### GETTING READY FOR EXHIBITION

Permission Secured for Use of Drill Hall and Grounds—Some Other New Features.

C. J. Milligan, manager of the St. John exhibition, yesterday received word from Sir Frederick Borden, minister of militia, giving the association permission to use the drill hall and grounds for exhibition purposes from August 15th to Sept. 15th. Work on the Amusement Hall and other buildings of the association will be commenced at once to get them in readiness for the exhibition. Mr. Taylor has been engaged to do the work, and will put on a crowd of men this morning. He will be busy next up to the time of the fair.

Director Wally has been given instructions to get the main building in shape, and is starting men at work today. Dr. G. U. Hay, on behalf of the Natural History Society, who made such a fine exhibit in 1904, has taken up with Manager Milligan the matter of making a more extensive exhibit this year. A new feature will be addresses by well known lecturers who will give popular talks on the various collections shown.

It is also proposed to have a full educational exhibit embracing the whole province, including all the subjects taught in the schools which can be shown. Nothing of the kind has been attempted for ten or twelve years, and it should prove a very interesting feature. Dr. J. R. Inch, superintendent of education, discussed the matter with Mr. Milligan and promised his hearty co-operation. Prizes will be offered of course to the best exhibits. It is also proposed to have a kindergarten exhibit.

Another interesting department of the exhibit will be the domestic science booth. The ladies' council have undertaken the management, and will give practical demonstrations of the latest and most approved methods of preparing food. Mr. Milligan will meet the committee of the ladies' council on the fair grounds on Saturday morning at 11.30 to arrange details. The prize list is in the hands of the printers, and will be ready for distribution in about a fortnight. The management have made arrangements to issue for advertising purposes a very pretty colored post card showing the exhibition buildings. These will be available by all merchants and citizens who wish to distribute them, and who are desirous of making the public aware that St. John is to have the best exhibition that has ever been held in recent years.

Designs for the banners which will be sent broadcast over the county have been submitted by local lithographers, and the committee will meet in a day or two to decide on the one they will adopt.

No effort will be spared to make the exhibition of 1906 one of the best that has ever been held here.

Yarmouth, May 20.—The body of the late Joseph R. Wyman was laid to rest in the beautiful Mount Zion cemetery this afternoon. The services at the grave were conducted by Rev. C. W. Rose, pastor of Zion Baptist Church, a special choir rendering the hymns. The procession which numbered fully three thousand people was the longest ever witnessed in this town, and testified to the esteem in which the deceased was held in his community. The following was the order of procession: Yarmouth Brass Band, Hiram and Sons' forces, A. A. Church, a special choir rendering the hymns, eight members of Union street church, acting as pall bearers; Mayor and Town Council, Town and Municipal officials, mourners, including Senators and members of the Legislative Council and Assembly.

At the grave the impressive burial service of the Church of England was read by Rev. R. D. Kambick, the ceremony being the finishing of the funeral. The Provincial Exhibition Commission was represented by E. B. Elderkin and Secretary Hall. Flags were half-masted on the school houses and residences throughout the town.

Toronto, May 23.—The Toronto Bolland Forge Works were destroyed by fire last night. The loss is \$250,000. The insurance, divided in twenty-three companies, is \$137,500. The building started before the ashes were cold, the hundred and fifty employees are affected.

London, May 23.—The announcement that the Allen Line, in conjunction with the Canadian Pacific Railway Steamship Company, have decided to abandon the route as a port for the despatch and reception of mails, creates great disappointment in Ireland and Scotland, because it means the delay of a whole day for the Irish and Scottish mails. The local boards of luncheon are trying to have the decision altered. The Postmaster General has intimated his opinion in favor of the Allen line's decision.

### The S. P. C. A.

He stood some distance off and put four bullets into him, and then, finding that did not kill him, stoned him to death, taking ten minutes to do it. ## Were They Put to Death

Omaha, Neb., May 7.—According to the story told by O. K. Carr, a well-known Omaha man who was through the San Francisco earthquake and five 350 wounded and injured people were chloroformed to prevent them from being burned alive when Mechanics Pavilion was vacated. He said: "I was with the Red Cross and still have my badge. We were in the Mechanics Pavilion after the quake and

when the fire came so close that we saw the building must go, all the injured that was thought could recover were taken away. Those with mangled bodies and broken or burned limbs begged to be shot to escape being burned alive. Three hundred and fifty in the Pavilion were chloroformed by the doctors and nurses or shot by soldiers. It was done as an act of humanity."

## A PRACTICAL S... FOR THE PEOPLE

"SEED-TIME AND HARVEST"  
(By Rev. Stephen Paulson.)

Whatever a man sows that he has reaped—Gal. vi, 7.  
Man has ever been encouraged in his sowing by the certainty of reaping. The hope of tomorrow's sheaves supports today's toilsome sowing. Even so certainty of victory has often won battles—before they were fought. Armed with confidence patriots have beaten down stone walls with naked fists.

Uncertainty takes energy out of the thought and the nerve out of the arm. The rumor of some calamity is enough to destroy enterprise. Men will not plow if warhorses are to trample down the ripe grain. Men will not build if the enemy are to warn their hands over the building stones. Men will not plant vines if others are to weed away their fruit. Men needs hope and a basis of certainty; therefore the Divine promise, "Give and it shall be given unto you."

Let the husbandman give seed to the furrows, and soon the furrows will give back big bundles into the sower's arms. Give labor to the vine, and they will give lack rich purple clusters. Give sparingly to nature, in seed and labor, and surely shall be your harvest. Give bountifully and surely shall be given back.

This is a universal principle. Drag one plank to the stream and you have only a narrow and frail bridge across it. Give labor to the soil, and you have the great bridge which spans the flood and carries thousands of people. Bury your one talent, and one talent shall be yours to the end of time. Invest your talent for God and humanity, and it shall be doubled in the end. Give kindness and hospitality and generosity to your fellow men and good measure, pressed down and shaken together shall men give into your bosom.

We have the mentioned two elements of the principle of sowing and reaping—the element of certainty by which God encourages man to put forth his labor, and the element of proportion between the investment and the return. There is a third element which lies on the surface of our text, "Whatever a man sows that he shall also reap." If you sow wheat, you will reap wheat; if you sow tarweed you will have a crop of tares; if you plant acorns you do not expect an orchard of peach trees. No, God is not mocked. His eternal law hold good throughout the universe, and whatsoever a man sows in material or spiritual things shall reap that and not something else.

Every day men are sowing and reaping. We are reaping the fruit and we are sowing for future harvests. But it takes so long to appreciate the principle that we shall reap what we sow; that if we sow the wind, we shall reap the whirlwind; if we sow the flesh we shall reap corruption; and if we sow to the spirit we shall reap a spiritual harvest.

Childhood and youth are the spring-time of life. In a child, parents have virgin soil in which to plant for time and eternity. The child is open to every impression, eager for every new experience, drinks in every word spoken. The child is a mirror which reflects every act done before it. You are careful to plant good seed in your field. Are you just as careful to plant good emotions in the heart of your child? You take great pains in your garden. Are you willing to spend the same amount of time and labor to remove character traits from your child's character?

Let us make a plan for the children in the seed-time of their lives. Parents, what are you sowing in the fruitful soil of your children's hearts and minds? Are you treating them with inconsiderate harshness. Do not be surprised if you reap a crop of boys and girls who are older, do you neglect all their higher faculties and better traits and only feed an animal's greed when they grow into animals? Marvel not if bitter neglect be your portion in later years. Do you speak lightly before them of things that are true, things that are honest, things that are sacred, and things that are highly before them of things that are dishonest, which is a disgraceful and dishonorable trait from your child's character.

"The child is the father of the man," and how many men are spoiled in the making. You are sowing for years how to get the best results from your fruit trees and vines, you study the relation of crops, the chemical elements of the soil, the conditions of the climate and what seed will bring you the best harvest. How much more should you care for that boy or that girl of your youth and yet there you might reap a harvest of joy and love and honest pride, with which a great wheat crop would not for a moment compare. Were it only the parents who would suffer for the improper training of the child, we might think it retributive justice. But society and the state suffer. Child suffers, carrying through life a distorted mind and a stunted soul even as some must carry a crooked body.

"Whatever a man sows that shall he also reap." We stand here face to face with an inflexible law. The young man sows his "wild oats" and thinks that somehow he is going to escape the harvest. But it will come. From time immemorial we have had to reap the result of our deeds and no exception will be made in your case. If we have sown "wild oats" we must reap them. We call "mishfortunes" in our lives and the lives of others, are simply the results of the principle that what a man sows that he reaps.

In conclusion let me say that man by his sowing determines what God shall be to him. Give God your heart and He shall give you a tender and merciful father. Give Him the publican's prayer, "God be merciful unto me, as I am." He shall give you mercy as wide as the sea. Give to His little ones even a cup of cold water in His name and He shall give you to drink of the water of the River of Life.


