We shall follow Him now through the remainder of His life on earth, and to the wonderful day when He went up to heaven from amongst His disciples, and a bright cloud received Him out of their sight.

The present Quarter's Lessons contain some of the most delightful stories of that beautiful life that Jesus led here among men.

The very first Lesson tells what is one of the sweetest stories ever told—how, when the mothers brought their little children to Jesus one day, and the disciples, who were kind enough men in their way, but did not know how much Jesus loved the little ones, told the mothers not to trouble Him with them, He spoke sharply to the disciples, and said: "Don't drive them away. Suffer the little children to come unto Me: for of such is the kingdom of God." Wouldn't you have dearly loved to have been one of those little children that day, when He took them up in His arms and put His hands upon them and blessed them?

Another story is of His choosing out seventy men from among His followers and sending them into the cities and villages where He himself was soon to come. They would find many who would wish to do them harm because they hated Jesus; but He said to the seventy messengers: "Do not be afraid. Go and heal the sick wherever you find them, and tell the people that I am coming to teach and help. The seventy were very brave and faithful men and so they did as Jesus told them,—as we all ought to do.

It will be a delight, Sunday by Sunday, to walk with Jesus and listen to His words and to see the wonderful things that He did. He will come to seem like some friend whom you know and love very well; for we cannot be long with Jesus without coming to love Him dearly, and to want to help Him in the work that He came into the world to do.

Opportunities for Service

For the child's own sake, it is necessary that he should consciously work for the cause of Christ. In most cases this must be planned out for him and suggested to him.

Children will be doing something all the time. Right doing is more attractive to them than wrong. They cannot be engaged in both right and wrong at the same time, so that to keep them busy in right doing has a double value, as it also acts as a preventive to wrong.

The watchful mother will find abundant opportunity for little acts of kindness and

charity that her child may perform, which no outsider could point out or prepare for. Each in her own environment must find this particular work for herself. A few general suggestions may be given.

The children may carry Sunday School papers to sick friends, or to those who for any reason cannot attend Sunday School. They need not always get extra papers for this, but take good care of their own and give that, after it has been read to them.

When these papers are not given away weekly, let each child have a special place in which to keep them, and on days when they have to stay indoors, they can sew four or six together, thus making little books for the hospital, the mission box, or for poor children. Suitable pictures may be cut out of old magazines, etc., and mounted on strong paper or cambric, for the same purpose.

Picture postcards which the grown-ups do not desire to keep, may be saved for the children. These can have the written-on sides glued together in pairs, with a tape or string between for a hanger, and afterwards carried or sent where they may help to brighten some life.

The children should be encouraged to sing the hymns they know, and repeat their texts when asked, without making a fuss over it, especially for old eople or the shut-ins.

They may be allowed to take flowers to the sick, and where possible, tend their growth for this very purpose. Let them save the crumbs after meals and feed the birds. Emphasize the necessity of this in the winter-time, when the ground is covered with snow.

Let them find out children who do not go to Sunday School, and invite them to go with them.

Some children have great numbers of toys. Let these be shared with those who hav few or none.

Occasionally have the children go with you when you take food or clothing to the poor; and if they are willing to do so, let them give up dessert or some other luxury once in a while, to see someone else enjoy it.

Have them help in the packing of Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets. Children who can write, might send letters to shut-in children, especially to those who would not be likely to get a letter otherwise.

Each child must be taught that there is work for him to do—his own work which, if he neglects, may remain undone for ever.

Just a word of warning in closing. It is possible to do a good thing in a bad way, and we may, if not careful, over-stimulate the children, and give them the idea that they are universal helpers and general philanthropists. This would be specially injurious to some dispositions, so let whatever is done, be done as unostentatiously as possible; but at the same time, the children must be interested, and experience pleasure in the doing, or there will be no desire on their part to continue in the work.

In An Eskimo School

Dr. S. K. Hutton, in Among the Eskimos of Labrador, gives the following account of a visit to a school in that country:

"I walked in one day at Okak, when

Benjamin was drilling arithmetic into the heads of a score of bright-eyed little Eskimos, and the picture of that Eskimo school class is one of the most vivid of my many pictures of Labrador life.

"'What is four times four?' said Benjamin. The little eyes stared, and the little mouths opened, and the little fingers began to count under the shadow of the desk. Benjamin made it easier. 'I saw four sledges,' he said. There was a general heave of interest: Benjamin was going to tell them a story. They shuffled their feet and elbows, and settled down to listen. 'I saw four sledges; they were coming round the bend from the sealing-place. Each sledge had four dogs to pull it. How many dogs were there, gathered all together?'

"That made thinking easy; the little brains had got something familiar to work upon; there was a picture of sledges in their minds, and like a flash came the answer, 'Sixteen dogs—they are sixteen.' 'Yes,' said Benjamin, 'four times four makes sixteen; don't forget.' The little faces were serious again; it was not much of a story, after all; but they had learned something without expecting it. Wise man, Benjamin; he was an Eskimo child himself once, and has had a careful training from the missionaries; he has learnt to present things in a way that the Eskimo mind can grasp.

"After a few more exercises with the tablebook, I saw the little eyes becoming restless; thoughts were beginning to wander, and Benjamin called for a change. Shockheaded little Moses fetched the books out of the cupboard, and handed them round, and the chubby faces brightened again.

"Benjamin announced a psalm, and the little fingers grew busy as they turned the pages, and then I saw first one boy and then another stand up to spell through a verse. It was really wonderful to watch the eager way in which they pursued the alarming strings of letters that strotched from margin to margin, and gathered them into syllables under Benjamin's guidance, and made out the proper meaning. When the psalm was finished, Moses collected the books; then the children sang a hymn and ran out to romp in the snow."

FOR PRIMARY CLASSES OR THE HOME LESSON

I. SINGING.

II. RESPONSIVE EXERCISE.

(A pretty Certificate in colors is awarded for the correct recitation of all the verses in the List of Passages For Those Under Six; and a larger Certificate for the correct recitation of the complete List of Passages For Those Under Eleven.)

VII. SINGING. Hymn 596, Book of Praise, vs. 1, 2. (These are the first two verses of the Supplemental Hymn for the Half Year. The verses should be learned one by one. As the little ones sing them Sunday after Sunday, they will soon come to know them by heart.)

VIII. THE QUESTION ON MISSIONS FOR THE DAY. (See each Lesson.) The very little ones will not be expected to learn this by heart, but it may be repeated several times over, and any needed explanation given.

IX. BRIEF BIRTHDAY SERVICE. Ask those children who have had a birthday during the week to come to the front when a card may be presented and an offering (usually one cent for each year) received if desirable. Then all join in singing:

"Another happy birthday to some of us is given,

Then let us thank the Father for all His gifts from heaven. Oh, be His love and mercy to these dear children near, And keep them safe and happy through this and every year."

Jesus was glad that the story had been made known in so many sad homes. Then He prayed and thanked God just as He always did when He was glad.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Jesus said: "Thou hast answered right. If thou doest these things, thou wilt be worthy to enter the kingdom of heaven."

The man said, "Who is my neighbor, Master?" Then Jesus told this story:

Once there was a traveler going from Jerusalem to Jericho. It was not a safe road for travelers. Robbers and highwaymen hid themselves, ready to rush out upon people who tried to pass by.

As the man journeyed along, a band of thieves sprang upon him. They stole his clothing. They beat him and wounded him and left him half dead. After a while a priest chanced to pass that way. He saw the man, but did not go to help him. He passed by on the other side and went his way.

By and by a Levite, one whose work was to help the priests, passed along. He, too, saw the wounded man, but he did not want to soil his garments. He, also, passed by without giving help.

Not long after a Samaritan, one of a people whom the Jews bitterly hated, drew near. He went to the suffering man. His heart was filled with pity. He poured oil and wine into the wounds and bound them up. He lifted the man upon the beast which he himself had been riding and took him to the inn and cared for him.

In the morning he took money from his bag and gave it to the innkeeper. He said: "Take care of the stranger. Spend this money for his good. If thou needest still more, spend and I will repay thee when I come again."

THE LESSON RETOLD

The floor of the house was swept. The upper room, the best in the house, was made ready. The water jars were filled. The food was prepared.

The sister Martha thought, "Everything must be done to make our guest happy," so she still worked over the household duties. She worked till she was tired; she was too tired to be sweet and pleasant. She was too

weary even to listen to the lessons that Jesus was teaching.

When she saw her sister Mary sitting at the feet of Jesus, she thought to herself: "Mary is not doing her share of the work!"

She drew near to Jesus and exclaimed: "Lord, dost Thou not care that my sister hath left me to serve alone? bid her therefore that she help me."



THE LESSON RETOLD

- One day Jesus kneeled down to pray to His heavenly Father, and the disciples saw Him. He talked as a little child to a loving father. He asked for what He wanted just as a child asks when He wants something very much. The disciples watched; then they said, "Lord, teach us to pray."

Jesus said: "God is your heavenly Father. You know how glad an earthly father is to give. If a child should ask his earthly father for bread, he would not give him a stone. If a child should ask for a fish, he would not give him a serpent. If a child should ask for an egg, his father would not give him a scorpion. An earthly father is happy to give. How much more does the heavenly Father love to give good gifts to his children!

"What would you think of a neighbor so unfriendly that he would not lend you bread even though you went at midnight to ask for it? It would be a very unfriendly neighbor who would say, 'Trouble me not; the door is now shut, and my children are with me in bed; I cannot rise and give thee.' Why, even if, at first he were unwilling to get up and get the bread for you, yet when you kept on asking for it, I say that he would rise and give as many loaves as were needed."

Then Jesus said, "Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you." After that day the disciples tried to speak to God

n the way that He likes best to have them speak to Him.

For, Jesus went on to say, if a son should ask his earthly father for bread, surely the father would not give him a stone, or if he should ask a fish or an egg, the father would not give him a serpent or a scorpion. Much more, then, would the heavenly Father be willing to give good things to His children.

The prayer that Jesus taught that day is the one that we so often say in our own Sunday School. It is prayed by little people and big. It is prayed in churches and homes. It is prayed by the side of the bed at night.

THE PRAYER THAT JESUS TAUGHT

Our Father which art in heaven, hallowed be Thy name. Thy kirgdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil: for Thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever. Amen.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Over in the land where Jesus lived there was a certain poor man whose life was full of darkness and trouble. He was blind, so that night and day were the same to him. He could not speak his needs, for he was dumb. People said he had an evil spirit, for in those days it was thought that all kinds of sickness were caused by evil spirits which Satan sent into the world to do his wicked work.

But one day the man's friends led him to Jesus. Jesus' kind eyes filled with pity. He healed the man and made him quite well. He could both speak and see

Of course the people who stood round were filled with wonder. Many began to love Jesus and to want to follow Him.

But skulking round the crowd were some men with dark, evil faces. They were the scribes and Pharisees, who had not a spark of love for Jesus.

Some of these men had come all the way from Jerusalem to make trouble for Him. They said: "His ways are not like our ways. He teaches a different way to reach heaven. He tells that our way of praying is wrong."

Then these men said: "Let us watch Him. If He breaks the law, we will tell the high priest. We will have Him put in prison. That will put a stop to His dangerous talk. The common people are listening too much to His stories."

So these evil men watched Jesus. When they saw the poor man happy and well, their faces grew still darker with anger. They exclaimed: "Ah! We know who helped Jesus do this thing! He had help from Satan!" The wicked men tried to make the people believe that God's Son received help from Satan!

Jesus was not afraid of the scribes and Pharisees. He called them to Him and said: "If I had help from Satan, would I want to cast his servant out of this man? Could I be both for Satan and against him? A strong man fully armed can keep his house in safety until a stronger man comes who is able to disarm him and take his possessions. Jesus meant that He Himself was stronger than Satan and could overcome the evil one.

Jesus told His hearers also, that every one must either be on His side or be fighting against Him. He wanted every one to choose His side and help Him to destroy everything in the world that is evil.

Another thing which Jesus taught was, that the only sure way to keep evilout of the heart and life is to fill them with what is good. If the heart is full of good thoughts and the hands are busy doing good deeds, Satan will have no chance to get in anything that is evil.

Jesus proved how wicked were the minds of the scribes and Pharisees. He said, "Unless you ask to be forgiven, you surely will be punished."

He urged them to drive evil and darkness out of their hearts. He told them to make their lives so pure and good that they would shine like a candle in the dark.



THE LESSON RETOLD

One day a man invited Jesus to dine with him. It was a strange invitation, because the man who gave it did not really love Jesus. He was one of the Pharisees.

This Pharisee asked Jesus to come to his house because he wanted to watch Jesus. He wanted to ask Jesus questions. He wanted to make Him trouble, if he could.

The Pharisees had many evil ways, and believed many false and foolish things. They thought themselves better, holier and cleaner than other people round about them. They called people sinners who did not think as they thought.

When a Pharisee brought his gifts to God's house, he wanted every one to see him. It was as if he said: "I am better than thou art! See what I am giving!"

When a Pharisee made ready for a meal, he did it in a strange way. A pitcher and basin were brought. The water was poured over the hands so that it fell in a certain direction.

But these men did not care whether or not their hearts were clean. The heavenly Father wishes His earth-children to make their hearts and lives clean and pure. But this the Pharisees did not do.

The table was prepared. The food was ready to eat. But when Jesus made ready for the meal, He did not wash His hands just as the Pharisee did. The man looked in wonder.

Jesus was not afraid to speak. He said : "Ye Pharisees make clean the outside, but the inside is dark and soiled with sin. Sin does not trouble you."

Then He said: "Woe unto you, Pharisees, who take the best for yourselves! Woe unto you, Pharisees, who make long prayers in the markets and on street corners! You pray just to be heard and seen. Woe unto you, Pharisees, who pretend to be good when you are not! Woe unto you who rob the poor and live at ease on what you take from them !"

And so Jesus showed those men how much He cared for a clean heart and a clean life. He showed them how He disapproved of those who try to pretend they are good when they are not.

Luke 12: 1-12—Memory Verses, 8, 9.

Golden Text—Every one who shall confess me before men, him shall the Son of man also confess before the angels of God.—Luke 12:8 (Rev. Ver.).



1 In the mean time, when there were gathered together an innumerable multitude of people, insomuch that they trode one upon another, he began to say unto his disciples first of all, Beware ye of the leaven of the Phar'isees, which is hypocrisy.

2 For there is nothing covered, that shall not be revealed; neither hid, that shall not

be known.

3 Therefore whatsoever ye have spoken in darkness shall be heard in the light; and that which ye have spoken in the ear in closets shall be proclaimed upon the housetops.

4 And I say unto you my friends, Be not afraid of them that kill the body, and after that have no more that they can do.

5 But I will forewarn you whom ye shall fear: Fear him, which after he hath killed hath power to cast into hell; yea, I say unto you, Fear him.

6 Are not five sparrows sold for two farthings, and not one of them is forgotten

before God?

7 But even the very hairs of your head are all numbered. Fear not therefore: ye are of more value than many sparrows.

8 Also I say unto you, Whosoever shall confess me before men, him shall the Son of man also confess before the angels of God:

9 But he that denieth me before men shall be denied before the angels of God.

10 And whosoever shall speak a word against the Son of man, it shall be forgiven him: but unto him that blasphemeth against the Holy Ghost it shall not be forgiven.

11 And when they bring you unto the synagogues, and unto magistrates, and powers, take ye no thought how or what thing ye shall answer, or what ye shall say:

12 For the Holy Ghost shall teach you in the same hour what ye ought to say.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Jesus' enemies crowded about Him, but He was not afraid. He came from the heavenly home to do a brave thing. He came to fight the evil that Satan had brought here.

Now the Pharisees, as we know, were the bitter enemies of Jesus. But He was not afraid to speak out against them. He warned His disciples not to be like them, for they were hypocrites, that is, they pretended to be very good, while they hid in their hearts all kinds of evil thoughts and did many wicked deeds.

Jesus also said to His disciples: "Be not afraid of them that kill the body, and after that can do no more. But I tell you whom ye shall fear. Fear God who hath power to keep you in strength and happiness.

"God, your heavenly Father is watching you. He loves you and He will help you. For He takes care of the sparrows, the commonest and least valued of birds. And if He does this, it is certain that He will take care of you, who are His own dear children. Even the very hairs of your head are numbered.

"Whoever is brave enough to stand up for Me and for the right before men, I will own before the heavenly Father." Jesus was here speaking of the time when He should come again from heaven, like a great and glorious king, with a train of bright angels attending Him. Then all the people in the world would be gathered together before Him and He would judge them all according to what they had done in their lives.

Jesus knew that His followers would have to suffer many things. They would be brought before rulers and judges to be punished for doing His work. He told them not to be troubled or anxious about what they should say to their enemies. For the Holy Spirit would tell them what they should say in every time of need. And so Jesus taught His followers how to fight a brave, good fight against evil, the kind of fight you, too, will want to make. Will you try to be brave as a soldier? Try to win battles over wrong?

Lesson Story

One day Naughty Neighbor Boy came to visit Jack and Phil in the happy play room. He soon grew tired of little Jack's toys and even Phil's new birthday book. He laughed at sister's dolls and tossed them on the floor.

Then he said: "This room is a stupid place! Come over to our barn and have some fun! I've got a trained dog and some rabbits and a rope to walk and—we'll have a circus!"

Phil's eyes began to sparkle, and baby left his toys. Big Brother had been reading, but he heard. He knew that the barn was cold. Only last week baby and sister had been so ill with sore throats that the doctor had been to the house.

It took quite a brave little soldier to stand up for what was right when Naughty Neighbor Boy laughed and called him a silly name. But he won! And every one was glad when Naughty Neighbor Boy ran home.

THE LESSON RETOLD

One day a discontented man came to Jesus. He said, "Master, speak to my brother, that he divide the inheritance with me."

The two brothers probably had had a quarrel about what their father had left them. Each wanted the bigger part for himself.

Jesus read the greedy man's face. He knew that the sin of greed and covetousness can spoil a man's life. To make him see how much better it is to trust God than to give all the thought to gathering riches, Jesus told this story:

Once there was a rich man who had a fine piece of ground. His servants worked it till it was soft and fertile; then they planted the seed.

When the harvest time came, the rich man's field was full of grain. As he looked over his land, his heart was filled with selfish pride. He forgot God who sent the rain and the sunshine. He forgot God's part, and thought only of what he himself had done.

He exclaimed, "What shall I do, because I have not room to store my grain?" He did not think of his poorer neighbors who had no rich fields.

Then the man said: "I will pull down my barns, and build greater. I will store this treasure in my new barns."

Again he said: "When my treasure is safely stored, I will say to my soul, 'Soul, thou hast much goods; enough to last for many years. Take thine ease. Eat, drink, and be merry.' "

But God whispered: "Foolish man, this night thy soul shall leave its earthly home. Then whose shall those things be that thou hast stored away for self?"

When Jesus had finished the story He said: "Share your good things. Do not keep all for self. Do not think too much of what ye shall eat, drink and wear. knows what ye need. He will take care of you. Look at the birds. They neither sow nor reap. They have no barns; yet God takes care of them. Look at the flowers; they neither toil nor spin, yet a king is not clothed like one of these. Trust God to take care of you."

THE LESSON RETOLD

The Lesson tells about a house in the far country where Jesus lived. The master of the house was called away on a long journey. He could not tell when he was coming home. He left the house in the keeping of his faithful servant.

Now that servant did everything about the house just as if his master's eyes were upon him. He worked just as he worked when his master was at home. The floors were swept, the lamps were trimmed, everything was in readiness for his master's coming.

By and by the master did come. He came in the night time and knocked at the door. The servant was not afraid to come and open the door for his lord. He was not ashamed to show him all through the house. No work had been neglected; all things were in readiness.

Of course the master was glad, and he gave the faithful servant the reward he deserved.

This is like a story that Jesus told His disciples. Then Jesus said: "But if that servant had not been good and faithful; if he had been cruel to the other servants; if he had not done his work; what then would have happened when the master came in the night time? How would that servant have felt when he met his lord? What then would that servant have deserved?"

Jesus meant to teach His disciples and all the people in the world a lesson. God, the heavenly Father, is the Lord of earth. He is dwelling in the heavenly home. He has left the world in the keeping of His servants.

THE LESSON RETOLD

One Sabbath day the people of a certain town in the land where Jesus lived were going to church. The church in that land was called the synagogue.

Jesus was visiting in the town and He went to the synagogue. Jesus went to read the law to the people.

Some of the Pharisees, Jesus' enemies, were there. Among many other people in the church was a poor woman who had not been well for eighteen years. She was bowed down because of her disease and could not stand up straight.

Jesus saw the poor woman and called to her. He said, "Woman, thou art cured of thine illness." Then He laid His hand upon her and she was given strength to lift herself up. When the woman found that she was well, she gave thanks.

The face of the ruler of the synagogue grew dark with displeasure. Jesus was working on the Sabbath day! He said to himself, "Jesus has broken the Commandment which says, 'Thou shalt not do any work on the Sabbath day.'"

Jesus knew what mistakes the people were making about the keeping of God's laws. The Sabbath day is one of God's best gifts to His people. But the scribes and Pharisees were making it a day of burden by their wrong and foolish laws. Not even the sick and suffering could be given help on the Sabbath day, because they said that was work.

Jesus said to the man: "Wouldest thou not lead thine own beasts for a drink on the Sabbath day? This thou wouldest do to take care of thy riches. Then shouldest not I help this poor woman who has suffered eighteen years, even though it is the Sabbath?"

Another Sabbath day Jesus went to eat a meal at a Pharisee's house. A number of people were there. A poor man who was ill with a dangerous disease stood near.

Jesus asked the learned men sitting about Him, "Is it lawful to heal on the Sabbath day?" The men were afraid to say "No" and they did not want to say "Yes." They answered not a word.

Then Jesus healed the man. To show the people that it was right to do good on the Sabbath He said to those about Him: "Would you not pull thy beast from a hole into which it had fallen?" Now in that land there were a great many empty wells and cisterns in the ground, and these were often left uncovered, so that it was very easy for an animal to fall into them. Jesus knew that any one of those about Him would have pulled an ox or an ass of his own out of such a hole, even on the Sabbath. So He turned to them and said: "Is not a man worth more than a beast?"



22 And he went through the cities and villages, teaching, and journeying toward Jeru'salem.

23 Then said one unto him, Lord, are there few that be saved? And he said unto them.

24 Strive to enter in at the strait gate: for many, I say unto you, will seek to enter in, and shall not be able.

25 When once the master of the house is risen up, and hath shut to the door, and ye begin to stand without, and to knock at the door, saying, Lord, Lord, open unto us; and he shall answer and say unto you. I know you

not whence ye are:

26 Then shall ye begin to say, We have eaten and drunk in thy presence, and thou hast taught in our streets.

27 But he shall say, I tell you, I know you not whence ye are; depart from me, all ye workers of iniquity.

28 There shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth, when ye shall see A'braham, and I'saac, and Ja'cob, and all the prophets, in the kingdom of God, and you yourselves thrust out.

29 And they shall come from the east, and from the west, and from the north, and from the south, and shall sit down in the kingdom of God.

30 And, behold, there are last which shall be first, and there are first which shall be last.

THE LESSON RETOLD

One day Jesus asked a question. He said, "What is the kingdom of God like? Shall I tell you what it is like?"

Then while the people stood about Him and listened, He said: "The kingdom of God is like a mustard seed. It is one of the smallest of seeds. A man took it and planted it in his garden. The seed sprung up and grew. It grew into a great, strong, sturdy plant. It grew so large and strong, that the birds came and lodged in its branches. The tiny seed became a tree."

God's kingdom begins on the earth. Jesus was the gardener who planted it. It was like that tiny, tiny mustard seed, at first. But Jesus tended it and made it grow. Then He had a few helpers; just a few, only

twelve. But by and by more joined, and more till God's kingdom on earth grew larger. It grew and spread like the mustard plant.

Jesus also said that God's kingdom was like leaven or yeast. He told how a woman puts this into bread when she is baking, so that the bread may be made light. Now Jesus meant that, when people receive His teaching into their hearts it will change their lives and make them like Himself. And He wants His teaching to spread until it shall be in the heart of every one in the world.

The more helpers there are, the more Jesus' work will spread. I think you see what is meant: Jesus wants the story of God and His love to grow till it reaches over the whole, wide world. He wants every one

throughout the entire world to hear about God and to love Him and obey Him.


