FIVE MINUTES OF DESTRUCTIVE WORK.

New York, Aug. 29.—A special from Kernersville, N. C., says: A hurricane passed through this place at 4:30 p.m. yesterday. It lasted only five minutes, but left a path of ruin four miles wide. Three hundred buildings, mostly residences, were wrecked. The house of William M. Phillips was swept off its foundation. Mr. Phillips' daughter waskilled. No other deaths are reported, but ten persons are severely hurt and the list of slightly injured is very long. In the country orchards were swept out of existence, corn fields leveled, giant caksenapped, and what remained after the hurricane was damaged by water. This section is deluged.

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 29.—A general storm in midwinter could scarcely have wrought more damage to the telegraph companies than did the gale of lest night. Business in the Atlantic States and this city is very nearly paralyzed. The great network of wires of the Western Union company suffered to an alarming extent in places east of Bufalo and along the Baltimore and Ohio and Washington, the ravages of the storm were responsible for the wholesale destruction of wires. Line repairers fairly swarm over the storm-swept territory, and the information comes from the western side of this zone of destruction that their work is going to be the most difficult in years. Poles are down in stretches of five miles and the wires are snapped, bent and lashed into seless tangles of inextricable puzzles.



10. Control of the economic monster known as "trust," "syndicate," etc.

Sharp limitation of the amount of land which any individual is allowed to control. Heavy taxation upon all legacies exceeding a certain sum.
