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THIRTEENTH YEAR.

A ROW IN THE IRISH PARTY

WHICH MAY LEAD TO THE COLLAPSE OF THE HOME RULE BILL.

Mr. Sexton's Retirement Was the Result of Discontent at Gladstone's Concessions to the Unionists—How He May Have Him Withdraw His Resignation—Home Rule's Poor Outlook.

New York, June 12.—The World's Land on cable says:

Sexton's abandonment of his seat in the House of Commons was a political sensation of the week. He is far and away the most important figure in Irish politics since the death of Parnell.

The history of the dispute which has brought about this event is simple. A committee of shareholders of the Dublin Freeman's Journal was appointed by the Irish party to report upon the board of directors that was in the hands of the Unionists.

At the meeting of the party on Friday, a letter was read asking for the resignation of Sexton, who was not present.

An amendment was proposed declaring that the party should take no further part as a party in the affairs of the Journal.

Mr. Sexton held that this was an abandonment of his seat by the party, at whose instance he had joined the board, and he left the room.

A meeting of the party has been called for Monday to consider Mr. Sexton's resignation and the proposed amendment.

Mr. Sexton has been practically carrying the whole discussion of the Home Rule bill on his shoulders as far as the Irish party is concerned.

His loss means political defeat. It might even lead to the break-up of the party and the consequent collapse of the Home Rule bill.

Mr. Sexton's resignation was a blow to the Unionists, who were counting on his support.

Mr. Gladstone also has to withdraw his resignation.

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CANADIAN HERESY CASE.

Rev. Dr. Campbell of Montreal on Trial for Heresy—His Accusations—His Defense.

MONTREAL, June 12.—Another bridge was thrown across the chasm between the Presbyterian Church and the Roman Catholic Church in Montreal.

The Rev. Dr. Campbell, of Montreal, was on trial for heresy before the Roman Catholic court.

The charge of heresy is based on an address delivered by Dr. Campbell in the Presbyterian Church in Montreal.

The address was delivered on the occasion of the centenary of the birth of St. Paul.

Dr. Campbell's address was a masterpiece of eloquence and logic.

He attacked the Roman Catholic dogma of the infallibility of the Pope.

He also attacked the Roman Catholic dogma of the immaculate conception.

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SALISBURY SEES A SIMILE.

Lord Salisbury's Visit to the Theatre—His Impressions—His Remarks.

LONDON, June 12.—The first in the series of meetings designed by the Unionists to hold in London against Home Rule was held in the Royal Surrey Theatre this evening.

The Marquis of Salisbury was the most notable speaker. He illustrated his opinion of Mr. Gladstone's action towards Ireland with an elaborate metaphor based on the account of the recent disaster in Washington.

He compared Mr. Gladstone's action to the action of the Titanic.

He said that Mr. Gladstone's action was a masterpiece of folly.

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HER EVIDENCE RULED OUT.

Lizzie Borden's Counsel Gains a Decided Point by the Exclusion of Her Former Testimony.

New Bedford, Mass., June 12.—Over one-half of the spectators in court this morning were women, and the second witness called by the defense was Lizzie Borden.

The indications of a severe struggle upon the admission of the stenographic notes of Lizzie Borden's testimony at the inquest were plain.

Miss Borden came into court at 8:30 o'clock and took her seat with the appearance of increased interest in the proceedings.

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BEHRRING SEA SEIZURES.

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"YOU MURDERED MY BROTHER."

Col. Alsworth Threatened by the Clerks at the Inquest on the Ford's Theatre Victims.

WASHINGTON, June 12.—At the afternoon inquest on the Ford's Theatre victims a well-dressed man walked forward in a voice trembling with passion, and shaking his fist in Col. Alsworth's face, shouted: "You murdered my brother and you shall die!"

The man was Charles Barnes, whose brother was a victim of the disaster.

The excitement grew in intensity.

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MURDER IN BROAD DAYLIGHT

CAPT. HICKEY OF WINDSOR SHOT AND THROWN FROM A BUCCY.

John Vrooman While Driving With Hickey Drew a Revolver, and Killed the Latter Instantly. The Man Had Quarreled Over Hickey's Attention to Vrooman's Wife.

WINDSOR, Ont., June 12.—One of the boldest murders ever committed in this locality occurred about 7 o'clock this evening in front of the Manning House.

Two men named Capt. James Hickey, a submarine diver of Windsor, and John Vrooman, a mechanic in the Grand Trunk car shops here, were driving along the street both seated in the same buggy.

When opposite the Manning House Vrooman drew a revolver and shot Hickey in the left breast, then gave him a push out of the buggy.

He then took the reins and drove along Chatham-street and Windsor-avenue until he reached Millard's livery stable. Here he halted the horse and got out of the buggy.

Police Constables Langlois and Lester were in pursuit and overtook him just as he alighted and put him under arrest. Hickey died almost instantly.

One of the policemen asked Vrooman why he had shot Hickey and he replied: "The cause he smashed me first."

His face covered with blood, Vrooman's face was covered with blood when arrested, which showed that he had received a blow from Hickey before the shooting, as he stated.

It is said that Vrooman had been intimate with Hickey's wife for some time, and about a week ago she disappeared.
