He has a story to tell of his adventures in the Yukon, and of the gold he has discovered there.

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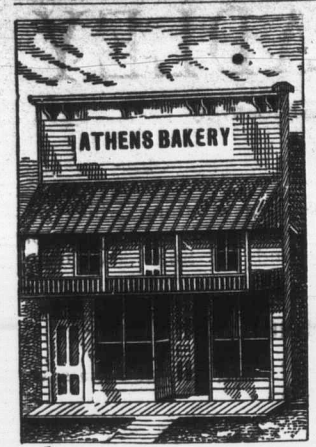

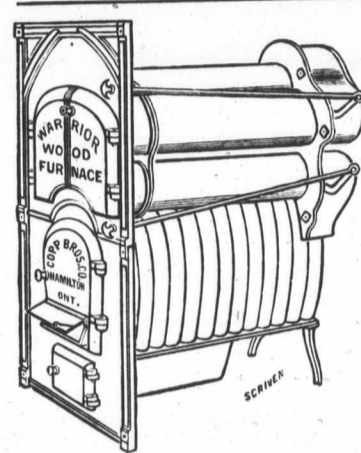
