

#### IMMIGRATION QUESTION.

J. T. Dansford, editor of the Bridgewater Mercury and Somerset County Gazette, an English paper, is now in Canada to see the country, and has been giving some of his impressions to the Toronto He says the country districts of England are being denuded of young men, so much so that the outlook has become gloomy indeed. He says that if Canada could only take the surplus from the overcrowded cities it would be a positive benefit to Great Britain. But such immigrants are not wanted in Canada, unless they can adapt themselves to farm life. Ontario is being depopulated also by the emigration to the Northwest, and we need the rural workers to take their places. Mr. Dunsford also questioned if the money now expended in securing further immigrants from Brittain would not be better used in caring more generously for the newcomers to the country, and leaving their success or failure less to chance. There may be some force in this suggestion, but it is not to be expected that the Laurier Government, having given \$5 a head to a sham immigration agency for European immigrants, can afford to spend money to retain population already of Canadian soil.

When the new fall wheat was reported on in November, it was described as having had a good start at seeding time, and the only fear then expressed was that the young plants had perhaps too much head. The remarkably open winter, affording little or no covering of snow most of the time, and changes of temperature varying from extremely mild conditions to intense cold, led growers of fall wheat to fear the outcome. The cold, dry, and generally backward spring was also unfavorable. However, the general situation in the third week of May may be described as better than was expected, although reports vary greatly in describing the condition of the fields. Some reports are enthusiastic, while others from the same district speak of failure more or less marked. High lands did well compared with flat or low-lying places, and rich, sharp, well-drained soils also prospered. Fields sown early did much better than those got in later, and wheat sown on sod was markedly ahead of that grown on stubble land. A considerable area at scattered points will be plowed up and resown to other crops, but in many cases barley will be drilled into the "patchy" spots. The presence of the wire-worm was pointed out by a number of correspondents, but no serious injury was reported from that or other insects. The most favorable reports, relatively, regarding fall wheat, come from Lake Erie and Lake Ontario counties.

The public debt during the past year has increased five million dollars, and a deficit of \$800,000 is expected for the coming fiscal year (nine months), ending March 31, 1907.



Ottawa, May 23.—Yesterday W. T. R. Preston handed to the press copies of correspondence marked "private and confidential," glving some history of the Leopoid Labor Bureau incident. These letters were written by Preston to John Ennis, general manager of the Allan Line at Liverpool, and in some manner fell into the hands of parties not friend-

Preston.
Preston, examined by Hon. Sydney Fisher, said that most of the European countries have very strict laws respecting emigration, and public regulations were most arbitrary. The booking agents are licensed, and have to put up deposits with the Governments that are liable to forfeiture. In Scandinavia it was not even permitted to circulate printed matter over a booking agent's counter. A British consul in Scandinavia had been heavily fined for what looked like a very trivial offence. Mr. Preston alluded to the operation of what is known as the North Atlantic Steamship conference, and declared that this combination of steamehip companies gave much more favorable rate to Argentine than to the United States or Canada, although the latter were not

half as far distant.
