

UNITED TO HONOR LUTHER

TORONTO'S CELEBRATION OF THE 400TH ANNIVERSARY OF HIS BIRTH.

A Crowded Meeting in St. James' Sunday School—Addresses on Various Phases of the Reformation, and the Reformation's Influence Elsewhere.

The Luther celebration in Toronto was inaugurated by a meeting held in St. James' school house on Saturday afternoon. The large hall was crowded to the doors, and many persons occupied seats in the adjoining class room. The bishop of Toronto presided, and the Methodist, Presbyterian, Baptist, congregational and Lutheran churches were represented by the clergy who spoke.

The bishop was announced to deliver an opening address, but he contented himself with briefly stating the objects of the meeting, and introducing the first speaker, Rev. Canon Dumoulin. The canon's subject was "The conversion of Luther." This conversion he remarks was not a sudden change like that experienced by Paul, but a work of time, which might be said to have begun with his very childhood.

At London a great meeting was held in Exeter hall, presided over by the Rev. J. C. Antill delivered the next address, his subject being "Precursors of the reformation." Under this head he spoke of the lives of Waldo, Vicelinus, Hincmar and Savonarola and their works were given.

"Luther and the Biblical Scholars of the Reformation" was the subject of a paper read by the Rev. Principal Owen. In his address he commended Luther's great influence, not only on the church, but on the world, and the manner in which this influence was abused on social and on moral religious grounds.

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THE C. P. R. GUARANTEE

Only Sixty-Five Millions Embraced—Ninety Millions Deposited by the Company.

MONTREAL, Nov. 10.—The Gazette publishes the following this morning: The Canada Pacific guarantee—We understand that a slight change has been made in the arrangement with the dominion government for the guarantee of the stock of the C.P.R. company. Only sixty-five millions of the stock is to be guaranteed in the meantime—that is to say, the fifty-five millions now outstanding and ten millions in addition which it is the intention of the company to issue.
