Mr. Justice MacMahon and a jury in the first two of five indictments yesterday resulted in a verdict of not guilty in both

It will be observed from the above figures that the principal growth has been during the past 10 years, the registered attendance during that time having more than doubled. The average attendance in 1870 was 8144, and in 1839 it is 18,928. In 1870 only 143 teachers wore employed; now the aggregate is 423, and 82 new teachers will have to be engaged as soon as the schools now in course of erec-tion are completed. In order to accommodate the vast increase in school population, many new buildings have had to be erected during the past 10 years. In 1870 there were 24 school buildings valued at \$353,000; now there are 49 valued at \$1.214,080 with three others in process of completion.
