





We giva this verse merely to illustrate the derivation and meaning of the verb "to chortle" by an apposite quotation, and not to apply it to any local circum-stances. We do not wish to chortle our-selves; neither do we desire to call Mr. Bodwell a jabberwock or mythical beast; and we feel that it would be un-dignified to refer to the minister of mines as a "beamish boy." We mere-ly wish to make clear the pedigree and meaning of the word "to chortle." So far good, but we must confess that in all out etymological researches we have uever found any history of the verb "to beef." Beef is defined as the flesh of a bull, ox or cow after it has been killed. But any connection between its use as the verb "to beef" and its pro-per signification we have failed to dis-cover, and incline to the belief that it stands as a solitary monument of liter-ary inspiration in that great and glori-ous sentence, "You chortle when you win, and you beef when you lose." We think so, and we hope so, for no known word adequately describes the conduct of the Times newspaper since the crush-ing defeat of Mr. Bodwell, and if mem-ory had not aided ns, we should have had to invent an expression-with which to stigmatize it.
