## ST. GEORGE'S PARISH JOURNAL.

We are now about to enter on the fourth year of publication of a monthly record of parochial matters, which has become an established agency in the Parish, of far greater uscfulness than its modest, unpretending form would seem to suggest. In carrying it on we have had difficultics
of various kinds to contend against, and disappointments in some quarters, but we know that there are many members of the congregation who, appreciating our design and purpose at its true value, and understanding some of our difficulties, would greatly miss our little sheet if its monthly visits should happen to be discontinued.

During the past ycar our paper has come to the hands of its subscribers as the outside sheets of the Dazun of Day, the whole composing the St. George's Parish Magazine. The Dawn of Day has been found to be lacking in local interest, and in other respects also unsuitable for our purpose ; and we are so far satisfied of our success in the past and confident of our future, that we now propose to abandon the magazine form, and issue the local' pages alone as the St. George's Parish Foumal. In this form we think it will command greater attention, and a larger appreciation of its value, and as we cannot but think that every member of the congregation will wish to know what is going on, done and to be done, from month to month in the Parish, and that such matters will interest many others also, we will hope for a subscription list sufficient to defray the cost. It is not too much to expect every member at least to support an agency of the kind, at a cost to him or her of the triffing sum of 50 cents a year.

With each copy of this issue a form of subscription is sent out, which subscribers are requested to return, with 50 cents enclosed in scrip or postage stamps.

## THE CANADIAN MISSIONARY

Is the title of a live monthly publication devoted to the interests of mission work in general and Canadian mission work in particular, which gives in cvery issuc a widely gathered budget of news in a condensed and readable form, besides much other interesting matter, and is published at the almost nominal price of 50 cents. It is in every way deserving of support, and we are endeavouring to increase its circulation in this Parish, in conjunction with the Parish journal, and have arranged that both may be had for a subscription of 60 cents a year. A number of copics of the January number are to be distributed through the Parish, so that an opinion may be formed of its merits.

## VESTRY MEETING.

A special mecting of the Vestry was held on Wednesday, 5th December, the Rector in the chair, and the Churchwardens and a few others being present.

The Churchwardens having explained that it had become necessary to make arrangements for paying off the balance of the debt of the Church still remaining, amounting upon the old debt for the furnaces and reseating of the Church to $\$ 2,850$, and for the reseating of the gallery, Sc., last year to $\$ 700$, a by-law was introduced and passed authorizing the Rector and Churchwardens to create a new debt of $\$ 3,500$.

Mr. Chadwick, in the unavoidable absence of Mr. Elmes Henderson, introduced a by-law for the founding of a S. George's Scholarship in Trinity College, which was read a first time, and at the request of the mover, ordered to stand over for further consideration.

The sum of $\$ 3,500$, authorized by the by-law above mentioned, has been obtained on more favourable terms than were required for the debt which it retires.

## AMATEUR ART EXHIBITION.

The school-house presented a brilliant scenc on 28th, 29th, and 3oth November last, when it was filled with works of Art by "Members of the Congregation and then immediate friends and relatives." The entertainment was one of an entircly novel character, differiug both from the competitive exhibitions with which the public are familiar, and from the loan exhibitions which lrave taken place occasionally in Toronto. The number of articles celhibited greatly exceeded the expectations of the Committer, so much so indecd, that some difficulty was experienced in finding a proper place for everything, and the value of the total exhibit was so great as to be a source of somic anxicty for the safety of the school-house from fire and burglars.

Many of the articles cxhibited were of a high order. Some which had won prizes at the Central and other similar cxhibitions seemed almost lost among the many. Indecd wo have no hesitation in saying that this exhibition fuily equalled, if it did not excced, the cxhibit of amateur work in the Toronto Central Exhibition in Septrmber lust. The principal management was undertaken by Mrs. Phillips and Mrs. Chadwick, the former of whom shewed herself to be a most energetic and indefatigable worker.

We regret to be obliged to add that this attractive entertainment was not patronised by the Congregation as it deserved. The recsipts shewed that it was visited by only about four hundred people, and those not all our own, by any means, whereas there should have been that number every day while it was operi. The financial result is consequently rather dissappointing as the amount realized will probably not exceed $\$ 75$ over expenses.
