AD GETS MILITARY MEDAL NEARLY TWO HUNDRED DEATHS DUE TO INFLUENZA AND PNEUMONIA IN CITY SINCE BEGINNING OF OCTOBER

Already 187 Have Been Re gistered, and It Is Believed More Returns Are To Be Made — Other Illnesses Caused 95 Death s in Same Period.

There have been 187 deaths attributed to pneumonia and influenza since October 1, according to the records at City Clerk S. Baker's office. During the same period, up to November 13, there were 95 deaths from other causes. While 92 of the deaths from pneumonia and influenza were registered since November 1, this does not signify that the disease is still severe, as the greater part of these occurred in October and were not registered until November.

It is thought that there are still some returns to be made, which will bring the number of deaths from the epidemic to still larger figures.

HURON BOY WHO QUERIES REGARDING GAVE HIS LIFE MILITARY SERVICE

Address Your Problems to the Mill-tary Editor of The Advertiser and They W. I Be Answered From Off.

HARROW. Q.—In answer to my recent query you told me to parade before my commanding officer at the expiration of my narvest leave with full facts of my case and proof of the same. Aften my exemption was cancelled and I had to report on June 13, I gave papers (including my mother's declaration that I was her sole support, my own affidavit to that effect, and a doctor's certificate that my mother's health did not permit her to earn her own living) to be sent to Ottawa. I was then given 30 days' leave, and 20 days extra, and I had to report again on September 13. My mother's statement and my own contained nothing but the truth, but when I reported the second time my commanding officer told me that he could do nothing more for me after my claim had been refused at Ottawa. Was it because I did not furnish proof from some persons not connected with the family?

2. Would my commanding officer early my papers away again with

family?

2. Would my commanding officer send my papers away again with proof of facts after saying he could do nothing more for me? I feel as though there is something wrong, as other widows' sons in this district have received the leave of absence.

A.—As you suggest, there is something wrong in your case, which was referred to military headquarters here, and the information gained that your case was never brought to the attention of headquarters and consequently.

was not forwarded to Ottawa for con-

was not forwarded to Ottawa for consideration, and therefore could, not have been refused. It is the view of the local military headquarters that either you did not lay your case before the proper officer or that it was lost track of somewhere. As harvest leave has been extended, it would be advisable for you to apply for leave of absence once more on reporting back to your

once more on reporting back to your unit (provided that the war is not over by that time), and your case will likely be forwarded to headquarters for consideration without delay.

R. W. S. Q.—My husband was ordered to report for military service in Janary last and went overseas. Am I not entitled to patriotic money, and, if so, can I collect it

money, and, if so, can I collect it after my husband's death?

2. Can I obtain any for my child, and, if so, how much?

A.—Yes. You are entitled to \$10 month but this amount ceases upon the death of spidier. However, you should obtain back money for period during which your husband served in the army.

2. Soldier swives are allowed \$3 per month for each child, and your case seems legitimate for this amount dating from the day of your husband's enlistment. It would be advisable for you to apply to your district office of the patriotic fund for the money that you are entitled to receive on your husband's account.

READER. Q.—I received indefinite leave of absence from the 1st Battalion, Western Ontario Regiment, but am now ordered to report for duty on November 26. I am working a farm and have a fatherless young brother, who is in delicate health, and I support the family on a 135-acre farm. Do I stand any chance of obtaining leave of absence on reporting back to my

4. Is Major Black at the head of the leave of absence board for Military District No. 1?
5. If I am not physically fit on reporting for examination, would I be granted leave of absence, as I am Indispensable at home?
A.—1. Yes. Your case seems a legitimate one for leave of absence, and if your services are still required on the expiration of your leave, you should apply for same again.
2. To your commanding officer, and your application would be handled by Capt. Kirkland, who is adjutant of your regiment.

3. If your mother is alive, apply for indefinite leave of absence as her sole support (she being a widow). If she is not living, apply for leave on the ground that you are the sole support of helpless dependents (invalid brother and family). could apply for same to continue work-ing your large farm. Any one of the above three courses is open for you

to pursue.

5. Depends upon the degree of your fitness. If you are totally unfit for military service you will likely be discharged from the army. Otherwise, if not granted leave of absence on account of your domestic position and if your services are still required, you will be compelled to serve.







HEADS ALL DISEASES

There is still more scarlet fever in the city than any other communicable disease, according to the weekly report issued by the health officer, 24 cases being in isolation, with nine of these at the hospital. However, there was only one new case reported, which speaks well for the care being taken speaks well for the care being taken to prevent its spread. Five cases of chickenpox, three of diphtheria and two of tuberculosis complete the list of new cases. There are now ten cases of chickenpox and thirteen of diphtheria in isolation, making a total of 47 cases of communicable disease isolated in the city, 21 of these being at the hospital.

INFLUENZA HAS NOT YET LEFT THE CITY ENTIRELY

While Spanish influenza in this city is no longer in the epidemic class, new cases are still continuing to develop, indicating that it is unwise to abandon precautions, or to fail to consult a doctor on feeling "all out of sorts."

Victoria Hospital still has 75 patients, five of whom were admitted yesterday. Some of the cases are very serious. Three were discharged yesterday. At St. Joseph's Hospital the number of cases is down to 30, with only one or two in serious condition.
