#### RAILWAYS AND LABOR.

NEW PROVISIONS FOR SETTLE-MENT OF DISPUTES.

Case-Minister of Labor to Make Inquiry Upon Invitation of

Case—Minister of Labor to Make Inquiry Upon Invitation of Either Party.

Ottawa, Feb. 3.—Local labor unions have received draft copies of the amended bill for the settlement of railway labor disputes, which is to take the place of the measure introduced at the last session of Parliament by Sir William Mulock. The old bill provided for the compulsory arbitration of railway disputes and made violations of the act punishable by severe penaltics. After consultations between the Minister of Labor and representatives of the railway employees, the provisions for compulsory arbitration and penalties have been dropped.

The main provision of the bill as recast sets forth that where a difference exists between any railway employers and railway employees, and by reason of failure to readjust such difference arailway lockout or strike has been or is likely to be caused, or the regular and safe transportation of mails, passengers or freight has been or is likely to be caused, or the regular and safe transportation of any party, either on the application of any municipal corporation directly affected, cause inquiry to be made into the aime. For this purpose a hoad into the aime is the convention between the convention between the found in the fourth article, w

interrupted, the Minister of Labor may, either on the application of any party to the difference or on the application of any municipal corporation directly affected, cause inquiry to be made into the same. For this purpose a hoard of arbitrators is to be established by the Minister, to be composed of three persons, of whom the parties to the dispute are to name one each. The third is to be named by the other two arpersons, of whom the parties to the dis-pute are to name one each. The third is to be named by the other two ar-bitrators or by the parties to the dif-ference, and, failing a choice by them, the Minister is to make a selection. For the purpose of such main'r the board is to have the power of summon-ing witnesses and requiring them so give evidence on oath, and calling for the production of such documents and things as are deemed requisite to a the production of such documents and things as are deemed requisite to a full investigation. After making full and careful inquiry into the facts and circumstances of any dispute the board will make a written report thereon to the Minister, and such report will embody the board's findings and recommendations. The report will be published in The Labor Gazette without delay and in the annual report of the

Governor in Council deems reasonable. Witnesses summoned by the board are to be entitled to free transportation. It will be seen that in place of a permanent board of arbitration in the Dominion or in each of the Provinces a special board is to be constituted to investigate each dispute as it may arise. The purpose of the bill is to enable both parties to a difference and the public as well to ascertain the facts and arrive at a reasonable basis of settlement. It is expected that public opinion will have an important influence in bringing about a settlement.

#### PERSONALITY INQUIRY.

Charges Will be Laid Before the Chancellor.

Toronto, Feb. 3.-Crimes against the election law in the recent vote upon the liquor act will not go unwhipped of justice. Mr. Alexander Mills, on behalf of the city temperance workers, who have charged that personation on the part of agents of the liquor interest was rife on referendum day, has urged that an adequate inquiry be made into these charges. Crown Aftorney Dewart, after hearing the evidence submitted by Mr. Mills, has decided to lay before Chancellor Boyd at Osgoode. Hall this morning, as provided by the clauses in the liquor act safeguarding the vote, charges of personation and other illegal acts against nine persons. This is done so that the Chancellor, upon whom the authority rests, may designate a Judge to try the charges so laid. It is understood that the evidence in a number of other cases is being prepared, and will from time to time be laid before the Chancellor. #### THE ALASKA TREATY.

TED TO SENATE.

No Mention of Skaguay or Dyea-The Whole Question to be Dis

Washington, Feb. 3.—The President sent to the Senate yesterday the treaty recently concluded between the United States and Great Britain, providing for submitting the Alaska boundary question to a joint tribunal of six eminent jurists. The document had been returned to the President for the correction of some clerical errors. The convention names no concessions on either side as a condition precedent to the consideration of the boundary question by a joint tribunal, and there is no reference to Skaguay or Dyea or other settlements on the coast.

It is provided that the tribunal shall assemble for their first meeting in London, "as soon as practicable after receiving their commissions." The preamble of the treaty sets forth that the United States and Great Britain are "equally desirous of a settlement of the true meaning of certain clauses of the convention between Great Britain and Russia, signed under date of Feb. 25, 1825." States and Great Britain, providing for

It is doubted that there is oil in Raleigh, as the presence of it in the two good wells proves, but it is clear that care needs to be observed in the acceptance of the report of big strikes and of alluring opportunities for in-

In addition to over 4,000 boxes of butter, she brought a quantity of machinery of various kinds for Johannesburg. FINN COLONY WIPED BUT.

ELEVEN KILLED AND SEVEN FATALLY INJURED.

Terrible Scenes at a Fire that Destroyed the Assembly Hall on Malcolm Island, B.C.-Mr. Sortell Fell Through a Floor into the Flames-A Brave Woman.

Vancouver, Feb. 3 .- Relentless fate seemed to pursue the Finnish colony of political refugees that is trying to estaolish a foothold in British Columbia, on Malcolm Island, under the guidance of Matti Kurrika, formerly publisher of of Matti Kurrika, formerly publisher of the Finnish newspaper Aika at Nanaimo. On Thursday last the worst in a long series of caiamities befell them. While a meeting of the men of the colony was in progress in the Assembly Hall fire broke out in the big three-story building, in the two lower floors of which were twenty-four living apartments. Nothing could check the flames, and in them eleven perished, seven were fatally injured and ten others painfully burned or injured by jumping from upper story injured and ten others painfully burned or injured by jumping from upper story windows to escape the flames. The majority of the children and many of the women are left with nothing but-their night garments, and many of the men have lost all but their working clothes. They have also lost all their household effects—beds, bedding, furnithre, etc. The survivors are now facing the inclement winter weather bereft of proper clothing, and their injured are without medicines or professional attendance, awaiting relief which is being sent by special steamer from Vancouver to-night.

There are others badly burned or injured, but they will probably recover. It was Mr. Kurrika, President of the colony, who detected the odor of smoke colony, who detected the odor of smoke

It was Mr. Kurrika, President of the colony, who detected the odor of smoke while the meeting was in progress. He adjourned the meeting without alarming those attending, and thus averted a panie. The fire had gained such headway that little could be done toward aiding the sleeping occupants to escape. Mrs. Orberg was sleeping in the room next the fire, which presumably originated from a wooden hot air shalt. She was awakened by what seemed to her a voice saying, "Awake, eternity is at hand!" She ran out in affright, and, though badly burned, her life was saved, but her two little daughters, five and six years old, were burned to death. Her husband was also badly burned in trying to fight his way in to save his trying to fight his way in to save his tamily.

TROOPS TO KHEP ORDER

Rioting at Waterbury, Conn., Must Cease.

Waterbury, Conn., Feb. 2.—Eight companies of the 1st Regiment Connec ticut National Guard and seven companies, including two local companies, of the 2nd Regiment, with two Gatling were called to Waterbury last night from Hartford, New Britain, Manchester and Rockville at the command of Gov. Chamberlain, because of the "impera-tive need occasioned by the rioting about the streets last night, coupled with threats of further disturbances towhich threats of further disturbances to-might." There was no repetition to-day of the violence of last night, but crowds congregated about the streets and had to be dispersed by the police, while there were rumors of an attack to be made on the car barn, where the nonunion motormen and conductors brought here by the Comecticut Railway & Electric Lighting Company are quartered. The troops were called out by the Governor after a conference at noon with Col. Burpee, attorney for the railroad company, General Manager Sewell of the railway company, Mayor Kilduff, the members of the Board of Public Safety and Sheriff Dunham of New Haven. No cars were run last evening after sunset, but during the day all the lines were operated as usual with the non-union trolley men. The cars were not molested. union motormen and conductors brought

not molested. Saturday night there was a general riot, Saturday night there was a general riot, Every car sent out from the barns was greeter with a volley of stones at various points, and no car escaped witifout broken windows. Thousands of people filled the streets, and the police were powerless to control the mob and were at length forced to require the Connecticut Electric & Lighting Company officials to call in their cars. The request was complied with, and the last car pulled into the barn at 11.15 escorted by the police. One motorman was injured so severely by a stone that a car starter had to take his place. Several other motormen and conductors were less seriously hurt.

MOROCCAN QUESTION.

France and Britain Might Have Settled It.

New York, Feb. 3.-The Times has the following from London:-The Times correspondent at Madrid says he under stands that M. Delcasse proposed to Lord Lansdowne last year that France and England settle the Moroccan ques tion in connection with the Egyptian question. France offered to recognize question. France offered to recognize England's position in Egypt if England would give France a free hand in Morocco except the North African coast line. The British Government, it is believed, was not unfavorably disposed toward the proposition, but the pressure of other questions postponed the pourparliers and the Pretender's rebellion has given the matter a different aspect.

Emigrants to Canada. London, Feb. 3.—There is a rush of emigrants to Canada, and it is believed by Canadian officials here that the stream of emigration will continue in great volume for a considerable period. In Lancashire, Yorkshire and the English midland counties a rapidly growing emigration movement is being guided with the ob-ject of forming an all-British colony near Battleford, in the Saskatchewan


