## **CROP REPORTS**

.

Bulletin From the Ontario Departpartment of Agriculture Speaks Favorably of Kent Crops

The following from Crop Bulletin, No. 89, from the Ontario Bureau of Industries, and published by the Ontario Department of Agricultura, will be of interest to the people of Kent. The information as published in the bulletin has been gathered from correspondents throughout the whole

bulletin has been gathered from correspondents throughout the whole of Ontario:

Fall Wheat,—The harvesting of this crop was begun rather later than usual in most sections, but the weather was favorable for cutting, and with the improved machinery now in use many had completed the work, and some had even threshed, before the 1st of August. The crop will be a hig one as regards the yield

be a hig one as regards the yield per acre, more especially in the Lake Eric counties.

Tobacco.—The growing of this crop is confined mainly to Essex and Kent. Although the plant suffered considerably from wet weather early in the season, it made good recovery, and its general condition was classed as good by most of those who reported on it. Early planting is in better condition than that put in later. There are a few complaints of cutworm.

Chatham, Kent: Sugar beets are gown extensively for Wallaceburg factory.

Harwich, Kent: In recent years we have been sowing fall wheat too early in order to escape the Hessian fly, which tends to make a late harrant and abrushes gowen

fly, which tends to make a late harvest and shrunken grain.

Camden, Kent: The cold, wet weather prevented fertilization by the bees, more especially in the case of plums and cherries.

Harwich, Kent: I think our apples are doomed in this section from scale.

MONEY IS THE RAGE.

"How are you doing?" asked one man of another in front of The Toronto Star office the other day. "Fine," was the reply. "I've made more money in the past year than I ever did before." And the Star was led to the following comment:

That was how he was doing. But did he really answer the question, which, after all, was an inquiry as to his welfare, his health, his peace of mind, his usefulness, his satisfaction in living? The question and the answer made to it recalls Hon. J. W. Longley's article in the current Canadian Magazine, in which he accuses Canadians of being wholly given over to money getting. "Is it not time," he asks, "to call a halt in this mad career of materialism and practicality, and once more ask if there is nothing in life but the building of homes, the acquisition of money, the creation of machinery, and an aggregation of bodily comforts? Is nothing to be counted of moment except that which can be weighed and handled? Are we to take no account of justice, courtesy, self-forgetfulness, courage, and heroism? Has humanity forever ceased to be enriched by the heroic sacrifices of martyrs? Is it to be forever a Gradgrind question as to who shall have the largest salary, who shall live in the biggest house, and whose name shall be paraded most in the papers?' Mr. Longley charges that in home, school, university, boys are taught to go forth and seek worldly success, and that public men sit with a telephone at each ear, waiting to go with the crowd, right or wrong. Unquestionably this is a money

making age. Nearly every man in Toronto is seeking to acquire more than he has, and the man who by nature is not acquisitive, but who would follow his ideals and live his own life, finds himself in time pinched and forced whether or no to join in and make what he can or lose even that with which he would be content. But what can be done about it? any people on earth can be excused for keeping practical and material considerations well to the front, it is Canadians, for we are few in numbers, with a great country to handle. Railroads, high roads, canals, ships, foundries, factories, the taking out of of timber, the clearing of the land for agriculture, the opening up of new regions for occupation-these are money-making undertakings for us to-day, but they are preparatory to the giving of homes to uneducated and hungry masses in Europe, who are to come to this part of the world. Perhaps this present passion for money-getting is the energizing influence that is needed to develope the resources of this new world and make it ready for the generation of to-morrow, who will need it. ## TELEPHONE TALKS.

## TO TELEPHONE USERS AND THE GENERAL PUBLIC,-

France has been described as an ideal field for the telephone, and with unlimited financial resources, a free hand in administration, and rates as stated in our last Talk, the service should be an ideal one. Let us review the practical results.

It is stated on undoubted authority that the Telephone Department is constantly striving to prevent an increase of subscribers, which would demand increased capital, and also to avoid a more general use of the service, which would require more assistants and increased facilities.

The service is exceedingly slow, so much so that business is generally greatly retarded thereby. When the administration is remonstrated with for delays, the reply is that the staff is much too small, and there is no remedy. An individual is powerless; he may not show his impatience over the wire without running the risk of future and greater delays, and possibly a summons before the Local Court for discourtesy to a functionary in his official capacity, a point on which French law is very strict.

It is stated that in a place near Paris conversation by telephone became absolutely impossible through interference from a trolly wire. The Government would not apply the very simple remedy of making the lines metallic until the subscribers advanced the funds necessary for the work. Numerous similar instances could be cited showing the disadvantages to the public of Government administration of the telephone service in France. So exasperated have the telephone users become that they have formed an Association for united protest, but so far with little effect.

It is sometimes stated that long distance rates are low in France, but it is overlooked that the Government has a system of "urgent call" rates, three times the ordinary rate and of necessity, the great bulk of the business goes through at the higher charge. Lines are limited and few people who have business which requires to be done by telephone can wait till others are served. Those who want the lower rate must wait until no one else wants the line.

France, the ideal field of the telephone, is not only poorly served and charged high rates under Government control, but development is practically prohibited.

Canada has little to learn regarding te ephone service from the system of Government operation in France.

During the last few weeks there has been a revival of Jew baiting in var-ious parts of Russia, says a St. Peters burg correspondent, and particularly in the western Provinces bordering on Germany and Austria—that is, in those parts of the Russian Empire which ought to be most accessible to

which ought to be most accessible to western culture and civilization. These anti-Semitic outbreaks have not received adequate attention in the newspaper press of Russia or of other countries. Laconic official reports is sued in St. Petersburg and communicated by cable to other parts of the world have supplied merely the bar est hint of ghastly horrors which would shock the conscience of the civilized world if they were fully known and understood.

known and understool.
Since the Russian Easter—that is, the end of April, according to our calendar—there have been anti-Semitic riots in a score of Russian towns and in about fifty Russian villages. In the course of these riots more than 500 Jews were killed and approximaely 10,000 wounded. In addition to these casualties it has been ascertaind that more than 1,000 Jewish women

were outraged.
Several hundred houses belonging Several hundred houses belonging to Jews were demolished and razed. Five hundred shops belonging to Jews were sacked and 1,000 dwellings inhabited by Jews were looted. These figures, however, terrible as is the tale which they tell, do not convey an adequate impression of the horrors which were enacted by the bloodthirsty mobs of finatical Jew baiters.

One of the worst features of this concerted outbreak of anti-Semitism in different parts of the country was the official support which was given to the anti-Jewish agitation. Those who are well informed regarding the course of political events behind the course of political events behind the course of political events behind the cene in Russia ascribe this official support of violent anti-Semitism te



Gen. Trepoff who, although nominally nothing more than Governor-General of St. Petersburge is really the most sowerful man in Russia. Gen. Trepoff considers that it is good policy on the part of the Russian Government to encourage active Jew baiting among he Russian people in order to with-graw popular attention from domestic affairs and from the collapse of the Russian army and navy in the far

Gen. Trepost believes that if the Russian populace, so to speak, lets off steam by massacring and bludgeoning the Jews they will be less inclined to be discontented with the conduct of the war and with the domestic policy of the Government. Consequently, Gen. Trepost has exerted all his influence In favor of violent anti-Semitism, and it has been proved beyond doubt that the recent outbreaks in the western Provinces of the Russian Empire were Instigated by agitators who came from St. Petersburg and were actively sup-ported by the local authorities. One of the worst outbreaks took place

St. Petersburg and were actively supported by the local authorties.

One of the worst outbreaks took place at Jitomir, the capital of the Province of Volhynia. About three weeks before the anti-Jewish riots began, six strangers arrived from St. Petersburg and began to prepare the ground for the accomplishment of their blood-thirsty design. They waited on the Orthodox Greek Archbishop of Jitomir and made representations to him regarding the evil influence which the Jews exercised over the Russian nation. They declared that the Government had proofs that the Jews all over Russia were the sworn enemies of the Orthodox Greek church and were scheming not only to everthrow absolute Government but also to bing about the confiscation of the vast wealth of the state church for the relief of taxpayers.

They reminded the Archbishop that the procurator of the holy synod. Pobledonostzeff, is a confirmed anti-Semite and frequently has given his support to anti-Semitic outbreaks. They persuaded the Archbishop to look with favor on Jew baiting, and in the course of a few days they had contrived to convince his eminence that it would be most advantageous if the Jews of Jitomir were severely chastised for their revolutionary and irreligious opinions.

These agitators from the capital also put themselves in communication with the general commanding the Eleventh Russian army corps, whose headquarters are at Jitomir. They worked on him by means of similar arguments, and experienced little difficulty in obtaining from him a promise that his troops should not interfere to protect the Jews if an outbreak should take place.

Popular feeling against the Jews was worked up in a variety of ways. Thousands of pamphlets were circulated, in which statements were printed to the effect that the Jews were blood suckers and traitors and primarily responsible for all the troubles of the

Russian nation. Strong anti-Semitic articles were launched into the local newspapers, and the local priests were induced to preach sermons advocating

violence against the Jews.

Local agitators were hired at a price of one ruble (20 cents) a day to go about among the masses of the common people and to stir popular feeling against the Israelites up to the boiling point. After these preliminary preparations had been completed the agitators, with the help of local anti-Semites, organized a systematic plan, which was put inte execution on lines similar to those fellowed on former occasions with such terrible success at Kisheneff, Homel, and other places.

The beginning of the Jewish Sabbath, Friday evening, was chosen for violence against the Jews.

bath, Friday evening, was chosen for the beginning of the outbreak. At sun-set all the Jews of Jitomir who are strictly orthodox close their shops and withdraw from their ordinary occupa tions to observe the Sabbath until suntions to observe the sabbath until sub-set on Saturday. On this particular Friday evening about 3,000 Jews had assembled in the largest synagogue of the city and 2,000 Jews had assembled in another large synago-

Shortly before sunset a dangerous rabble, collected by the anti-Semitic agitators, began to assemble at several points outside the city and at several points outside the city and at several points outside the city in order to al points outside the city and at sever-al places within the city in order to march by converging routes against the Ghetto, which is a separate quar-ter of the town. This rabble consisted of peasants from the surrounding vil-lages and of the soum of the urban population, which is always ready for riot and plunder. It was divided into ten different bands and numbered was then 7000 men.

riot and plunder. It was divided into the different bands and numbered mere than 7,000 men.

The large synagogue was the first object of their attack. First of all the sacred building was surrounded in order to prevent the escape of the wershipers. The leaders of the mob then hammered on the doors, which are kept locked during divine service, and demanded admittance. Their heavy blows on the door alarmed the congregation, and men and women allike abandoned their devotion to gaze terrer stricken in the direction from which the noise came. Taeir suspense did not last long. Finding that the door would not be opened voluntarily, the mob rammed it and broke into the synagogue without much difficulty. With a yell of triumph the dangerous rabble invaded the synagogue and began to attack the Jews.

gan to attack the Jews.

Every man in the mob was armed Every man in the mob was armed with a thick stick, while a number had come provided with knouts and a few were armed with revolvers. As the assailants poured in through the main entrance the Jews in the synagogue sought to escape by four other exits, where they were met by the remainder of the mob and driven back into the building. The invading force struck their victims with their heavy sticks, regardless of consequences. Houghle scenes were witnessed during this attack. A group of Jew baiters headed for the altar and be labored the chief rabba until he was beaten to a pulp of unrecognizable flesh and bones. The junior rabbis whe were assisting him to conduct divine service were likewise beaten to death. In the body of the synagogue men and women alike were knocked down and

were assisting him to contact driving service were likewise beaten to death. In the body of the synagogue men and women alike were knocked down and trampled under foot by the infuriated mob. A venerable gray haired Jew 85 years of age, stood near a pillar calmly awaiting his fate. When a number of assailants approached him he appealed to them to stop the bloodshed before they were burdened with the guilt of too many innocent lives. A terrific blow on the head smashed his skull, so that he fell dead on the spot. Many similar scenes were enacted. Then the mob turned their attention to the homes of the Jews, which they feeted after having killed or wounded their inmates.

Victoria Falls, Zambesi River, East Africa, Sept. 13.—The bridge over the Zambesi River was formally opened yesterday in the presence of the visit-ing members of the British associa-tion. Prof. Darwin made the opening speech.

Darwin touched an electric button which fused a wire stretched across the track of the bridge, and an engine decorated with Union Jacks passed

over.

The party then proceeded on an excursion to Livingstone Island.

The falls are situated 1,631 miles by rail from Cape Town on the south, and

950 miles from Beira on the east coast The falls are about three times the depth of Niagara Falls and are described as being the greatest in the

scribed as being the greatest in the world.

The total length is 650 feet, made up of a main span of 500 feet from centre to centre of the bearing pins and two side spans. The principal span is in the form of an arch with a true parabolic curve, and was built as a cantilever from each bank. At the southern end there is an ordinary lattice girder span from the bank to the end posts of the arch of 37 feet 6 inches in length, while on the northern side there is a corresponding girder span of 62 feet 6 inches. The width at the springing of the arch is 53 feet 9 inches between centres of booms, at the top 27 feet 6 inches, and between parapets 30 feet. The total weight of steel in the bridge is 1,650 tons, and its approximate cost including erection, was £70,000

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Turns the First Sod of G. T. P. With Golden Spade
-Cheers For Premier.

Fort William, Sept. 12.—Yesterday fully 10,000 people were taken to West Fort William, where within a stone's throw of the spot where the first sod of the C. P. R. was turned thirty years ago, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, with a golden shovel, turned the first sod of Canada's second transcontinental railway.

Mayor Rutledge read an address of elcome to the Premier, which ollowed by an address from the Board of Trade. Other speeches were made by Dr. Hamilton, Dr. Smellie, M. P. P.; Géo. A. Graham, Joshua Dyke and R. A. Knowiton. When Sir Wilfrid step-ped to the front of an open-air plat-

form the crowd sent up cheer after cheer. He thanked his stars, he said, that he had been permitted to take part in this ceremony. He remembered the words of fifty years ago: "All aboard for the west!" He would now say "All aboard for the vaster west! All aboard for the land of the prairie and its vast acres of wheat! All aboard for the Rocky Mountains with its untold minerals!"

He referred to the great country to He referred to the great country to be opened by this new road, and then spoke of Fort William as the coming Chicago of the north. He had years ago referred to Ottawa as the Washington of the north. He knew that but a few years were left for him now, but hoped to live long enough to see accomplished the great work of making this place the important centre it is destined to be

this place the important centre it is destined to be.

He spoke of the present Government's work along the line of reducing wheat rates because of railway building, and intimated that when the Government of the control of the contr ernment will have built this railway that they will not fold their arms, by would be alive to the duty of the hour, and another road might. be necessary.

Speaking of the new Provinces, he paid a high tribute to the American

immigrants as the best class of set-tlers. He said: "Welcome to all new settlers—welcome to all as fellow citi-zens—welcome to all citizens of the King."


The Flight of a Swallow.





St. Petersburg, Sept. 13.—A holy war has been proclaimed in the Caucasian districts of Zangezur and Jebrall, where the Tartars are massacring the Armenians without distinction of sex

Tokio, Sept. 13.—The Japanese battleship Mikasa, which was the flagship of Vice-Admiral Togo during the battle of the Sea of Japan, caught fire and sank at 2.30 a. m. Monday.

Admiral Togo was not on board the Mikasa when the disaster to the battleship occurred.

The loss of life by the sinking of the battleship totals 599 officers and men, including detachments from other warships which went to the rescue of the vessel.

Naphtha firms are cut off from the delivery of oil fuel to the shipping companies, who are now confronted with the necessity for suspending their services and discharging their employes, which would result in leaving thousands with no means of subsistence.

The salt works at Baskunchak have been obliged to close owing to the scarcity of fuel and this will paralyze the fishing industry.

Social Democrats Shot Down.

Tiflis, Caucasia, Sept. 13.—A hundred Social Democrats were killed or wounded yesterday in a conflict with Cossacks at the Town Hall, and many were trampled to death in a subsequent panic.

Two thousand Social Democrats had forced an entrance into the Town Hall.

forced an entrance into the Town Hall. Revolutionary speeches were made and the chief of police ordered the meet-ing to disperse. Part of those present obeyed, but the remainder refused, and

obeyed, but the remainder refused, and some revolvers were fired,
A large force of Cossacks drawn up outside the building then fired repeated volleys into the crowd, killing thirty and wounding upwards of seventy. In the ensuing panic many persons fell and were trampled to death by their comrades and the pursuing Cossacks.

M. Witte Has Sailed.

New York, Sept. 13.—The Russian commissioners, who successfully concluded a treaty of peace with the envoys of Japan at Portsmouth, started on the return to St. Petersburg yesterday.

Baron Komura was unable to see the Russians because of his illness, but through Minister Takahira he sent them a cordial message of farewell.
