KINGSTON, Mar. 4-A sensational arrest was made on GLOVES Friday evening when Provincial Detective A. B. Boyd took into UNDERWEAR custody James A. Hartwick on a charge of murder in connection with the death of his son, who was found dead within one hundred yards of his father's barn in the village of Parham on February 12th.

Father and son went out into a bush a short distance from Parham on the afternoon of Feb. 11th, shooting rabbits. The father came home that night, but the son did not, and the next day a searching party found the dead body of the young man. First reports of the fatality stated that young Hartwick had accidentally shot himself, but the case too a sensational turn when the coroner's jury, presided over by Dr. Geddes, of Verona, returend a verdict to the effect that deceased had met his death "by some unknown hand."
