POTATO BOYCOTT SHOWS NO EFFECT ON THE LONDON MARKET TODAY

BOYCOTT OF POTATO MARKET IS DECIDED ON BY LOCAL WOMEN

Determination Is Reached At Mass Meeting — Deputation Will Wait On Wholesale Sugar Dealers To Protest Against Price and Threaten Action.

The women of London in mass meeting yesterday afternoon decided to boycott the potato market until the prices again become reasonable. They also appointed a deputation of nine to wait upon the wholesale sugar dealers of the city and protest against the increasing high price of sugar, with the threat that they would approach the Government on the matter if this party was not an evidence of lower prices in the future. The potato boycott commenced today.

Perhaps never in the history of the city was a meeting pervaded with greater enthusiasm and more singleness of purpose. Beginning in the Y. W. C. A. board-room to meet, it was shortly so overcrowded that it became impossible to continue there successfully. Women swarmed out through the doors and into the hall, all clamoring for an opportunity to hear and to express their views. Even the name of the press, usually effective in such emergencies, was helpless to make a passage through the throng which pressed forward towards the room where Mrs. E. J. Smith, president of the Local Council of Women, was vainly endeavoring to conduct a deputation meeting. Time almost seemed as if the meeting would have to be abandoned until another day and a larger hall could be obtained. But this suggestion was met with violent protests from the women, who declared they would wait for weeks for just this opportunity, and they would not be put off any longer.

Used Auditorium. Finally the welcome news came that the Y. M. C. A. Auditorium was available, and the meeting was adjourned to meet there tomorrow. It was a fascinating sight to see the women hurrying along the street in droves, so as to get a front seat in the hall. There was every type of woman, some elegantly gowned, some poorly gowned, but all were filled with the same purpose—to fight the high price demon which has worried them for some time.

When the women were finally seated again they filled the whole lower floor of the auditorium, waiting in hushed expectancy for the first opportunity to voice their views, which even business or modesty would not repress. Immediately a hot discussion was opened on the question, and a great diversity of opinion here, some of the women believing that a straight boycott of the potato market until prices should again become reasonable was the only thing to do.

Others, and chief among them Mrs. H. C. Tull, thought that it was not fair to the grocers to refrain entirely from buying potatoes, as many of them might have a large stock on hand. Accordingly Mrs. Tull made a motion to the effect that the women should boycott the potato market until the price of potatoes should come down to 15 cents a peck, and that the grocers are given an opportunity of getting rid of their present stock at that price.

Mrs. Thorpe thought that 15 cents was too high, and that the price should be fixed at 60 cents, her suggestion receiving great applause from the meeting.

Motion Defeated. Mrs. Tull's motion was defeated, however, in favor of an amendment which declares a complete boycott of the potato market until the price should be reduced. This amendment was made by Mrs. Thorpe and seconded by Mrs. J. W. Jones.

At a meeting of the East Middlesex Deacons to be held on Tuesday in St. James' Anglican Church, the important matter of allotting more space to religious study on the Protestant public school curriculum will be brought up. For some time past the Anglican Sunday School Association has been endeavoring to bring before the public the importance of this matter. At a meeting held recently in Cronyn Hall a resolution in favor of more extensive Bible teaching in the schools was passed and sent to the government.

At a committee meeting of the Anglican clergy held last night it was advocated that every child be taught the 23rd Psalm, the parable of the Prodigal Son, and the story of the Good Samaritan, and that a Bible study text book be prepared, suitable for children of all ages and to be used in all grades. Rev. Dean Tucker said at the meeting last night that it was the general opinion of people all over the Dominion that the religious side of the child's education should be given more attention.

Dean Tucker said that apart from the devotional exercises in the schools practically no other religious instruction was given. At the deaconry meeting on Tuesday it will be asked that the name of the movement, now called Scripture Instruction be changed to Religious Study. He also pointed out the fact last night that the premier of Saskatchewan had consented to pass legislation regarding religious instruction in Protestant public schools if the churches could agree upon a syllabus of teaching. In Quebec the scheme has already been adopted successfully.

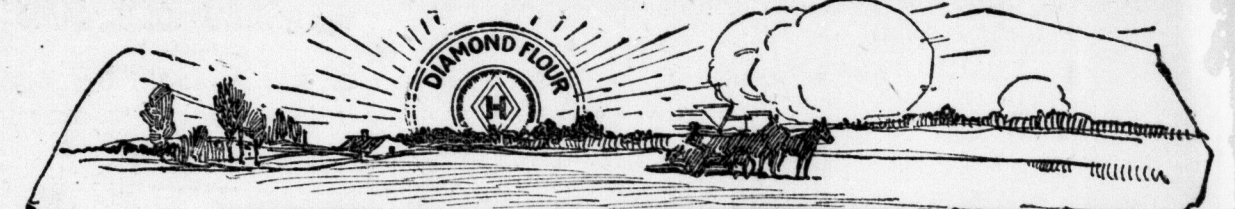

ASK CLERGY TO MENTION POTATO BOYCOTT FROM PULPITS ON SUNDAY. Women Determined To Bring Down Price of Spuds. That the women of London determine to make the boycott of the potato market a success is evident from the fact that Miss Stella Macklin has been appointed to request the clergymen of the city to announce this boycott from their pulpits tomorrow.

TWENTY VENEREAL DISEASE CASES REPORTED IN WEEK

Report of M. O. H. Shows Startling Situation. The report for last week made by Dr. W. S. Downham, M.O.H., on the communicable diseases situation affords a

somewhat startling commentary on the prevalence of venereal disease in the city. The number of cases of gonorrhoea actually reported during the week was twenty, far larger than that of any other communicable disease, and only slightly smaller than of all others combined. The next most prevalent infectious disease was mumps, of which twelve cases were reported. Other diseases reported were: Whooping cough, five cases; chickenpox, four; tuberculosis, three; diphtheria, one. The diphtheria patient is the only one whom it was found necessary to send to the hospital.

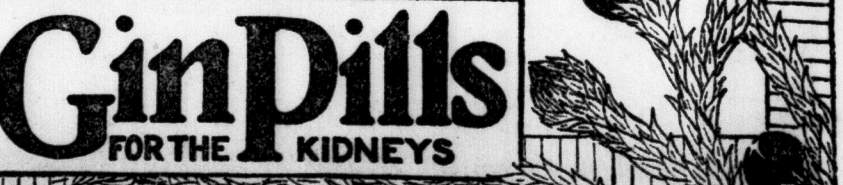

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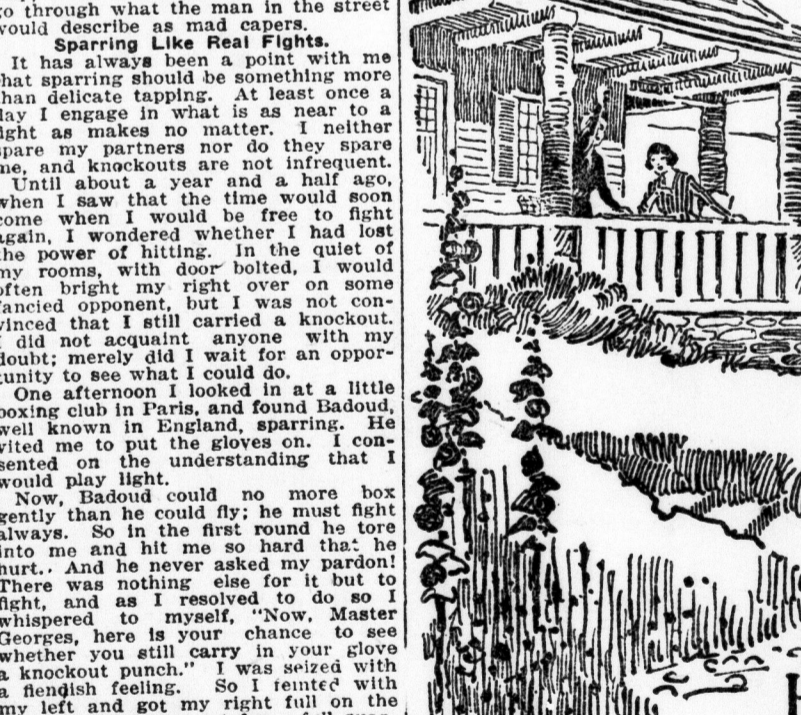

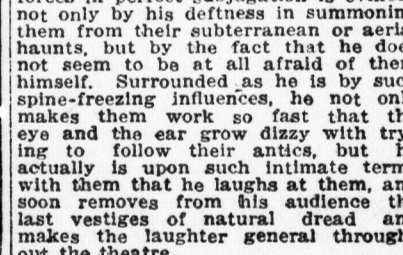

ARMENIA TO BE INDEPENDENT, IS COUNCIL RULING

Supreme Body At San Remo Decides On Free Republic.

CANADA IS MENTIONED

This Dominion Was Among the List of Possibilities For Mandate.

SAN REMO, April 23.—Armenia is to be made an independent republic. This decision was reached by the supreme council of the Allies today, because neither the United States nor any other power was willing to accept a mandate over the country.

The boundaries of Armenia have not yet been defined and the new republic will probably be rather contracted, as it is believed that the smaller the country, the more easily can it take care of itself, because if too many Turks are left within its confines they might overthrow the Government.

The committee of those in close relation with the council is that the league of nations has been rather slightly treated respecting Armenia. The council sent a somewhat vague letter to the league asking it to take the mandate. The league executive at a meeting in Paris replied favorably, but called attention to the fact that it had no funds and no staff, suggesting that the council should authorize an international loan, guaranteed by the powers composing the council.

With Large Debt. It was pointed out that the new states ought not be burdened with a large debt to begin with and the council was also requested to eject the Turkish forces from the borders of the new states. These proposals have not been accepted by the council, which thus declines to avail itself of the league as a suitable mandatory. It is understood that if the league had been provided with money it might have arranged with neutral governments to exercise the mandate under supervision of the league. Among the smaller powers so mentioned are Canada, especially, and if Canada would accept the mandate, the British Empire would leave Smyrna under suzerainty of Turkey, but place the city and

He personally knew of many instances where the irregularities of the last election, especially the taking of the soldiers' votes, was ample proof that a returning officer could be corrupt. He thought the Government ought to be quite willing to put in a clause which would give the Opposition some measure of protection in many constituencies he was challenged by Hon. T. W. Crothers, who asked, "Do you know what you are talking about?"

Blot Its Reputation. The discussion was continued by Mr. Buchanan (Leithridge), Mr. McKenzie (Que. North), Mr. Gould (Assiniboia), Mr. Machaud (Restigouche-Madawaska), P. F. Casgrain (Charlevoix-Montmorency), Mr. Bureau (Three Rivers), Dr. Mulloy (Provencher), and Captain Power (Quebec), all of them supporting the amendment except Messrs. Buchanan and Gould.

Mr. McKenzie said the Government had evidently realized it was going to have a pretty hard time to get in at the next election. He advised the Government not to blot its reputation further by making this bill a machine to put it back in power.

Dr. Mulloy declared the Canadian people had learned to hate and despise the Government. Its followers were deserting one by one. If the Government had power to make every man in the country a returning officer it could not hope to be elected. Let it therefore leave behind the name of having acted fairly at the last by giving all parties a chance to get the right men as returning officers.

GERMAN GOODS BILL DEBATED IN SENATE. OTTAWA, April 23.—The Senate this afternoon debated the bill which seeks to compel merchants dealing in German goods to display a sign over their doors to that effect. Much opposition was expressed and little progress was made. Senator Thompson moved the six months' hoist, and Senator Crossby expressed the opinion that only Senator Lynch-Staunton's popularity had enabled the bill to go thus far. The debate was put over till Wednesday afternoon.

EX-MAYOR PRESENTS TEN-ACRE PARK TO WALLACEBURG TOWN

Capt. J. W. Steinhoff Has Made Many Gifts To the Town.

WALLACEBURG, April 23.—Through the generosity of Ex-Mayor Capt. J. W. Steinhoff, one of the town's most philanthropic citizens, Wallaceburg this week became the possessor of a memorial park and athletic grounds, ten acres in extent, ideally situated within five minutes' walk of the business section, and lying within the town limits in East Wallaceburg.

This is only one of a number of the captain's gifts to the town, and the citizens greatly appreciate his generosity. No better site for a park could have been chosen, and it is a valuable acquisition. The parks' board will at once proceed to plant trees along the park borders and plan a suitable entrance on the triangle lot facing Main street and Margaret avenue, also a gift from the captain.

He took his wife driving in a motor car and near Waldheim, Sask., shot her through the head. He buried the body under a culvert and then went to Blaine Lake, where next day he married Miss Jessie Patterson.

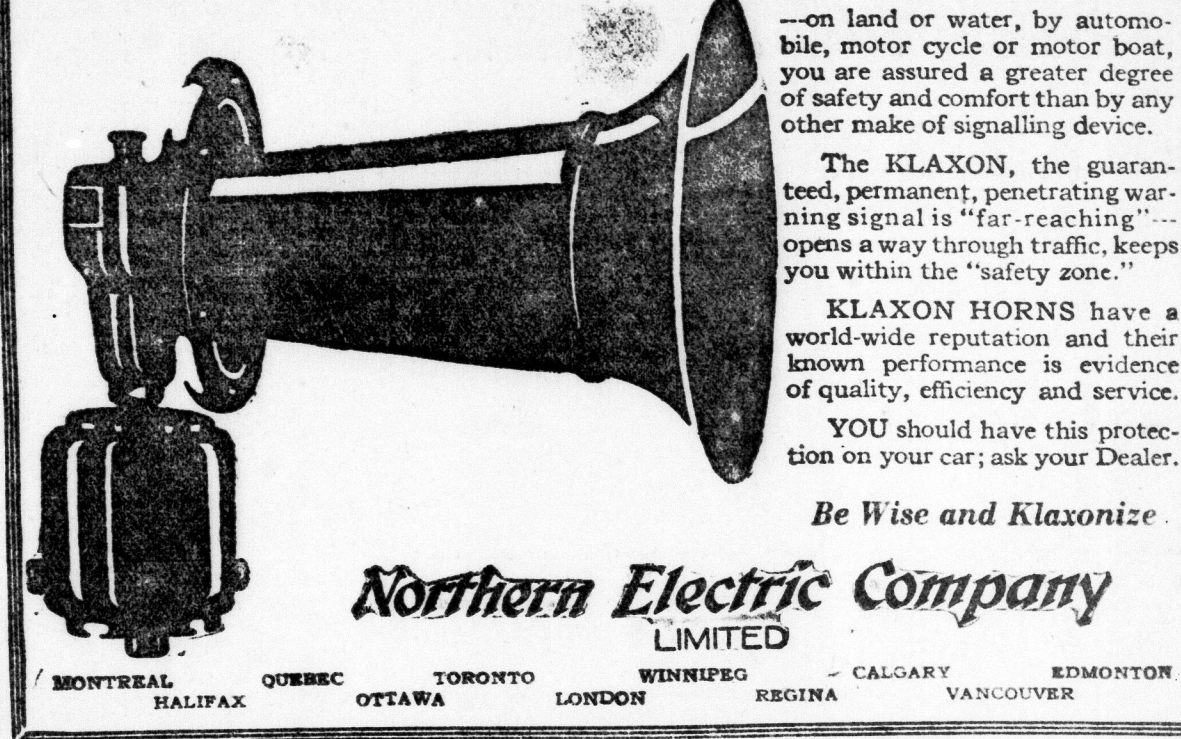
