



IS CHAINED TO FLOOR OF DEEP-EST DUNGEON.

Prussia is Excited by the Capture of August Starnickel, Whose Crimes are Numerous—General Bellef he Killed Fourteen—Officials Shocked Because He Eluded Iron-Clad Rules For Removal for Nine Years.

Berlin, Feb. 7.—In the strongest cell of the fail at Frankfort-on-Oder, with his leg chained to an iron ring in the stone floor, sits a murderer for whose arrest rewards have been offered at various times in the last few years aggregating 12,000 marks (\$3.000). He was charged first with three murders. It was soon learned that he was responsible for at least two, and probably four, more. The evidence new accumulating appears likely to add two, and perhaps more, to his account. Nor is it at all certain that this number represents all. The man came last October to Orthwig, a village near Frankfort, and entered the employ of a prosperous farmer. A few nights ago some belated persons saw a farm wagon being furiously driven through the town, it was discovered soon afterward that a stack of straw in a field was aftre. Ir. President and Honourable Gentle men of the Legislative Council: Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

so arrive in time to greet you. This is an occasion of much interest to me, especially because it is my first such experience in a Dependency of the Crown enjoying Responsible Government. I desire to express to you, as the representatives of the people of Newfoundland, my deep gratitude for the whole-hearted kindness with which we have been welcomed among you. For my own part I shall devote my energies to the welfare and advancement of our land.

His Majesty the King received me in private audience on my appointment as your Governor and displayed the widest knowledge of Newfoundland and the present state of its affairs. His Majesty recalled his previous visits here with keen pleasure and sade me say to you that this, his most ancient Colony and its loyal people would always be held in af-

oost ancient Colony and its loyal copie would always be held in af-sotionate remembrance by their

cial position of the Colony is so as sured that my Ministers find them sured that my ministers and them-selves in the position that, having launched large public undertakings and ensured their completion and maintenance, they are enabled, after providing for every public service, to remove the taxes from certain arti-cles which enter into daily consumpes, namely, tea, sugar and salted pork and beef barrelled. S.S. Labrador Stranded.

Yesterday afternoon, the topic of talk in the city was the loss of the sealing steamer Labrador, which was wrecked in St. Mary's Bay, messages having been received to that effect. Between 1 and 2 pm. the owners, Messrs. James Baird, Ltd., had a wire from Branch that the sihp had gone ashore there during the height of a blinding snow storm; and that the crew were alright. On receipt of this the owners effected arrangements to have a tug sent to bring home the crew of seventy St. John's men aboard, as she was going to get the balance of her crew at Codroy. At 9.30 last night, the D. P. Ingraham left for the scene of the wreck. She will stand by the Labrador and give what assistance she can. At ten what assistance she can. At ten o'clock, Capt. Martin wired asking as to how he would send the men home and was forwarded a reply that the tug had left for Branch.

The Labrador left this port at 5 o'clock on Saturday evening for Channel, and was to call at Trepassey to get twenty men en route. She passed Cape Race on Sunday, when the weather was thick and cloudy with a heavy gale from the S. E. The following day fog set in and towards evening increased in density.
