



## BOYCOTT OF POTATO MARKET IS DECIDED ON BY LOCAL WOMEN

Determination Is Reached At Mass Meeting — Deputation Will Wait On Wholesale Sugar Dealers To Protest Against Price and Threaten Action.

The women of London in mass meeting yesterday afternoon decided to boycott the potato market until the prices again become reasonable. They also appointed a deputation of nine to wait upon the wholesale sugar dealers of the city and protest against the increasing high price of sugar, with the threat that they would approach the Government on the matter if there was not an evidence of lower prices in the future. The potato boycott commences today.

Perhaps never in the history of the city was a meeting pervaded with greater enthusiasm and more singleness of purpose. Beginning in the Y. W. C. A. board-room, King street, it was shortly so overcrowded that it became impossible to continue there successfully. Women swarmed out through the doors and into the halls all clamoring for an opportunity to hear and to express their views. Even the magic name of the press, usually effective in such emergencies, was helpless to make a passage through the mob, which pressed forward towards the room where Mrs. E. B. Smith, president of the Local Council of Women, was vainly endeavoring to conduct a satisfactory meeting. For a time it almost seemed as if the meeting would have to be abandoned until another day and a larger hall could be obtained. But this suggestion was met with violent protests from the women, who declared they had been waiting for weeks for just this opportunity, and they would not be put off any longer.



Cereals are ruling firm in a quiet mar-ket, but the steadily advancing prices cereais are ruling firm in a quiet market, but the steadily advancing prices of grains, especially corn and oats, is having a firming tendency. Manufacturers of cereals state that the present price of grains warrants an early advance on all oat and corn products. The ever-increasing consumption of tea and the difficulty of transportation are country a chartery of spect teachs.

tea and the difficulty of transportation are causing a shortage of spot stocks. Shipments that are arriving are mostly of the medium grades and a scarcity of the finer grades and the lower grades is noted. No new developments are manifest in the market for rice. A few small shipments are arriving, but with the big season for rice approaching, it is stated in some quarters that prices will reach even higher levels, due to the short crops and the control of exports in European countries. Canned goods are steady and dried fruits al. Imports of spices have been extra hely small and in consequence spot tocks have ben steadily dwindling. Local importers are predicting firmer to higher prices in view of the scarcity of certain lines and the keen bidding amongst European buyers. Potato supplies are scarce and aportations are higher.

keen bidding amongst European buyers. Potato supplies are scarce and quotations are higher. Advances have been registered on washboards, parowax, cigarette papers, condensed milk and Lenox soap.

The produce and provision markets are slightly firmer. Fresh meats have advanced one to two cents per pound. Hams and bacon are quoted higher. Cooked hams are quoted two cents per pound higher. The egg market is firmer, probably due to the fact that storage operations are now under way. The butter market is easier and quotations are one cent per pound down. Cheese, lard and shortening are steady.

WASHINGTON, April 23.—Two warships from the Pacific fleet were en route tonight to Mexican waters to protect American citizens and interests at Mazatian and Topolobampo. They were dispatched from San Diego today on orders from the navy department after requests for protection had come from United States representatives at those ports. A similar request came from the United States agent at Frontera on the gulf coast, but was not acted on pending further investigation of the situation there. The cruiser Galveston is at Tampico, a short distance from there.

The situation at Mazatian and Topolobampo is unknown here. There had been no report of disturbances at either place, and latest advices reported the arrival of 300 Government soldiers at Mazatian.

Sonora State forces, in rebellion against the Carranza Government, are known to be pushing on toward Mazatlan, the most important Mexican gateway on the Pacific.

There are extensive American interests at Mazatian, where the Mexico-California Steamship Company has its terminal. Word has been received at the office of the company that both of the Mexican ports have been closed.
