The unholy alliance between American trusts and the anti-reciprocity organization in Canada, is exposed in the latest canard of the London Free Press. That paper has stooped to do the dirty work of those American trusts, which having lost their fight against reciprocity at Washington, are now trying to beat it in Canada.

Two falsehoods stood out in the Free Press' announcement on Saturday regarding the Southern Lumber Journal, of Wilmington, North Carolina, a fortnightly trade publication. Here they are:

So the Free Press has been forced to give itself the lie. It intended to make it appear that this "Journal" was a newspaper circulating among all classes. Then, challenged by The Advertiser, it admitted yesterday that it was "one of the most important TRADE journals of the

Today, without acknowledging its first error, it prints a facsimile of the title-page of its friend "The Journal" in a panicky haste to reassure its readers that there actually is such a "newspaper," but leaves no doubt now in any one's mind that the "Journal" is not a newspaper, but an official organ of the American Lumber Trust.

As to falsehood No. 2, its exposure of course follows necessarily upon that of falsehood No. 1. Once it is clear that the American Lumber Trust is behind the Free Press' "Wilmington Journal," it is also clear that such a publication cannot be in favor of reciprocity. The Advertiser, however, telegraphed to the leading newspaper of Wilmington, the Daily Star, for decisive information on this point, and received the reply photographed above.

Now, what are decent Canadians to think of the annexation talk of an Amercan anti-reciprocity organ, and of the Canadian papers which reprint it?

The facts of this case are clear. The American Lumber Trust inspired purposely for the Canadian elections the article quoted by the Free Press. It was sent to the anti-reciprocity headquarters or bureau in this country at Ottawa, there reprinted, or facsimiled by the gross, and distributed to such papers, including the Free Press, as do not mind using it, with instructions to parade the "Wilmington Journal" as an ordinary American news-

SPAIN IS UNDER MARTIAL LAW

Widespread Strikes Cause of Drastic Action.

REVOLUTIONARY PLOT

Tried Rioters.

[Canadian Press.]

Madrid, Sept. 19.—Martial law has been declared in Spain.

This followed reports of violence in connection with workingmen's strikes which have been called in various cities to further, the Government says a revolutionary plot.

The most serious situation is at Valencia, where a general strike was declared yesterday. The city was at once placed under martial law, and though there was more or less rioting throughout the day, the authorities had matters pretty well in hand until after dark, when the disturbers vented their fury in an attack upon the oficials in the adjacent township of Cullera.

A Judge Murdered.

The rioters murdered a judge and wounded other officers of the court which had been engaged in the trial of those who had been arrested earlier in the day. The mob was finally dispersed by guards from the customs house.

Strikes have also been declared at Biibao, Saragossa, Cadiz, Huelva, Seville, Gigeon and other cities. In some of these places the movement has been but partially successful. Premier Canalejas announced that the Government has in its possession the details of a revolutionary plot uncovered at Valencia and Barcelona Part of this plot was to assassinate General Weyler, captain-general of Canalogia. The Government claims to know the names of all the conspirators and the sources of their supplies. It is claimed that the movement at Barcelona has failed of importance.

CLOSE TO AGREEMENT

Programme Said to Assure Germany's Economic Rights in Morocco.

Frankfort-on-the-Main, Germany, Sept. 9.—The Berlin correspondent of the Frankfurter Zeitung reports today that Frankfurter Zeitung reports today that an agreement has been reached by Germany and France on all points except one, and that the programme assures Germany's economic rights in Morocco. The brief time required for the preparation of the German answer to the French note shows, the correspondent says, how far the Franco-German understanding has progressed. standing has progressed.



MONARCHIST PLOT WAS WELL DEVELOPED

A Large Section of Troops and Many Civilians Implicated.

[Canadian Press.]

Lisbon, via the Frontier, Sept. 13.—
The recent monarchist conspiracy unearthed at Vianna De Castello, appears to have been more serious than at first thought. A great part of the troops and many civilians were implicated. The conspiracy reached as far as Braga and Oporto.

It was planned to start a rising of the people of Vianna De Castello, Braga and Oporto and, massacre the garrisons in these cities the moment the royalists crossed the frontier. The leaders of the movement were confident that such action within the country would demoralize the Republican troops on the frontier, and thus make easy the conquest of the north by the royalists. The Government was advised of the plot, and is making every effort to arrest all those implicated.

Late advices from the frontier say

Late advices from the frontier say that in view of the instructions issued by the Spanish Government, the monarchist plotters have abandoned Galicia, and are preparing to enter Fortugal. They will proceed across the border without arms, and have arranged with bands of smugglers to bring into Portugal all their armaments and supplies and store them in caves in the mountains. The royallsts plan to pass the frontier at night, singly or in groups, thus concealing their numbers, and they will reassemble on a date fixed by Captain Couceire, the royallst leader.

The Government hopes to prevent the reassembling of the monarchists within the republic, by dispatching the republican troops, now concentrated at strategical points on the frontier, as flying columns to disperse the revolutionists before they are able to unite at one point. The

LORD HAMILTON

AGAINST UNIONS

Says Recognition of Them Would Create Chaotic Condition. [Canadian Press.]

London, Sept. 18 .-- Lord Claude Hamilton, chairman of the Great Eastern Railway for the past eighteen years, was the principal witness today before the railway commission which is inquiring into the differences between the companies and their em-ployees. He made a sharp attack upon British trades unionism. He Asserted that of the Great Eastern staff but 10 per cent. belonged to the Amalgamated Society of Railroad Servants. The witness expressed the opinion that a recognition of the unions would that a recognition of the unions would result in a chaos that would be followed by commercial classater. Hardly, said he, had the seven-year conciliation plan of 1907 been concluded when the leaders of the unions realized that a long period of conciliation meant a loss of membership, and they immediately started a campaign for the repudiation of the compact. Thereby they had forfeited all right to be trusted in the future.

Lord Hamilton thought that both directors and members of the unions who broke their agreements should be fined heavily, or imprisoned, and that organized labor might be pequiarily answerable for encouraging breaches of contract. Strike picketing, he said, should be abolished.

SOVEREIGN BANK CASE

Directors' Counsel Asks For Stay Proceedings.

Toronto, Sept. 18.—D. L. McCarthy, K. C., acting for certain directors and others connected with the Sovereign Bank, today applied for a stay till the end of the month in any proceedings against them under the judgment recently given by the court of appeals. The application was ordered by those who had agreed to be bound by the result of the decision in the test case brought against Donald McMillan. In that case judgment was given against Mr. McMillan and three other directors for amounts totalling \$178,000.
