"A Kingly Gift"

EARL GREY'S APPEAL On behalf of Needy Consumptives Strong words of Canada's Governor-General

At the official opening of the King Edward Sanatorium for Consumptives, near Toronto, His Excellency delivered an address that must have an important bearing on the future of the sanatorium movement in Canada. We quote :--

"The proceedings this afternoon commenced with a boautiful and reverent prayer from your old friend, Dr. Potts. He prayed that the light of the Lord might shine upon us. That prayer is abundantly answered. He also prayed that the White Plague might be removed. Well, whether that prayer will be answered or not depends upon yourselves."

"Is it not a standing shame and reproach to the governments and individuals that there is not more care taken by the people of Canada to protect themselves against the curse of consumption?"

On his way out to the King Edward Sanatorium, -so named by permission of His Majesty King Edward VII—the Governor-General's car was stopped in its progress outside the Canada Cycle & Motor Co. by a large crowd of its employees. A contribution of one hundred dollars was handed the Governor-General, a donation to the Toronto Free Hospital for Con-

WESTERN JIL PIONEER.

Alfred Von Hammerstein Has Had Adventurous Career.

In 1897 there proceeded from Edmonton, with a party of three bound for the Klondike a young German of good family, named Alfred von his steps and locate in the region French Canadian. round Lake Athabasca, which appeared to him to offer exceptional advantages to the prospector. Reacning Athabasca Landing, he opened a store there as an immediate means of liveiihood, and, incidentally, with a view of the country and its latent natural wealth. After a few months he decided to devote his attention especially to prospecting for petroleum in the vicinity of Fort McMurray, and for years he has been carrying on borings there at great expense, the necessary capital being provided by himself and friends in Europe and Canada. Besides superintending the boring operations he has been prospecting for gold and other minerals, and with the exception of a few weeks each winter spent in Ottawa his time has been devoted, in his own words, to "travelling, trading, mining and hunting." Mr. von Hammerstein (he democratically resents the use of the title "Count" to which he is entitled) is once more back in Ottawa, corresponding with his principals in Europe and at the same time consulting with officials of the Geological Survey regarding the showings made on some of his recent prospecting work. He is a most interesting, and in many respects, picturesque, personage, this German pioneer of the Athabasca oil fields, and during his stay at the canital he is always quite a social lion. It is at first a little difficult to identify the well-groomed gentlemen in evening dress one meets in Ottawa drawing-rooms with the roughly-clad and unkempt prospector, miner, me-chanic and hunter who figures in many of the wilderness photographs he shows to his friends in his rooms. Mr. von Hammerstein's life in the

distant Northwest has been full of adventure and peril. A couple of years ago, while hunting he was dantatally, wounded. He had only one companion with him, and to save the life of the wounded man the companion had to leave von Hammerstein alone for two days while he went in search of messengers to de- or a Weak Bladder if You Take spatch for a surgeon at Edmonton. nearly four hundred miles away by trail and stream. thusiastic about the undeveloped natural resouces of the region which is the scene of his activities, and remarked to the writer of these notes that while, in justice to himself and his associates, he cannot divulge the exact results of experimental borings which have cost a large fortune, he is delighted with results. He predicts the Athabasca region before many years will be the most productive oil field in the world. "The results of our work this year," he remarked, "have been more gratifying than ever before." Mr. von Hammerstein states that there is no doubt about there being plenty of gold in the Peace River, for he has worked banks at several points with good remonton soon, so that he will be able to make the trip to McMurray before the snow and ice go.

A World's Record.

Viper II., the fastest type of powerboat hull in the world, was designed by Mr. Albert Hickman and Mr. Sanford Munsie, of Pictou, N.S. Though only 20 feet long, this extraordinary little craft, with a 30-horse-power engine, has devolped a speed of about 26 miles an hour. Her nearest rivals of at all similar length are two American boats, the Hadajr and Haida Papoose, and a French boat, Mais-Je-Piquer II., that distinguished herself at Monaco. With considerably greater power than Viper II., these racers develop from 21 to 23 miles an hour. Mr. Hickman, who is at present in Montreal, gave the following particalars concerning Viper II. to a Mont-real Standard's representative: "The hulls of Viper I. and II. were built roughly for experimental purposes. They must not be looked upon as giving any idea of the speed of which the boat is capable. Carefully-built and full-powered, even a 20-foot Viper should be able to make 30 miles an hour. In fact, we have no right to set a limit even here, as the Viper type of hull, so far as we have been able to discover, develops absolutely no hull defects at high speed. We have installed engines of 3, 7, 12 and 30 horsepower in the same hull, and in all cases we have found that the hull maintained the same position relative to the surface of the water. She neither rises unduly by the bow, in the manner of the round-bilged boats, nor does she stumble or jump like the nor does she stumble or jump like the hydroplanes.. Of what speed this type of boat might be capable when driven by the 250 horse-power of Dixie III. or the 800 horse-power of Wolseley-Siddeley, it would be hard to conjecture. (The Duke of Westminster's Wolseley-Siddeley, now called Ursula, is 50 feet in length, and has a speed of 40 miles an hour.) In principle and of 40 miles an hour.) 


