

THE Ottawa Free Press points cut that though the members of the present Dominion Cabinet claim to be specially charged with the care of "the business interests" of the Dominion, it is a somewhat remarkable fact that there is not a practical business man in the Ministry. Not a merchant, man in the Ministry. Not a merchant, manufacturer, shipowner, banker or trader is to be found among the men holding portfolios in the Thompson Government. The salaried positions in the Cabinet are held by nine lawyers, one mill-owner, one retired publisher, and one ex-temperance lecturer. The minor positions in the Government are filled by two lawyers and a miller, with one brower. positions in the Government are miled by two lawyers and a miller, with one brewer and one wholesale merchant. Hon. Frank Smith is the only representative of the mercantile interests of the country in the mercantile interests of the country in the Cabinet, and he has not been intrusted with a portfolio. It is therefore easy to understand why the combinesters who furnish the political lawyers with election funds are able to control the Government's tariff policy. POISON IN PENCILS.

Diphtheria is prevalent among the school children of Detroit, and the charge is made by Dr. R. S. Farnum, of that city, that the disease has been spread by interchanging lead pencils. The Board of Education furnishes pencils for all the scholars, and the latter are not allowed to use any others. The scholars get one pencil today and another to-morrow, all the pencils being dropped into a box at the close of school each day. It is no exaggeration to say that the average child using a lead pencil will put the lead end into its mouth 40 times a day, and with the pencils going from one child's meuth to another from day to day it is easy to see that the practice might become very dangerous, while of might become very dangerous, while of course it is unclean.

This is a result arising from free supply of school necessaries to pupils that those favorable to the change have not generally recognized. Why should a stop not be put to the practice complained of? It is entirely unnecessary to wet the point of a good pencil in order to write well with it, and as the practice is a filthy one, as well as fraught with danger where pencils are used on the co-operative basis, as in the Detroit schools, it surely should be possible to put a stop to it. If anyone doubted the mayor's assurance that it is not the work mayor's assurance that it is not the work-ingman who has been in the habit of staving off the payment of his taxes, let him appeal to City Clerk Kingston or to the tax collectors. ALL-ROUND REDUCTION OF TAXATION.

We are glad that attention has been called to the enormity of the coal oil duty of 200 per cent; but we should be sorry, indeed, to think that the people who make a fuss about an unjust tax of four or five dollars a year are stupid enough to relish a lot of other unjust taxes which cost them hundreds of dollars in the aggregate. Canadians could stand a tax of 500 per cent, on coal oil, if they were happily rid of the protective duties on all other articles of household necessity.—[Hamilton Times.

high tax newspapers that support the present Administration would fain stem the sweeping tide of tariff reform by denouncing the duties on oil, while leaving untouched taxes that press just as heavily upon the taxpayers as do the oil duties. It cannot be done, brethren. The people of Canada have given high taxation and trade restriction a fair trial, and the system has injured rather than helped the overwhelming proportion of the population. The radical reduction of the duties on oil or their entire abolition, will not be enough The taxation must come off all along the The taxation must come off all along the line, except is the case of luxuries that the masses do not require to satisfy their daily wants. Suppose the oil duties were reduced to-morrow, the well-owner and the refiner would be entitled to demand that the duties on the tools of their trade should be lowered, and that the duties on their manufacturing and personal necessities should be reduced. The tool manufacturer could fairly stipulate that the duty on iron and steel required by him should also come down. And so it will him should also come down. And so it will have to be all along the line. Sir John Macdonald, while alive, again and again acknowledged this view of the situation when he counseled those interested in combines, and who were heavy subscribers to his election funds, to stick together in the maintainance of the policy that had been mutually advantageous to the monop olist and to the politician. As he tersely put it on one occasion "We must all hang ogether or we will hang separately." IN THE EAST END.

The Ward Campaign Opens With a Rousing Meeting.

No Less Than Fifteen Speakers Discuss Municipal Topics.

The Mayoralty, Aldermanic and School-Board Cardidates on the Platform -The Early Closing Movement Advocated-Some Lively Addresses.

No less than fifteen speakers addressed the intelligent electors of ward 5 last night. It was the first ward meeting of the campaign. The East End hall was full and the audience on the whole was most attentive and orderly, being composed largely of representative citizens. A few individuals were inclined to be noisy, but were promptly sat upon. Squire Jarvis presided, and called the speakers in the order pre-arranged. Every question on the municipal slate was touched upon.

THE EARLY CLOSING MOVEMENT.

The first address was made by Rev. Mr. Ward, of the Hamilton Road Methodist Church, in favor of the closing of bars at 7 o'clock. It was now admitted, he said, that liquor was a cerebral narcetic poison; that it should be under control and not used as a beverage, but only upon the physician's prescription. No one could say the liquor business was carried on for the public good. Nine-tenths of the erime and debauchery of the present times was traceable to this evil. It was in their power to trow off this onus by means of their votes. Temperance people were really modest in placing the hour at 7 instead of 6. By the extinction of this great evil nine-tenths of the poorhouses, jails and asylums would be liberated and in their right minds. Early closing would not interfere with the traveling public; the houses would still be open, but the liquor would be placed on one side. (Applause.)

Ald. Yates said he was there in the cause of temperance and in the in the cause of temperance and in the interfere with the traveling public; the houses would still be open, but the liquor would be placed on one side.

Ald. Yates said he was there in the cause of temperance and was in hearty sympathy with the movement. The only interference with liberty would be with that kind which would not permit a man to go hence recling drunk and beat his wife and children. (Applause.) Since the restriction of the last couple of years there had been a reduction of nearly 50 per cent. in crime. (Applause.) The saloon-keepers deserved no compensation. He strongly favored the free library, and put in a good word for the reduction of the wards, which he had moved to submit to the people.
