

Analyst Finds Paris Green in Stomach of C. Kauchenmaster.

Nov. 14.—Death by paris green poisoning, but self-administered is in effect the finding of Coroner Dr. Patterson's jury tonight after five minutes' deliberation upon the evidence submitted concerning the case of Christopher Kauchenmaster of Hillsboro. It was educed that on June last Mr. Kauchenmaster had bought a farm from John Jones in Hillsboro for \$10,000. He paid \$2,000 down and was to have paid \$2,000 more in September, which he had expected to do by selling his property in Forest. But he could not sell this property, and borrowed \$1,000 by mortgaging it. Thereafter he worried at the prospect of hav after he worried at the prospect of having to meet interest payments. He had never borrowed nor was in debt before. On the Wednesday before his death he fell out of an apple tree, and injured himself, which added to his
