ELEVENTH YEAR
ROLLY NOT GUILTY TWICE

HE ESCAPES ON THE FIRST TWO
CHARGES OF FORGERY

The jury out about an hour on the first and on the second two hours—only on the third charge. Banker's new headlines to be heard—Will the Bank Go Any Further?

The trial of William Rowan Moffatt before Mr. Justice MacMahon and a jury in the first two charges of forgery was concluded in a verdict of not guilty in both cases.

It was 9 1/2 o'clock last night before the verdict was brought into court and a few minutes afterwards Rolly was bundled into a covered carriage and wheeled off to the jail, with the other charge hanging over his head which will probably be disposed of to-day. It is said that even should Rolly escape on the remaining indictment the bank will probably be closed.

But it was generally understood around the court-room that the more serious of the indictments were being pressed first and the others follow in order of gravity and the chances of securing a conviction.

Originally there were five charges against Moffatt, two of forgery and three of uttering. It is understood that the embezzlement charges have all been merged into one, and also remains to be heard. The charges of forgery are not nearly so serious as was those upon which he was acquitted by the jury. Some of the more serious of his friends were predicting last night that by this evening he would be a free man.

Mr. Irving, Q.C., conducted the case for the crown, assisted by Mr. W. H. Smith, solicitor for the Ontario Bank. Mr. W. H. Smith, Q.C., appeared for the defendant. The court-room was unaccountably crowded when the case opened, and indeed during the trial. Rolly sat in the iron-bound dock throughout both trials, looking anxious and careworn. His face, however, brightened up like a flash when the verdict was pronounced and he was called out by the foreman of the jury.

The first charge was that of having forged the order on the Alliance Bank of London, No. 282, the despatch, dated Aug. 17 of last year, signed by Alfred Gegg, City Bank, assistant manager.

This translated means: Moffatt the credit of Edward Gegg in the City Bank.

The City Bank was unacquainted with the order and the instructions were called for by the Alliance and a reply was received signed by Moffatt, "pro manager."

THE BIG MILL AT TRISCO

JAKE MAULIFFE AND JIMMY CARROLL HAVE A GO FOR \$12,500.

One of the Greatest Fights Ever Witnessed on the Pacific Coast—The Fight Between Very Long One and the Telegrapher Was Not All What The World Thought It Was.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 21.—No pugilistic event has ever been created more interesting than the contest between Jack McCarroll and Jimmy Carroll at the California Athletic Club to-night. The purse offered by the club amounted to \$20,000, of which \$500 was to go to the loser. In addition to this each principal pooled \$500 on the fight, making the total sum to fall into the hands of the winner \$12,500. It was agreed the men should weigh in before the contest at 137 pounds.

A number of sporting men arrived here from eastern points some time ago and it was reported they had brought large amounts of money to place on McCarroll. When the match was first made public a similar amount was placed on Carroll, but after the announcement of so much McCarroll money Carroll's admirers evinced a decided unwillingness to forward a cent.

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Carroll selected as second Mike Barron and Florrie Barrett. McCarroll chose Billy Madison and Tom Dempsey. Hiram McCarroll was selected as referee. Owing to rumors that the contest was not to be given, President McCarroll's right informed Carroll and McCarroll that if at any time there was a withdrawal the fight would be stopped and the men thrown out of the ring.

FACTS THAT NEED NO COMMENT.

All Rivals Distanced in the Contest for Supremacy.

CONDITIONS AND EXTENT OF GROWTH

Ahead of All Canadian Cities, the Queen City is Fast Gaining a Place Among the Great Cities of America--Millions of Capital, Gigantic Business Houses, Extensive Manufacturing Enterprises--Great Educational Institutions and a Rich Province at its Back are Pushing the City Along at an Astonishing Rate.

Toronto is the banner city of this Dominion. Its growth is more rapid and its trade more extensive than any other place in Canada, and its early possibilities are such that the city nineteen hundred will certainly see a city of a million or more inhabitants, the great hub of education, politics, commerce and finance.

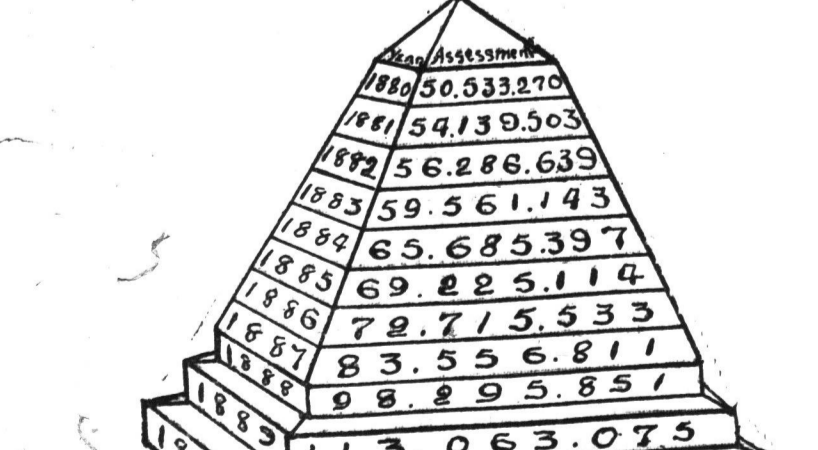

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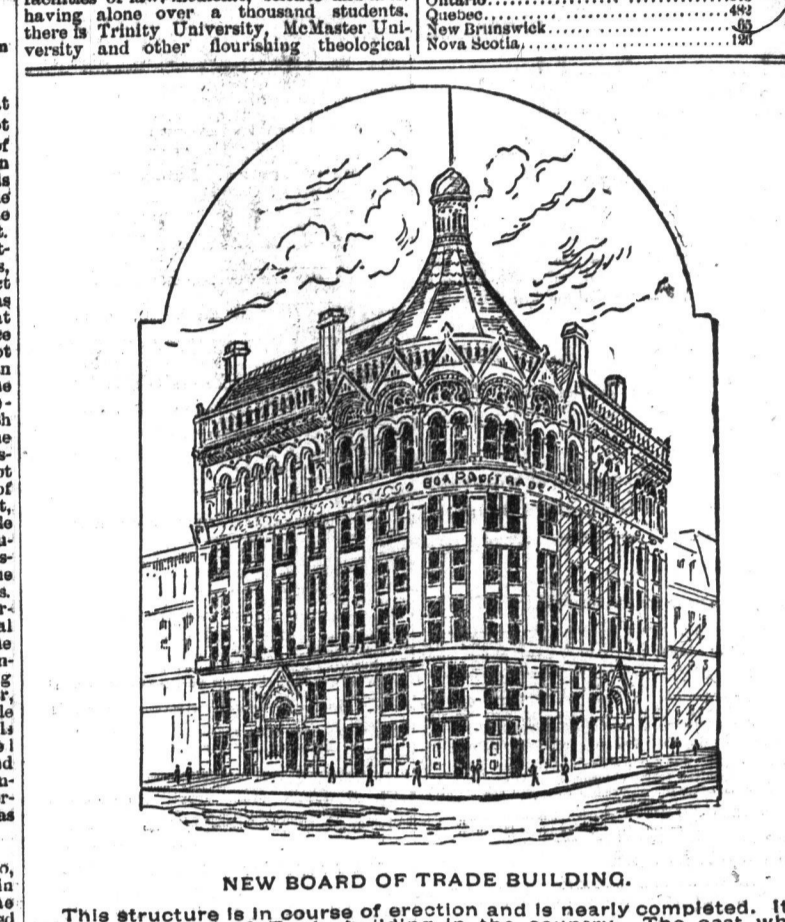

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WHERE TREASURES ARE KEPT.

Massive Vaults Which Set Burglars and Fire at Defiance.

From The World, Mar. 12.
The banking hall, with its rich decorations and classic elegance, forms a feature of the building which attracts much interest, but that interest is divided evenly when the great vaults are viewed. Their size, massiveness and intricacy of the lock mechanism attract not only interest but create surprise and wonder in the minds of those who are allowed to see them.

They are said to be the finest banking vaults in the Dominion of Canada. They are heavy and beautifully finished and are absolutely burglar proof as well as fire proof. The cash vault is the most perfect and most elaborate of all. The floor is of solid steel, elaborately of all. The floor is of solid steel, elaborately of all. The entire walls, floor and roof are protected by several thicknesses of heavy solid plates firmly secured to each other made proof against hardened steel drills, or shattering by heavy sledge hammers; and to prevent wedging or forcing apart, the corners are formed by bending the heavy plates of steel and iron so as to form a solid corner without joint from floor to ceiling.

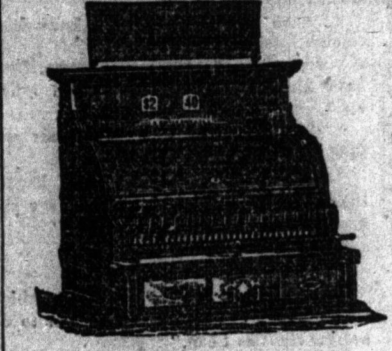
The entrance is protected by steel door frames and doors weighing several tons on both inside and outside of the lock walls, and the space between forming a vestibule is protected the same as the steel walls of the vault. The heavy steel and iron entrance door is hardened and tempered to resist burglar's drills. The steel used is of special make that after being chilled and tempered it cannot be shattered by hammers. The edges are formed by a special process which prevents burglar's jimmies or wedges being used to force the door, and are sprung and grooved to prevent the door from being forced apart. The door closes on to a specially constructed rubber seal which prevents any light from entering the vault.

The door is forced into the jamb and against the rubber packing by a powerful electric lever on the outside, and an ingenious method of swinging the door on a massive cast-iron hinge instead of ordinary hinges, the door on all its edges, are made to revolve, thus preventing their being cut off by saw or drill. The spindles and arbors operating these are a patented invention of J. & J. Taylor's and are so constructed that they can neither be driven in, pulled out nor drilled. These doors are fitted with burglar proof combination locks, each capable of over 40 millions of changes of combination to prevent the possibility of picking the numbers, and a double chronometer time-lock, thus preventing robbery by numbers, and effectually shutting out every one after banking hours. A strong gridded gate prevents any one from entering even during banking hours but those authorized. The chronometer locks on the safes are costly ones. Messrs. J. & J. Taylor put them on the safe doors at an expense of \$400 each. The doors of the safe and vaults cost \$300 each and are not only works of beauty, but they are also works of massive strength.

The work on these vaults has been done in Toronto, and in Messrs. Taylor have finished a work that will remain a perpetual monument of their art. In connection with a World reporter yesterday Mr. West of J. & J. Taylor told how 20 years ago his firm had built the vaults in the old Bank of Commerce. Then those vaults were regarded as the best in Ontario, and they afterwards came to be regarded as old-fashioned. But the vaults in the new bank are of a later design and are regarded as a triumph of modern art.

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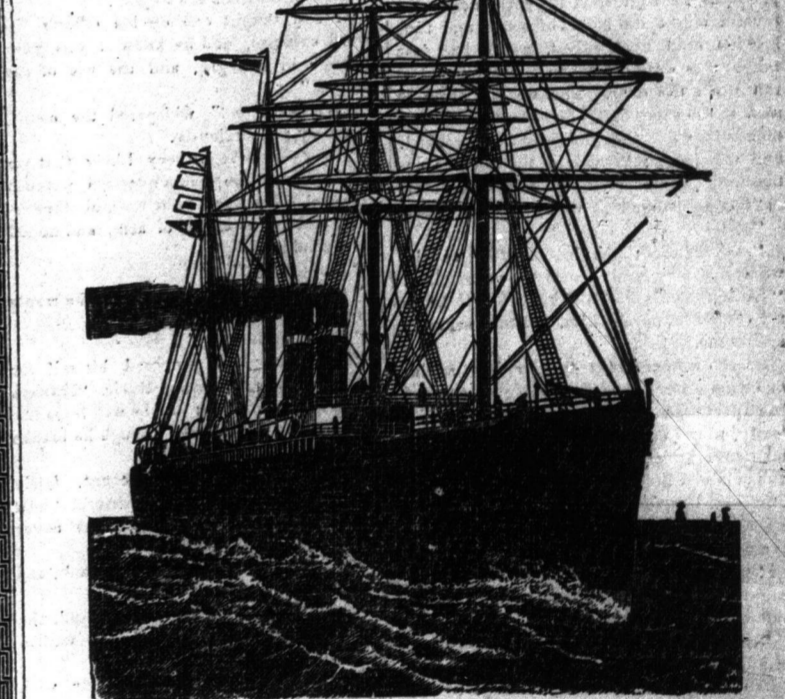
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VALDMIR THE MONK.

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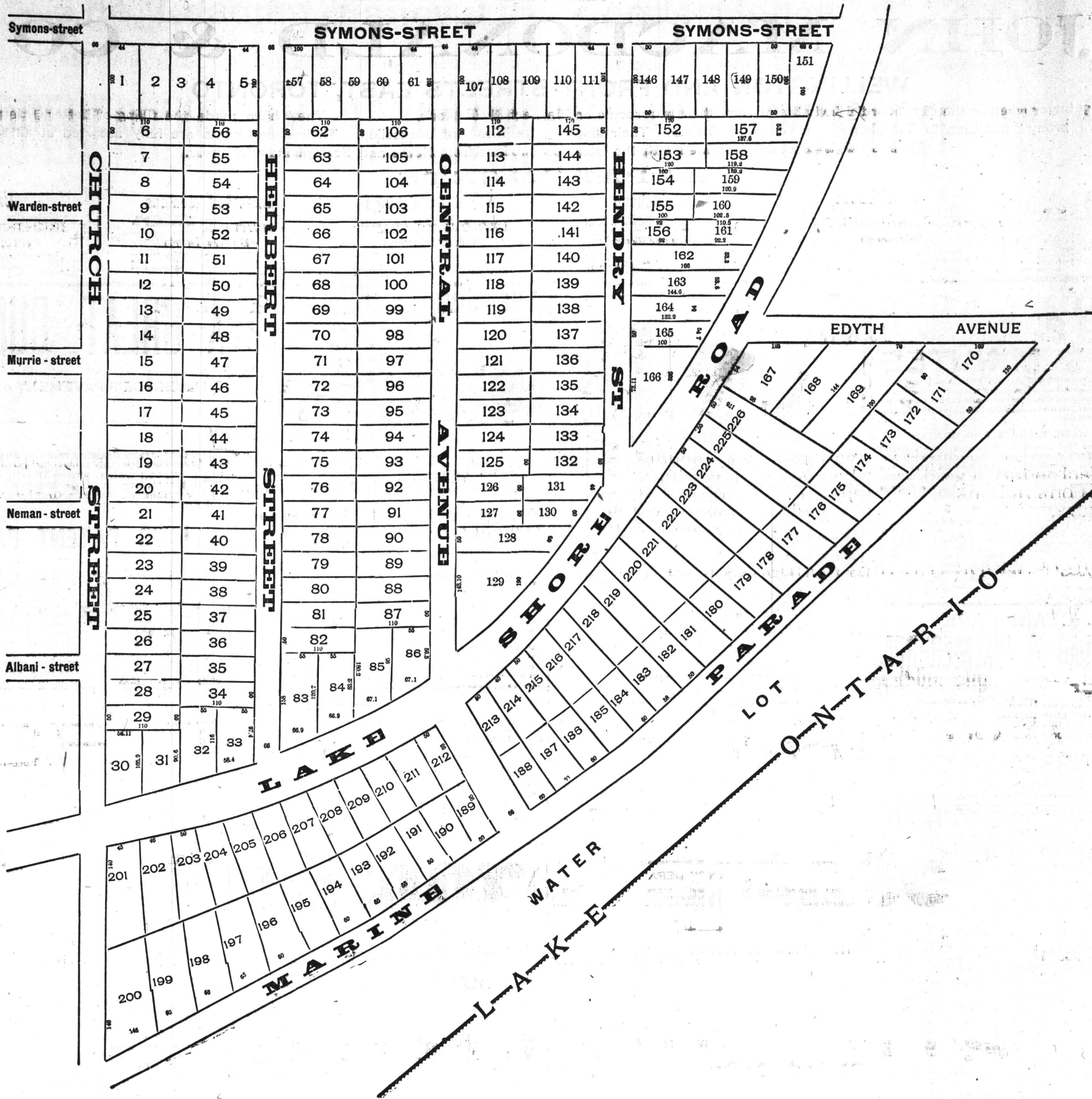
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MIMICO CENTRE
