

ACADIA COLLEGE.

ADMISSION MATRICULATION.

Candidates for matriculation, besides an acquaintance with the ordinary branches of English Education, must be thoroughly acquainted with the rudiments of Algebra, as contained in Davie's Bourdon, as far as Quadratic Equations.

They must also be well acquainted with the Latin and Greek Grammar, and be able to translate and parse accurately at least in one book of the Æneid of Virgil, one of the Orations of Cicero and any part of Jacob's Greek Reader.

Lectures on Animal Physiology will also be given in the early part of the course.

Evidences of Christianity will be comprised in the course in Moral Science.

Persons desirous of attending the recitations of particular departments, are allowed to do so, provided they have the requisite preparation for the studies of those departments, and become subject to the laws of the University so far as required by the College Authorities.

THE THEOLOGICAL INSTITUTE.

The Course of Instruction embraces the following studies:—

- 1. The Hebrew Language and Literature.
- The principles of Biblical Criticism and Interpretation, illustrated and applied in exegetical exercises on portions of the Hebrew and Greek Scriptures.
- 3. Theology in its various branches.
- Ecclesiastical History, with special regard to the christianity of the first five centuries, the Reformation from Popery, and the rise and progress of the Baptist Denomination.
- Ministerial and Pastoral Duties in a series of Lectures.
- The composition of Sermons. Students in the Theological Institute are required to furnish written sermons or skeletons of sermons, and essays on theological subjects, during the whole course.

Candidates for the ministry, who are not members of the College, may enter the Theological Institute, with this proviso, that they will be subject to all the regulations of government and discipline which may be in force in the College at the time.

It is desirable that students in the Theological Institute be recognized by the Churches to which they belong as suitable candidates for the ministerial office.

LIBRARY AND READING ROOM.

The Library of the College now placed in a large commodious room, furnished also with newspapers and magazines as a Reading Room, is accessible under proper regulations to members of the College and Academy.

The College is provided with proper Apparatus for Experiments in Natural Philosophy, Chemistry, Surveying, &c. Also, a commodious Cabinet well furnished with contributions from various parts of the World, illustrative of the departments of Geology and Mineralogy, in which the rich deposits of Nova Scotia bear a conspicuous place.

EXAMINATIONS.

First,—Of all the classes twice in each term on the studies of each half term.

Secondly,—Of all candidates for the degree of A. B. on the studies of the whole course.

ANNIVERSARY.

A public anniversary is held in the month of June in every year, when Candidates for Degrees deliver public exercises; addresses or essays may be given by persons connected with the College, or otherwise selected for this purpose; a meeting of the Governors takes place; and Degrees are conferred.

Exhibitions of original compositions are also given publicly at the close of the summer term.

TERMS.

The First Term commences on the 1st of September in each year, and ends on the 20th of December.

The Second Term commences on the 20th of January, and ends on the 20th June.

VACATIONS.

First of one Month from 20th December to 20th January. Second of about two months, from the 20th June to the first of September.

EXPENSES.

Board is provided by the College Steward for 9s. 6d. per week, in which is included washing and the necessary care of the Studies and Bed Rooms.

ROOMS.

Apartments containing each a Study and Bed Room are provided by the College for which a term is paid by each occupant towards a fund for the general repairs of the College Buildings.

The number accommodated in one apartment is limited to two, or at the utmost to three.

SCHOLARSHIPS.

There is no charge of tuition to students entered on the foundation of a scholarship in the Endowment fund.

In other cases, tuition is £6 per annum, or at that rate per term.

MORAL AND RELIGIOUS GUARDIANSHIP.

The utmost care is designed to be taken in the education of the Students to promote their moral and religious, as well as intellectual culture.

All members of the College are expected to attend public worship regularly on the Sabbath; and parents and guardians are requested to give instruction as to the place of worship they wish the Students under their care to attend.

N. B. Parents and Guardians are requested to give precise information as to the amount of credit (if any) they chuse their sons or wards, under age, to incur in their expenses; and such credits will only be allowed on express permission in writing by the President.

HORTON ACADEMY.

The course of Instruction cubraces Orthography, Reading, Penmanship, English Grammar, Mental and Written Arithmetic, Geography and the Use of the Globes, Mensuration. Algebra, Geometry, Land Surveying, Navigation, Chemistry, Natural Philosophy, Physiology, Ancient and Modern History, Agricultural Chemistry, English Composition and Declamation, Latin, Greek, and French.

The Academical Year, which consists of forty-four weeks, is divided into two Terms; One, of twenty-four weeks commencing on the 3d January and ending on the 20th of June. The other, of twenty weeks commencing on the 1st of August and ending on the 20th of Dec'r.

There are consequently two Vacations, One of six weeks extending from 20th of June to the 1st August. The other a fortnight from 20th of December to 2d of January.

It is exceedingly desirable that all pupils be present at the commencement of each Term if practicable.

LIBRARY.

In addition to the College Library to which the elder pupils of the Academy have access under certain Regulations there is also a valuable selection of Books for the exclusive use of the Academy.

Board and Washing are furnished at 8s. 6d. per week. N. B. Boarders are required to provide their own beds, bedding, and towels.

The fees for tuition vary—according to the branches taught—from £2 10s. to £5 per annum, payable every quarter or half term. Fuel 2s. 6d. per Term.

It is desirable that Junior pupils be allowed pocket money but sparingly, and that to be given out to them from time to time by the Principal or some other friend as may be directed by the Parents or Guardian.

Strict attention is paid to the comfort of the Boarders and to the Mental and Moral Improvement of the pupils generally.
