TOKONTO'S CELEBRATION OF THE 4001H ANNIVERSARY OF HIS BIBTH.

A Crowded Meeting in St. James' Sunday School-Addresses on Various Phases of the Reformation and the Reforme de Life-Celebrations Elsewhere.

This conversion he remarked, was not a sudden change like that experienced by Paul, but a work of time, which might be said to have begun with his very childhood. The trials of Luther after he had taken the first decisive step in the direction of reform, the persecutions to which he was subjected by his fellow monks, and the friends whom he found in this hour of need, were spoken of. Rev. J. C. Antliff delivered the next addres, his subject being "Precursors of the reformation." Under this head sketches reformation." Under this head sketches of the lives of Waldo, Wycliffe, Huss and Savans rola and their works were given. Rev. H. W. Thomas read a paper on The Necessity for the Reformation. He claimed that this existed on political grounds, because of the enormous political grounds, be-cause of the enormous political power which Rome was trying to arrogate to itself; on economic grounds because of the undue in-fluence of the priestly order on the people, and the manuer in which this influence was abused, on social and on moral and religious grounds. The speaker did not object to the church of Rome holding any doctrines it saw fit; it was the enforcement of those doctrines which rendered the reformation a

Much that was e, hemeral has entirely disappeared, but, much still remains disrersed throughout the province, though the ravages of fire and water and the dispersion of families are daily rendering them less ab md.nt.

For the historia, the political economist and the statistician, the daily record of progress to be found in pamphlets, old newspapers, broadsheets, and posters, is almost invaluable and the library board have determined to provide a special department for their preservation. The collection will be so arranged and classified as to be easy of access to the student, and the cat logue will afford an interesting literary record of the city.

In pursuance of this plan, the library board would esteem it a favor if any ne p ssessed of pamphlets, old newspapers, manuscripts, deeds, cic, referring to, or published in Canada, would hand them over to the public library.

No attempt was made to explain their origin Such wells, of various sizes, are by no means uncommon in the Laurentian range, east of Kingston. They are called pot-holes. Astudy of pot holes in the Thousand I-lands or on the Upper Ottawa soon shows their origin. They are holes of all szes, from a foot or two in width and as much in depth to immense wells ten feet wide and twice as many deep. They occur on the edge or bottom of ancient and still existing water courses. At the bottom are found a few well rounded stones. Every one has noticed how the eddies at the margin of a stream whirl leaves and eticks in their vortex. Just so pebbles and stones are whiled about at the hottom of large are whirled about at the bottom of large eddies and whirlpools till the rock beneath is worn into shallow hollows or deep wells.
