hillis, pastor of a very small congregation has inaugurated a crusade, and express the opinion that ministers should preach from cart tails if thus they can save more souls. In some parts of Pennsylvania, among the miners, as remarkable transformations have been effected as those in Wales. Boardings which once advertised liquors and places of resort now blazon forth the admonition: Make thyself right with God.

These are the surface results. Underneath there are strongly organized forces at work to stimulate and spread the spirit which seems to be in the air. Before the year is out we confidently expect to see some mighty manifestations. As Commissioner Eva Booth says: There will be a chorus of hallelujahs round the world.—Toronto Mail and Empire.

# TIGER AND MAJOR.

A Thrilling Experience in the Jungle of India.—Excerpt from the Mind of the Officer.

Major Riddan of the 12th Native Cavalry, India, was hunting in Bengal with a small party, and one afternoon he wandered away from camp a short distance and stretched out under a tree for a nap. He had not slept over a quarter of an hour when he was aroused by what seemed to be the purring of a cat, only the sound was much louder. He had never heard the purr of a tiger or a panther, but realized in an instant that one or the other had come creeping upon him as he slept.

The tiger, as was afterwards ascertained, had his lair within a few hundred feet of where the soldier was lying. After a minute or two, a paw was placed on the officer's shoulder, and he was turned over on the broad of his back. Through his eye winkers he caught sight of the paw, and then realized that he was in the clutches of a full-grown tiger. For the moment he was paralyzed. A panther hasn't the good nature of a tiger, and is also more treacherous. A tiger will starve before he will pounce on anything that he has not killed with his own paws, while the panther will grab anything that comes in his way.

When the man had been turned on his back, the tiger sat up like a dog, and purred like the great cat he was. The soldier's hat was lying on the grass near his head. The tiger reached for it and began to play with it, as you have seen a puppy with a glove or rag. He struck it to the right and then to the left, and then jumped after it and seized it. In his teeth, and gave it a toss in the air. He played with the hat for at least ten minutes, and then sat up, and yawned and returned to his victim. He lay down and chewed at the strap as if he liked the taste, but after a time flung it aside and rolled over on his back, and worked his body about on the grass as if bothered with fleas.

The beast was rolling and purring when one of the horses in camp uttered a neigh. The major was watching through half-closed lids, and the move the tiger made astonished him. He turned like a flash, and bounded six feet into the air, to whist again and stand back to camp. As the neigh was not repeated, the tiger finally wheeled around and lay down with his head on his paws and fastened his eyes on the soldier's face.

There was a long ten minutes' staring which the major lived a month for every minute. Then the beast slowly rose up, and with a touch of his right paw turned the man over on his face. After sniffing at the head, he ran his nose down the leg clear to the ankle. One leg of the soldier's trousers had been pulled up, leaving the leg open, and the beast gave the flesh a couple of licks with his tongue, that felt like a file. The taste didn't seem to tickle his palate for some reason, and he returned to his original position. Once, as he poked at the jacket, a claw caught and ripped it down as a sharp knife would have done. Once, too, he stood with his paw on the man's hand, but as his claws were sheathed, the paw felt like a ball of velvet.

The major was rolled over at least a dozen times by the tiger, and the beast leaped over his back and forth like a dog at play, and he seemed to get a good deal of amusement out of it and to preserve his good nature. He finally fastened his teeth in the man's belt and lifted him clear off the ground as easily as a man might lift a kitten. If the soldier had not been told over and over again that a tiger eats what he kills, he would have made sure that he was to be carried off. He had a revolver in his belt, and as his right hand fell down it encountered the butt of the weapon. He might have drawn it and killed the beast, or a shot might have frightened him away, but it was hardly a chance in a hundred.

It may be that the tiger was holding the man up to see if there was life in him, and was hoping to find him make a movement. If there had been the strike of a hand, death would have been swift and merciless.

After swinging the man pendulum fashion for a full minute, the beast laid him down as carefully as you please, gnawed the belt in two and pulled it off, and carrying one end in his mouth, he trotted away, and was hidden by the jungle.

An hour later the major's party had formed a column and were tramping through the forest.

## GOLD DISCOVERY

The Goldboro Mines The Richest in Nova Scotia if not on the Continent

Sydney, C. B., May 7.—Experts at the Seal Harbor Gold belt at Goldboro, Guysboro County, which was discovered last fall estimate the value of the property at \$40,000,000 to \$50,000,000. They say it is the richest in Nova Scotia, if not on the American Continent. The leads show magnificent sights for every foot of them. The property is owned by the Beaver Hat Gold Mining Co., of Glace Bay and \$1000 was refused on Saturday for one share.

## STEAMER SUNK.

Joy Line Steamer in Collision with Barge.

Vineyard Haven, Mass., May 7.—The Joy Line str. Aransas, Captain Ross, was sunk in collision with the barge Glendower one and a half miles southeast of the Pollock Rip Shoals lightship at 1.30 o'clock this morning.

Only one life was lost, that of Mamie Kelly, aged about 25 years, and address unknown. She was a passenger from New York for Boston.

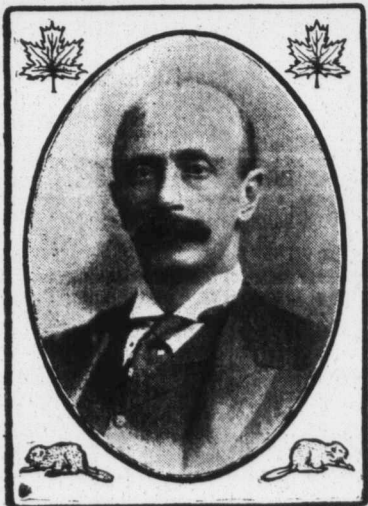

## DOMINION FINANCE

Receipts and Expenditures for Ten Months.

Ottawa, May 6.—The revenue of the Dominion for the ten months of the current fiscal year up to end of April amounts to \$37,130,511, an increase of close on half a million. The expenditure on ordinary account was \$42,337,997, an increase of six and a half million. The capital expenditure totalled \$9,110,928, an increase of a million and a half, which means about eight millions growth in expenditure altogether. The only source of revenue that shows a decline is excise.

## VACCINATION NOTICE.

The County Board of Health desires to call the attention of School Trustees and Teachers to the following section taken from the Consolidated Statutes of New Brunswick, Chapter 50, Section 86, (2):—

"Before entering any child upon the register of any public school, or admitting such child to such public school, there shall be produced by such child, or by its parents, or guardian, or some person acting in behalf of such child, a certificate, to the satisfaction of the teacher of such school, or in case there are more teachers than one of any such school, to the satisfaction of the principal thereof, that such child has been successfully vaccinated within three years from the time of such request for registry or admission; or if such child has been vaccinated within the said period of three years and the vaccination has not been successful, there shall be produced to such teacher or principal satisfactory evidence that by reason of such child having been previously successfully vaccinated, such recent vaccination has not been successful, or that such child is immune."

Board of Works.

Ald Wyse reported from the Committee  
on Petitions, that it recommended the  
prayer of Thos. Holroyd's petition be  
granted. Report adopted.

Ald Lawlor from Light and Water Com-  
mittee reported that by request the matter  
of light on public wharf was allowed to  
stand for some time.

Ald Lawlor as chairman of Light and  
Water committee stated that he had  
interviewed Mr. Ryan in reference to  
hauling sawdust and blocks for fuel at  
Power House and he agreed to do this at  
10 cents a load for sawdust and 15 cents  
for cedar blocks, delivered at the Power  
House. Also that town would have con-  
trol of all sawdust at the dump.

Ald Ritchie moved that Light and  
Water committee be authorized to make  
contract with Mr. Ryan as stated by Ald  
Lawlor—Carried.

Ald Lawlor thought that it was necessary  
that the entire plant at Power House  
should be inspected by an expert engineer  
and electrician before it was placed in the  
hands of a new man.

Ald Ritchie thought that this would  
only be right. The whole plant should be  
gone over by an expert before a new man  
was placed in charge.

Ald Williston thought Ald Lawlor was  
right and this should be done before change  
was made. It just occurred to him that  
we had men on the Miramichi capable of  
examining the plant and suggested Mr.  
McLellan of Chatham.

Ald Lawlor thought as the engine was  
placed by Messrs Goldie & McCollough  
that it would be advisable to have their  
expert man come as they naturally would  
be anxious to have their machine running  
properly.

Ald Lawlor moved that an expert en-  
gineer and electrician be brought to town  
to examine the dynamo, engines, pumps  
ect. at Power House.

Ald Williston thought that motion was  
too broad. He was not against having an  
expert here but did not wish unnecessary  
expense placed on town.

Ald McMurdo asked if Mr. McLellan  
was capable of examining electrical machi-  
nery.

Ald Williston—No.

Ald McMurdo—Then why engage two  
men. In all fairness to Mr. Waddell's  
successor it was necessary that plant be  
looked over by a capable man.

Ald Williston said he only suggested  
Mr. McLellan as a good man.

Ald Ritchie thought that it was likely  
two men would have to be engaged as it  
was difficult to get a man who was an ex-  
pert in both lines.

Ald McMurdo said that applications had  
been received from some men who were  
capable of running the entire plant and  
keeping it in repair. Why not have one  
of these come up and examine plant.  
He understood that the man appointed in  
charge of machines at Power House was  
supposed to run machinery and keep it in  
repair yet a bill for over \$100 had been  
passed at that session for necessary repairs  
to engine and plant.

Ald Williston moved as an amendment  
to Ald Lawlor's motion that the words "be  
procured in the provinces if possible" be  
added.

This was not seconded and Ald Lawlor's

and engineer was then taken up.

## An Expert Opinion.

The contention among business men that a college degree does not necessarily fit a young man for a successful career has had support from an unexpected source.

Sir William Ramsay is a scientist of great distinction in his own country. He is a member of the faculty of the University of London, where he occupies the chair of chemistry. Moreover, he has won renown as an investigator. In a recent lecture in New York he is reported to have said:

"And now let us discuss a question which has not given difficulty in America, I understand, but which has greatly retarded the advance of knowledge and research in England. I refer to examinations. I have often seen men whose circumstances or whose character or whose deliberate choice has led them to abstain from taking a degree, and who are none the less most successful investigators and who have proved most inspiring teachers."

"On the other hand, I have perhaps more frequently come in contact with graduates whose only claim to recognition is a parrotlike ability to repeat what has been told them and a knack of gauging the idiosyncrasies of the examiner. The older I get the less I believe in the university degrees as a test of capacity."
