Judges of the Fat Cattle to be shown this day were appointed. Ordered, That the Sub-Committee do enter into a contract with Mr. H. Hazard, for the Store which he has offered to fit up for the use of the Society. Read the following Letter from the Secretary— TO THE PRESIDENT AND COMMITTEE OF THE ROYAL AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

GENTLEMEN: I beg to state that I am desirous to be relieved from the duties of Secretary and Treasurer of the Society, as soon as you can conveniently appoint a person in my stead, it having been suggested to me that you are kind enough to pay me up to the end of my year in July next.

Whereupon, Ordered, That Mr. Beer's resignation be accepted, and that the Committee do enter into a contract with Mr. Beer, as soon as another Secretary is appointed, and the accounts audited and passed. The names of three persons having been agreed upon, from which the Lieutenant Governor in Council might select a Secretary and Treasurer for the Society, in the room of Mr. Beer, the President was requested to communicate the same to His Excellency.

ADJOURNED MEETING OF COMMITTEE, April 14, 1852. His Honor Judge Peters, President. Charles Hazard, Esq., Hon. J. M. Hill, Vice Presidents. Hon. G. Colles, Hon. W. Swabey, Hon. S. Rice, T. H. Haviland, Esq., John Lyall, Esq., Jeremiah Simpson, Esq., Thomas Pethick, Esq., Mr. J. Thorne, C. Stewart, Esq.

The proceedings of last meeting having been read, the President informed the Committee, that Mr. Stewart had been appointed Secretary and Treasurer to the Society, in the room of Mr. Beer, who had resigned. An application from Mr. James Pidgeon, of New London, for the establishment of a Depot for the seeds, &c., at his residence, was laid before the Committee, when the following Resolution was adopted, and ordered to be communicated to Mr. Pidgeon:

Resolved, That the Committee are of opinion, that Depots being already established at Cavendish, Haverhill, and at Princeton, no inconvenience can be experienced by the inhabitants of New London, and therefore it is not expedient to establish another Depot in that part of the country, at present.

Read a Letter from Mr. J. P. Millidge, Boston, with Invoice of carpet, and other goods. Also, a Letter from Mr. John Brown, Greenwood Farm, Falmonth, N. S., making enquiries respecting Leicester Sheep, and Ayrshire Cattle.

Ordered, That the Secretary do reply to Mr. Brown's letter, and give him the information sought for. Ordered, That two of Willie's Seed-covers be imported from Boston, for the Tryon Branch Society, in accordance with their request.

An application from Mr. Donald McInnes, of Charlottetown, for the sum of fifteen shillings, being half the price of a bull-calf, purchased by him from Mr. McGill, was laid before the Committee, whereon

Resolved, That as the purchase of the calf was made without the intervention of the Society, and the usual conditions have not been complied with, Mr. McInnes has no claim on the Society. Ordered, That Mr. John Beer's Bill, for the keep of the Galloway Bull, be paid.

The President read to the Meeting a series of Resolutions, prepared by him on the subject of the establishment of a periodical Sale of improved Stock, to be held under the direction of the Society, which, on motion of Hon. W. Swabey, were adopted by the Committee, and ordered to be published with the minutes of this Meeting.

The Resolutions are as follow:— Wherein, a correct list of the number and kind of improved Stock, intended to be offered for sale, at the Annual Fair, and Cattle Show in Charlottetown, in September, if published in the Island, and in the neighbouring Provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, would tend to collect purchasers for such animals, and thereby benefit the farmers and breeders of improved Stock in this Island.

Resolved, That the Secretary do open a Book, for the purpose of entering the names of the owner, and a description of the kind of animal which he will bring for Sale at the Fair, and any person having cattle or sheep of improved breeds, on sending in his name to the Secretary, together with the pedigree and age of the animal intended to be entered for Sale, on or before the first day of August next, shall be entitled to have his name entered in such Book.

Resolved, That an advertisement, containing a correct list and description of the animals entered in such Book, shall be published in this Island, and also in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, one month before the Fair.

Resolved, That the Society will make arrangements with an Auctioneer, to sell such animals at the Fair, for a small Commission; that each animal be set up at Public Auction, the owner thereof being allowed to buy him, in case he shall not be content with the highest bidding; if sold, the Auctioneer's Commission alone will be deducted from the price, and the residue, without any charge for advertising, &c., paid over by the Auctioneer to the seller; but in case the animal is not sold, but bought in by the owner, no charge whatever will be made.

The object of this Society, in adopting this measure, being to encourage the raising of fine stock in the Island, and also to attract purchasers from the neighbouring Colonies; to carry out this object, it will be necessary to keep up the character of the Stock offered for Sale under the Society's auspices; the Society, therefore, reserves to itself the right of rejecting any inferior animal, which brought to the ground.

The following Resolution respecting the purchase of Ram Lambs was also adopted by the Committee:— Resolved, That the Society do purchase next autumn well-bred Leicester and Southdown Ram Lambs, to be sent to the different Branch Societies and Depots throughout the Island, and three disposed of at Public Auction; and that with a view of inducing breeders to preserve such Lambs, the following advertisement be at once inserted, and continued in the Newspapers for six weeks:—

ADVERTISEMENT. THE ROYAL AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY are desirous at the FAIR IN SEPTEMBER next, of purchasing from 20 to 40 well-bred Ram Lambs, of pure Leicester and pure Southdown breeds. These animals are intended to be sent to the different Branch Societies and Depots, and then sold at Public Auction. The object of the Society being to furnish the farmers, in every section of the Country, with an improved breed of Sheep; none but the finest animals will be selected, for which very liberal prices will be paid by the Society—say Thirty shillings, and upwards.

[The following Letter from the Judges of the Fat Cattle Show, on Wednesday the 7th inst., was then read:] April 10, 1852. Sir: We beg to call your attention to a circumstance connected with the Report of the prizes awarded for fat oxen, handed in to the Society by us on Wednesday last. The Report, as published in the "Islander" newspaper, of the 5th inst., and comparing the Report contained therein with our written Report (received from Mr. Eng), we found a very material difference—Two words in the original Report (which we enclosed) have been scored out with a black lead pencil, and Mr. Eng, in the presence of a third party, solemnly assured us, that it was in that state when handed to him for publication by Mr. George Beer, jun.

As we naturally feel very indignant at the unwarrantable liberty taken with our Report, we beg, in justice to ourselves, and with a view to expose the surreptitious party, that you will do us the favor to fill the matter and take such steps as may deter the impression on the public mind of an unfair judgment, for which purpose the Report has evidently been tampered with. To his Honor Judge Peters, Esq., &c., &c. Whereupon, the Committee having called upon the Secretary to explain the matter, and he having stated to the Committee that he had enclosed the original Report to his son Mr. George Beer, jun., to be taken to the "Islander" office for publication, and that he had not made the alteration, nor does he know who did.

It was resolved, That this explanation cannot be considered satisfactory, inasmuch as it was the duty of the Secretary to have retained the original Report in his office, and to have handed to the Printer a correct copy; and he having made him the bearer of the Report, a strong suspicion must rest upon him of being in some way privy to the alteration, and therefore that the Committee must hold him responsible, until he shall procure and lay before this Committee an admission from his son, or writing, that the alteration was made by him without the knowledge, privity or consent of his father, or give such an explanation of the matter as will enable the Committee to trace out the real perpetrator of this unwarrantable act.

Resolved, That a copy of the foregoing resolution be immediately handed to the Secretary, which having been done, the following communication from Mr. G. Beer, jun., was shortly after handed in to the Committee by the Secretary: TO THE PRESIDENT AND COMMITTEE OF THE ROYAL AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

For the information of the Committee of the Royal Agricultural Society, I beg leave to state that the Secretary of the Society delivered me the Report of the Judges for Fat Cattle, exactly as it was written by them, to be conveyed by me to the Printing Office. In the Reading Room of the Islander Office I observed, that the Ox exhibited by me, was stated to have surpassed in size any animal exhibited, and not one word about his being well fed. I considered this to be an imputation that was not correct; I felt that in the first place I had not been well used, by the Ox not being allowed to compete after I had taken the pains to feed, and bring forward such an animal, as the Island had never produced before; and secondly, the insinuation of his only surpassing in size himself in the late specimens of John Morris, Esq., Sydney Street, near the Roman Catholic Chapel, conveyed a wrong impression to the public. I therefore, on my own responsibility, took my pencil and drew it across the two words in question, without any living being beside myself knowing anything about it, or being in any way privy to it.

I felt myself ill-used, therefore I did that which, under any other circumstances, I should not have done. GEORGE BEER, JUN. Mr. Beer's letter having been read, the following resolution was agreed upon, viz: That the Committee are satisfied that the Secretary was not implicated in making the alteration complained of, but at the same time, the Committee must strongly censure the conduct of Mr. G. Beer, jun., and express their regret at his having allowed himself to be betrayed into the commission of an act so great an impropriety.

Ordered, That application be made to the Colonial Secretary, for the auditors of Public accounts to examine the accounts of the Secretary of the Society, up to the present date, that being only a short period beyond the time which is named in the act of Incorporation, for the audit of the late specimens of John Morris, Esq., Sydney Street, near the Roman Catholic Chapel.
