The name is pronounced as if it were written "Keekwhich."
-A copressing state of affairs is reported as existing in Germany, where, on account of the great scarcity of fuel and may materials here are fully a million skilled workers ialle. A Rerlin dispatch soys: The Anstrian coal strike is mardy responsible for this. All the industries here are owercowiled with orders, the iron industry being the most affeded, the Prossian Goverument alone having recentily phaced orders for six hundred locomotives and 9,690 ears. The whole machinery indusiry is in a similar condition exeepting the biexele hasiness. Wilhin a year ab bicyele works have eraserl on exist. Tho German shipyards are overerowiled witl war vessels in course of construetion In sh shipyards there are now in process of ennstruction 528 vessels of every kind. Whe German foreign trade of 1890 amounted to ten miliarts, of which seven were marilime, meaning an increase in the hatere of one thonsand three lumilred million marks, 'IThe same ration of inerease is maintained. Comman eapital invested in shipping amounts to wearly six lomberi million marles and is stemtily inermsing. Fven the textite industry is flowrishing, and the emphoyers wages are heing mised withoul strikes.

-Aid is being sought from the Ontario Government for the building of 80 miles of the Thunder Bay, Nipigon, and St. Joe Railwiy. It is clnimed that this railway, if built to Fort Severn, 500 miles, would open. up $32,200,000$ acres, or more than the whole of old Ontario, and make homes in time for over two million people. The natural resources of the district were reported by the deputation who reeently waited on the Govermment, as containing iron ore in four places, soft, hard and specular; great water powers, twenty-four different kinds of wood, a million and a half neres farming lands; two million acres of lands covered with ash, elm, pine, spruce, balsam, tamarac and birch (red, white and black). There 'were ten miles of white pinc in one stretch. Three known salt springs, marble by the mile, under which lies a beautiful red slate, and under the slate the Nipigon'red sandstone. Silver, lead,copper, gold, ashestos and mica. Of the last it might be said that there were two thousand tons of the cheap mechanics' mica in sight on the surface. Lake Nipigon, it was stated, should be presprved by the Province as the Provincial fishing park. In giving aid to this railway they would ask the Government to make it compulsory to give a two-cent sec-ond-class rate. Lake Nipigon has over six hundred islands in it, and would be in time one of the grandest tourist spots in America.
-The Tmperinl Timited train between Montreal and Vanconver, B.C., introduced last summer by the C.P.R., will be again put on early in June. . The same time, one hundred hours, will be made.

#### Abstract

-Fort William, Ont.; is not allowing the march of progress to overlook the favorable opportunities there presented. A recent letter states that Mayor Jarvis and Allan Mellougall, delegates, have succeeded in having the Ontario Legislature ratify the agreement regarding Ogilvic's proposed mill and elevator, Also an agreement with the Mattawan Cron Mining Company for the proposed blast funace and copper refincry. They, likewise, prevailed on the Minister of Education to give Fort William a grant for a high school and hospital to be built. It will receive a per capita grant when completed. In Ottawa they were assured that a public building for the post office and custom house will soon be built in Fort William, and that considerable dredging would be done in Kammistiqua river this year.


-Ihe transmission of electric power froin Shawinigan lams, Que., to Montreal, is in process of realization. The Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company was recently given a large contract for work in process of construction at that point. 'The l'ittsburg Reduction Company, of Niagara Falls, is building a plant there with a capacity of 5,000 horse-power for the manufacture of aluminium, and has awarded to the Westinghonse Company a contract for four generators of 1,200 horse power each. The Shawinigan Water and Power Company has contracted with the Westinghouse Company for two generators of 5,000 horse power each, to be used in the manufacture of electric power for its customers. The manager stated, in a recent interview, that it was the intention of the company to make available at Montreal the great power which is now being developed. The company will, early in the coming summer, complete the works it has had in process of construction during the past year. These works consist of a canal and the necessary fiumes, etc., to develop 30,000 h.p., and the construction is such that this amount of power can easily be increased to 100,000 h.p. The works will be utilized during the coming summer for local manufacturing establishments, Montreal not to be reached before the spring of 1901.


#### Abstract

-The rapidly increasing demand for iron is causing development at all available points. A Kingston letter states Messrs. Meyers and Gordon, representing the Cataraqui Iron Smelting Company, have made the rollowing ofter: to that city: The company would put up a smelting works plant worth $\$ 225,000$, with it capacity to sinelt from 100 to 200 tons of iron ore daily; they would employ from 100 to 200 hands; they would transier their offices, ele., here; they would pay from $\$ 100,000$ to $\$ 100,000$ yearly in salaries. In return they asked from the eity a liee site, exemption from taxation and a bouss of $\$ 1,000$ yearly for 1.5 years, which would be tibout equal to $\$ 35,000$ cash bonus now.

The projected line will be atout two humared miles in length, and will run from Sault Ste Marie to Missinable, on the U.P.R., with a branch to Mehipicoter. The proposed ralway is one of the numerous enterprises which the capitalists have in contemplation they expect, it was stated, to make expenditures or investments to a total amount of from $\$ 16,000,000$ to $\$ 18,000,000$. The estimated cost of the riilway referred to is $\$ 0,000,000$, and they will build the line without issuing a dollar of stock of asking for a dollar of eash subsidy, the promoters modertake, if the land gront is made, to employ 5,000 men along the line of railway and to establish an agency in Toronto, and another in the Old Country; to facilitate the settlement of the land which may be granted. They are crecting works for smelting nickel and iron at Sault ste. Marie and will probolly build rolling mills also at a cost of $\$ 2,000,000$. . Four large steamers exceeding in carrying capacity any vessels now on the lakes are being built in tengland and will be in operation next summer carrying ore from Michupicoten harbor to the smelting works at Midand, Hamilton and Deseronto. The four ships, it was claimed, would cause an expenditure of $\$ 500,000$. Dhese and other statements were made by Mr. Clergue, a representative, in support of his proposition to the Government. The premier promised a careful consideration of the proposition.

The arrivals of Quensland butter are fairly large and exceed those of any previous season. A fortnight sinee the Rome brought 1,45 buses, and the Orimaln last, week 2.403, while the Mimalaya, due ipt two days, maries 2,168 . On March Brd, the Outona brought 1,060 boxes, so that the total quantity of Queensland butter arriving in March will he 7,616 bones, equal to $3,50 S$ ewts. The "Choicest" quality is making 86 s to $88 s$, while "Tinest" brings ses to Sts . The Copenhagen Ofticial Quotation remains unchanged, with a firm maket in Demmark, but the Hamburg quotation has been raised 2 marks. The price is now down to such a level that a fair mumer of retailers are able to sell at a shilling a pound, ahit this, of course, canses a larger consumption. Supplies other than Austrulian are small compared with last year, being 25 tons a week less. The lowse price at which all kinds of butter are selling must bring about a larger consumption and interfere with the sale of margarine. Canadian butter is being re-shipped back to Canadn, and already this season over 10,500 packages have been re-shipped to the United States. -Cheese.-The marlect continues firm, although business shows no incyease in voltime; prices, however, remain the same. The limalaya is bringing nearly 1,200 crates of Victorian cheese and 213 cwtes from New Sonth Wales.
-Iron is growing wealier except in Bessemer pig. which is held at $\$ 24.90$ at Pitsburg, in spite of small sales of eastern at lower figures. Anihracite No. 1 has sold lithe above $\$ 23$, and basic at $\$ 22.50$, with eastern forge offered at $\$ 20.00$, al Pittsburg. Tn finished products no further change :ppears except in' refined birs, which sell in large orders close to 2 cts . at Philadelphin, and in plates which are selling at 2 cts. or less at both markets. "The Tron Age" this sums up the situation in the fron trade: "rithe iron malket is disnppointingly quiet. New business is not developing as it should do at this season. We are now on the threshiold of the second quarter, and the stimulating influence of spring trade shonld begin to be felt. Here and there some transactions of fair size are reported, but in a general way the trade is extremely dull. The situation is commonly regarded as a deadlock between buyers and sellers, hut this is more apparent than real. Most manuftetur:ug interests are well supplied with work taken some time since and are pushing protiction rigorously. Record-breaking outputs are reported. This does not indicate unsafisfactory conditions. "As long as the mills and furnaces are alble to keep in operation at high presswe, and the great producers manifest no anxiety as to the future, there is litile warrant for taking a gloomy view of the situation, Nevertheless, it would be much-more encouraging to find buyers disposed to anticipate their wants a little more fucely than they are now doing. As it is, those who need material are buying from hand to mouth waiting, and perhaps hoping, for a slump in prices."
-The advance of 1 ct . in hemlock sole lentier has led to some heary transactions, though in fact but a restoration of prices paid in January. It restricts orders for boots ant shoes, which are small, although shipments continue aboit 7 per cent. larger than last year for March, exceeding those of other years still more. Wides at Chicago continue to decline, though slowly. Ex.

## 'IME BEST INDUCEMENT'.

'L'o be sure of a trade that will last it is necessary to sell good goods. While this is thue of all lines, it is particularly applicable to the retail shoe trade. All representative shoe stores keep good shoes, but it does not follow that the majority of the shoes sold are sure to give satisfaction in so far ths their cost is concerned.
In opening a shoe store, or shoe department, a mistake is too often made in offering as leaders, low-priced lines at a small margin of profit to prove, even at sight, that there are bargains in waiting. The enstomer who buys a pair of shoes for $\$ 1.50$ under the belief that they are really worth \$2 nationally feels that fifty eents has been saved. In the course of a month or two, if the shoes show premature Wear or yip, this gives way to a feeling that the shoe dealer took advantage, and his store is not only avoided by that person in future, but is repeatedly spoken of in a way not calculated to increase his sales. Were the shoes sold for $\$ \$ .50$ without any reference to their pretended extm value, no harm would have been done beyond the possibility of the shoes not giving good wear. 'lhe tanlt was on the part of the enstomer who probably insisted on getting al low-priced article.
The featof being thought high-priced prevents many dealers trom carrying and constantly introducing the best grades of shous. The man who pays so for the shoe he waits, will not be persuaded to buy a pair for $\$ 3$. . . .llhe persoin who is accustomed to a $\$ 3$ shoe will marely be made to yeara pair of \$2 shoes, except they are being sacrificed at some closing out sale. Even then he is not sure but what they are inferior to what he has been wearing. Tt is both rasier and safor to intioduce higher-pried shoes than lower grades. The hetter aticle is never concealed. Paying more for a shoe than usual canses a certain feeling of pride in the purchaser, and there is a probalitity that he may refer the purchase to an intimate friend. Buts should he buy a chemper shoe he is more apt to pull it under his chair. this one idea, acted on or avoider, has made or disposed of money in the retail shoe tade.

## THE BUDGET AMEENDMITNT.

C hat this House is of opinion that a system of mutal hade proference between Great Britain and Treland and the colonies would greatly stimulate increased production in trade and commerce hoween these countries, and would thus promote and maintain the unily of the Ennpire, and that nothing which falls shont of the complete realization of such a policy should be considered as fimal and sutisfictory."

The situation of the two parties in Parliment is a somewhat curious one. A fer days prior to the Budget being introduced a debate was sprung upon the House on the proferential tarife question. The object was apparent, as we pointed out while this discussion was in

progress. The Goverument had decided to extend the preterence given to lbritish goods lirom 25 to $331-3$ per cent., unknown, of course, to the Opposition. They were-sought-to be canght in a by-means cleverly made trap, The resolution was so worded as to commit those who voted against it to an apparent opposition to a preference being given to Great Britain, which the Opposition could not show, yet; if they voted for the resolution it committed them to a support of the Govermment, to Which, of course, they decidedly objected, though the point of difference between them and the Govermment is not a vital one. If the resolution as amended by Sir Charles Jupper is regarded from a non-partizan standpoint it declares nothing to which any serious objection conld be raised by a supporter of the Govermment. The main part inerely expresses a conviction that is system of mutual inter-Tmperial preference would benofit the Empire at large. Sir Wilfrid and his collengues could endouse this declaration, without the slightesi inconsistency.

The other section which reads, "nothing short of the complete realization of such a policy should be considered final and satistactory." The word "should" in this clatuse is badly chosen, for the meaning cvidently is that, "nothing short of such complete realization," ought to be or can be "considened final and satistactory". The coupling of "satisfactory", with "final" was not well adrised, for a policy may loe "satishactory" so far as it goes; as a first step, which step would not be acceptable as a finality. Stripped then of its merely rhetorical trimmings the two phases of the discussion on the preferential farifl amount to this, the Government approves of a prelerence being given to Great Britain without reciprocity; while the Opposition approves of a preference being granted on reciprocal terms.

As the preference is regarded by the Government as a
free, unsolicited, unrewarded gilt to England, we may Well ask why such an act of pure generosity is being extended? If conceded with the hope of thereby developing the sale of Canadian goods in England, the gitt, socalled, is mere bait to catch fish, or if it is in relurn for past favours, received by Camadi from England, it is no tree gift, but in either case is a quid pro quo, past or expected. The preference has been given rather as a tentative step in the dircetion of Tree Trude than with any other object, and is evidently so viewed by mannfacturers who have protested against such a policy as adverse to their interests.

The leading English joumals seem puzaled to account for this policy, and with one voice they regard the expectation of its leading to reciprocal concessions by England, which would discriminate against the United States as hopeless. The resolution presented by the Opposition does not state what would be a "complete realization" of a reciprocal policy by Great Britain adopting " a system of mutual trade preference." In the entire alisence of explicit statements by the Govermment of what the policy of a British preference is based upon, and of a definite statement by the 0 pposition as to what they would demand in return for such preference, we confess to a conviction that the ideas of those on either side the Fouse are very vague, msetled, and certanly in no condition to be worthy of being regurded as "final or satisfactory."

## A BIG DTSCOUN'I FOR ENCTATS JTRADERS.

Our English friends who are pushing buthess with Canada will be much gratilied to learn that they now have a big discount allowed in their favour by the Canadian Customs. All goodsmade in Great Britain cntering this country are now subject to one-third less duty than the
same class of goods from the States or any other countrics. Whatever is the ordinary duty on foreign goods is reduced ly one-third when they are imported trom Great, Britain, if ecertified to be of British manufacture. Witli the polition aspects of this entarged preference in their favour the British exporters, happily, have no concern. Business is business, we in Camada conecile one-third of the dity to Old Country manfachures, and it is for them to show appreciation of this large privilege prompt ly, as we or they call hardy expect such a privilege to be continued unless it is used. We would, therefore, urge British manfacturers to at onee seize the opportunity now offered and not to postpone considering it to the ruture.

## CIVTC MANAGEMTENT OF THA ROADS:, :

The condition of the streets of this city at the present: lime is such as to make the most indiferent emquite why sueh a state of things is allowed to continue week alter week at this time of the year, when all past experidnce has shown what must be expected at the break up of winter. The composition of the City Comeil has undoubte lly heen improped, as a result, of the hate municipal elections, hut and to say, the eondilions of streets has mot. It maty, perhans, le justly sad that the blame for this is more on the old Council than the present one. Pat that with not altugether reconcile the eitizens. to the lact that all the principal thoroughtianes are in a disgracelul state, filthy beyond deseripuion, and all the side residential strees are mot passable, except at the risk of acecidents that are comstantly wemering, at all hours day and night.
All eomphaints are inswered in the old stereotyped phase that there is no money to to what is needfint to remedy matters. The present Council rely for their justification on the fact, that all the reveme that was arsilable for this year's purposes was appropriateid by the old Comeil in December last, as required by the charter, and Hat: then was the time to have provided for a sulticiency: of mems to keep he streets in a manner fitting for a city pretending to be in the forefront of civilisation. Instead of thas providing lor this primary reguisite of civic econony, the grant was starved, with the now evident intention of using the reserve fund from which to hake what might tie required loe neesssary purpuses on the streets. This could mot he legally done without legispative sanction, which was relused at the late session.
As was stated in this Journal last week, the reserve fund was not intended for any' such purpose and the ofd Council was not, justified in depending on this expedient: for tiding over the dificulty. In a measure, therefore, the Oity Comein of to-day has a reasonable ground for throwing the blame lor the present conditions on their immediale predecessors. The citizens generally believe, with reason, that the present Comail is a decided immrovenent on, the hast, one, ...The telorm, element, as it is calleit, is now supposed to be prodnminat in the Com-: cil. But, in view ol the present condition of our strects, and what it is likely to he for the whote of this your, it should be remembered that: most of the Aldermen who adopted the new charter with its iron-elad reserve fund chanse, which was intended to prevent aluises, were in the Conucil when the annual appropriations were made in December last, and the principal ones are there still.

Th is passing strange that those inteligent menbers
did not realise the unwisdom of entrenching on the principle of a reserve fund for untoreseen ciinergencies in order to provide tor everyday works. Tho do so is simply to perpetuate the picious system of past years After all the revenue that was legally a a ailable that "Decenber was appropriated lor various purposcs, some of which might well have waited; it-was well unclerstood that not enough was set aside for strect cleaning pirposes. On several occasions, when the new charter was under consideration, before it was passed, it was pointed ont in these columus that if its terms were acted upon the alditional revenues that it would produce would not be available for appropriation and expenditure until the year 1901. ETintsend of realising that fact the old Comeil recklessly vent on in the old way, trustingto the rescive fund, which is noy heing used for purposes it never was intended tor, to get. over the difficultics comected with dirty and impassable streets. If the city is ever to be placed in a good financial position the principle of a reservo fund must be maintained and the other menns provided by the charter for carrying on the ordinary works of the city adopted.

The position tolay is jeculian: We have some of our best citizens chosen as Adermen and yet some fat or ather attracts more of their time and attention than does the real important interests affecting the general welfare of the city. The Roarts Committee is the great spending committee of the City Comacil. It is not cur intention lo spenk disparagingly of any of its menibers. Tt must, however, strike any one aequainted with the city as sim"gular that when the commitiees were formed, under the anspiees of the reformers, that this all-important committee was composed of members. from the chaiman onwards, taken from the small and outlying wards, and the three city wards, the three large divisions of St. Antoine, St-Lawrence, and St. Touis Tards, had mo representative whatever on it. That was surely in oversight, or was it intentional? If the latter, it was a most unjust arrangement, and may have hald much to do with the condition of the streets in the mincipal business and residential portions of the city cver since the snow blockade of last month. Above all others, it is important, that the Roads Committee should be fairly representative in its character, chosen from all sections of the city. Inslead of that being the case the Ronds Committee is composed of Aldermen from the two extreme ends of the eity only and from the small wards, whether their population, or amount of revenue contributed, is considered.

## LOANS TO BANK OFPICERS.

The Committee on Banking and Currency at Washington has reported on the Bill introduced in the Senate to prohibit making loans to bank ofticors. The Bill is regarded as the only remedy for aumeril of long standing in the banking system of the Tnited States, which is said to be "its chief blemish."... From the establishment of the national bunking system in 1865 to October 81,1896 ," 330 national banks are stated to have faled. The failure in the case of 52 of these banks was cansed, in part at least, by excessive lonas to officers mit directors, while 93 of them were wrecked by the defalation of officers and frandulent management-a total in the two classes of 145 , or nbout 44 per cent. of the total.

In the same report as the above is quoted from, the banking system of the States is declared to be "a most
admirable system," with the exception of the abovenamed "blemish." . We do not see how a banking stss" tem can be "most admirable" which has a record of 185 national bamk failures in 30 yoars, and a very much larger number of another class of banks, which are included in the system. $\cdots$ For instance, there vere 27 United States banks, other than 'mational," which failed last year, a year of the greatest prosperity. It would take four figures to state the number of bunk lailures'in the States in the last 25 yeirs, under this most adiniable system. The tact is, the American bunking system is the worst in the world. The Controller of the Currency recommends legislation prohibiting loans by ljanks to the officials; except upon approval by the directors, and such prohibition should be made to inclide directors.' Such a recommendation by the Comptroller, who is practically the Gorcrmment's bank insjector, implies that, at present such loans to olliecrs and directors are made without submission to the Board of Directors, which is certainly a very loose part of this vounted system of hank machinery.
It is alleged as an objection to this prohibition, that capable men will not serve as olfieers, and directors, if they are placed under the restriction which it imposes. In answer to thits suggestion, it has been urgou that if a man wishes to beconie an officer or director ot a bauk for the purpose of becoming a borrower, he would not be the most suitable person to become a trustee of the stockholders and depositors of the institution. All this reads as rery stramge to those couversant with the system in rogue in Conada. We know nothing in this comutry of a class of men who seek a bank appointment as officer or director in order to borrow the bunk's money. Our bank officials, the office staff, ase alsolutely prohibited from borrowing from the bank they serve, But the directors of a Camadian bank are under no such cast-iron restriction. As a rule, they are business men of the lighest standing, who, like all others of their class, reyuire bunking facilities in the conduct of their business. These are provided muder the ordinary conditions, by being aprowed by the manager and endorsed by the hoard ot directors.

The Ancricin custom of the President of a bank being also the munager does not obtain in Canada, save in very exceptional cases. We have recently had a lamentable illustration of the evil of such an arrangemient, as has been shown in a large number of cases in the Crited States, where one man occupying both positions; has led to the grossest bank fratuds on record; as it did in the Ville Marie Bank. In Canada the public are informed every month', in a sworn statement issued by the Government, what is the "Aggregate amount of loans to directors and firms of which they are partuers,". Each bank has to furnish this information, and ans we directorate and their firms are well known the public cin judge how Car such louns ane justified, or not. According to the Anerican system, this intormation is not allowed to be published even by the comptroller in hisamat teports on the athars of the banks. His Report tor last year is hefore us, and we find no item refering to directors liabilities in the statement of any hank. Sn this respect, as in others, the Camadian banking system is incomparably superior to that of the United States: We; thereLore commend a study of it to the Senate at Washington, the members of which seem quite at sea in regard to the question of a bank making loans to its offcers.

## WITH THE RETATLBRS.

The dry goods trade is at present experiencing conditions for which it would be dificult to find precedent. Values are appreciating to a level which old and shrewd buyers, as well as the young ambitions renturers view with no little hositation lest, as in the case of stocks and "boomed" articles of merchindise held by trusts or cornered by syndicates, a sudden drop may occur. But the comditions affecting dry goods values are borne out by facts having their origin in the primary markets where the raw materials are found to be in short supply, as ngainst an extra demand from all over the world. In wool this lact is proven by the regularly recurring London sales which, in past years, were given but passing notice by Canadian uscrs, but now are spoken of as freely and looked forward to as earnestly by the small mamulacturer in the rural district as though the sales were to be held in the township adjoining his own.
In the cotton market similar conditions exist, though not governed in the same mamer from any distinct point. In the great producing centres of the South factories are springing up as speedily as quiek-thinking minds can negotiate. The products of these new factories must be marketed. New fields are soughe in addition to the recognized home and loreign demand which are constantly growing and this results in an advance in values; alded by a short erop, until prices have elimibed to a height which causes all goods of this product to be increased. Linen is likewise affected. For many months the great factories in Ireland have been taxed to their utmost capacity, this condition prevailing to such in extont as to cause late orders, which in past seasons would have been hailed with plensure or sought at much expense, to be practically turned down, or advances placed on values to such an extent as to cause hesitation in getling them filled.
Silk, the pride of the market, and the envy of ther cheaper tabrics; also howed her head in subuission to the decree that bectuse of a shortage of raw material, an extra demand oceasioned through prosperous times and additional uses to which it was loeing put through the everchanging tancies of fashion; there must necessarily be more money paid il its possession is required. "Tho these natural caluses is added a higher price in all chemicals enployed in clyeing. Some of these have appreciated in value to an extent. which were no other causes assigned, would suggest an advance in printed gooils of whatever mamilacture. Side by side with all these conditions which have aimed directly at the comiter of the retailer, to the genema merchant at the obscure combry vilage as well as to the emporiums of fashion in the great cities, has come the voluntary advance in wages to erimployees in almost all factories. This also nded to the cost of producing the cloth: Jastly may be mentiond the fact: of heary formaces in machinery, packing loxes, cte., froin the nail which holds the enver to the planer that sumbthes"

That these conditions are to lo soon reversed is imporbable. That values in dry goods will take a sudden drop is beyond beliel from any recognized guarter. Highost prices have not yet been reached. The enuses which are keeping them on the upward move are the causes here mentioned: Certain lines such as the various blacks in. suitings have been advanced beyond others owing to the continuation of the war, which merely increased a de-
mand which had alrendy reached a high level.
While all conditions warant the beliel that goods now being purchased are boing secured on a steadily rising nurket, which will remain above the present level suffieiently long to insure plenty of ime for their regular disposil, it must not be forgotion that much more capital is now invested in ilry goods, because of the simple fact that every yard of saluable goods is now worth considerable more than a year ago. This applies equally well to the great varicty il motions, gloves, hosicry, etc., which, now selling all it proportionately higher price, shonk canse the dry goods department of the general store to show a reeerd mark in profits for the present year.

## SENTHNCLS IA THE CONSPIRACY CASE.

On the :HAst Marel James Baxter and Ferdinand Lemienx were galled up for sentence having been found guilty of comsjiving to delimud the Ville Marie Bank. Betore passing sentence the prisoners were asked the usual question as to whether they had ought to say. Baxfer thereupon atowed he was imecent, as his transactions with tho bank were such as he considered he had a right to carry through. He then threw himself on the mercy of the Court, ploading pathetically for consideration of his wile and lamily, ats well as his own advanced age. Leminux had not a word to sily. Mr. Justice Wurtele said, it would have been well for both prisoners to have been honest, as they occupied positions in which they could have won general respect. He thought Baxter ought have considered his wife and family belore engaging in a erime which haid brought thom such misery. As Judge he had his duty to do and it would be done. He said, a serious miscirriage of justice would hate occurred had the prisoners mot been convicted. He alluded to the painfal sufferings inflieted on many poor depositors by the bank's failure, to which calimity eren several doaths were atheibutable, and that failure had been precipitated ly the trands committed by the prisoners. He then sentenced danes baxter to in term of five years in the St. Yincont de lian ponitentiary. Ferdinand Lemieux was given the same, but, ats he was already under a sentence of two yeurs, one of them would run concurrently with the honger term, so that he will have to seve six years in the penitentiary. By steady, good conduct these sentences may be shortened a few months. For an ex-bank manager and a citizen who lived in costly style in his own residence on a lashionable street, to have been driven by eriminal greed into the cell of a penitentiary is an awlut tate, yet not a whisper is heard of commiseration or sympathy for these rictims of their own unbridted lust for unlawful grains.

## WILL PRLCES OF RRON GO DOWN?

Those conversant with the past fluctuations in the prices of iron and steel will be disposed to regard their decline as a certainty; for expansion and contraction have followed ench other so regularly since records have been kept as to ostablish a law; for haw, in such a relation, is nothing more than the regular sequence of facts. While this may be admitted the question remains as to when the tide of advancing prices of iron will reach flood tide and begin to recede, is in past yens. As usual there are two classes of opinions, for men's judgments are swayed by their interests, the "wish is father to the
thought" on both sides. Some twenty years ago iron rose over 71 jer cent. in al lew months, and then as suddenly dropped over 38 per cent., to within $\$ 5$ per ton of the figure it had risen from. Six years iater an advance occurred of over 120 per cent. This adivance was maintained little over half a year, then there was a drop of \$22 per ton, within $\$ 3$ per ton of the figure prevailing prior to the rapid advance. These arc extreme cases, but the record of prices in the iron and steel trades show frequent allvances and declines on a considerable scale. As it rule the more rapid and extreme the rise, the sooner was there a reaction to the old figure, or near it.
In the old land prices are controlled by Irommasters: Associations, the langer producers thronghout the iron districts working as a league to fix prices and to stop objectionable competition by well-known manoeuvres. This is the case also on this side, and it is umerstood that, when, lavourable conditions exist, there is an understanding established between the chief producers on both sides the Athatic. Quotations of the prices of ore, pig iron, and coke, are no criterion of the cost of producing manufactured iron, becmuse the mints, the conteries, and the smelting furnaces, are mainly owned by the same proprietors, or those with whom they are financially associated. There is no open manket for the raw materials consumed in making finished fron, as the nuyers of such nuterials are the same persons who sell them. The mine and colliery department sell ore and fnel to the blast furnaces department, and the blast fumaces department sells to the rolling mills, but all these transactions are conducted by one firm or company: For book-keeping purposes cach section has to be treated as a distinet caterprise. 'Under such circumstances it is not possible for outsiders to judge accurately as to the economic conditions of the smelting and rolling iron industries.
Two things are, however, manifest. For some yenrs the railways in the ofd land, as well as those on this continent were finding it almost impossible to make both ends meat. Many Ancricin roads went into the hands of receivers. Duriing this long period the rails and rolling stock were run down to the lowest state. Since 1896-\% a ware of prosperity has risen high on this continent and in the old land, cansing enomous outlays to be made in milway plant, creating a demmed for irom and sted for rails and constructive purposes that has trxed the productive powers of those industries to their utmost cupacity. The same cause has led to the building of irom and steel ships on an muprecedented scale, with works sulsidiary to the ship-yard business. Incrensed amaments have also enlarged consumption and will do so for yars. In all forms of constructive work from cars and ships to the colosenl huildings of modern diys, the use of irom and sted has become so general as to be a mow olement in the trade, which, of itself, points to iron and steel permanently maintaining higher prices.

This new source of denand will, however, gradually develop larger productive powers. Should trade decline the consumption of tron and sted will shrink; then, if more or larger furnaces and rolling mills lave been binitt, as is now occurring, the consumption will fall so far below productive capacity as to cause a slump in prices. The problem of the day is, are there any signs of such conditions on the horizon, or, do those in sight indieate a prolonged continuance of the present vast demand for iron and stcel up to or in excess of the possible output? A leading British authonty seems hopefal of this year's prospects.
"In the United States the rate of pig iron output has
been nearly $1,500,000$ tons a year in excess of 1899. In Great Britain the increase of output has been at the rate of fully 250,000 tons over 189y, and in Germany and Belgium the adrance has been quite equal to that of the Inst two months of 1899 . Very lew people expect that before the end of the current year there will be any matterial slump in prices. On the other hand, there is no general expectation that the prevailing boom will be continued at its present level much beyoud the current year. It must not be overlookd that it has already lasted longer and has assumed greater dinemsions than any previous period of prosperity. It is no doubt true that every boom has its own special genesis and is to a large extent a law unto itsoll. That law in the present case may be summed up in three words-armaments, electricity and sanitation. These shibboleths ane still prominently to the front and appear likely to remain so: the minor demands are legion, and these are all pressing their clatims, so that there is really good cause to suppose that we have reached a permanently higher standard of iron and steel demands and of higher prices." There secms good ground tor regarding the maximum of prices for iron and steel to have been reached, consequently the next change will be to a lower stage, and, if it comes from adverse trade conditions the step downwards will be a considerable drop.

## THE GAS COMPANY'S STATIEAFRN.

The 53rd amual statement of this city's gas company shows that electrical lights are not reducing the consumption of gas. Durng the year the company put in 1,153 new services, and it sold 1,373 gas stores, and 473 gas fire apparatus. The income from gas was $\$ 63+1, s .1 \%$, from byc-products, $\$ 121,436$, gas stoves $\$ 2,548$, old met-als,- $\$ 3,131$, and rent of property $\$ 1,82 \%$, making a total revente of $\$ 763,760$. These is no mention of receipts from meter rents, which must be a very large anomi. The outlays for material, wages, tases, rent, insinance, lamp.s, had debts, and "miscellaneous" amounted to $\$ 390$,(i13. This left a net revenue of \$3is, 147 . The total anpital and bonds aggregate $\$ 3,878,714$. The dividends. paid anonitt to $\$ 2.49 .864$, and on bonds, $\$ 3 *, 951$, making $\$ 33 \%, 815$ as the amount devoted to returns on the company's capital. The capital stock is $\$ 2,998,640$, so thitit the dividends equalled 10 per cent. thereon, and as the bonds are $\$ 880,0 \%$, the interest paid thereon was 4.03 per cent., the average moount paid on the stock and boonds combined was $8 . i t$ per cent. The net revenue amometed to 9.26 per cent. on the total stock and bonds; that is, the total capital. This shows that the dividend of 10 per cent. could not have been pad were it not tor a harge amount of the capital, $\$ 880,074$, leing in bonds, on which 4 per cent. was paid. An item appears in the statement which is not as explicit as desirable, two things being mixed of a totally different nature. This item reads, "Interest on temporary loans and consumers' deposits, $\$ 6,712$. ." The Consumers' loans are given in another part pe the statment as $\$ 16,830$, but the amount of "tempormy loans" is not given, nor is it stated what revenue the company derived from "consumers" deposits." The temporary lonns varied no doubt during the year, but it is casy, or ought to be ensy, for an accountant to give the arerage of their amount and average time. The value of the meters in use ought to be stated with the revenue they yield, so that consumers could judge how far their rental was fair, nd the stockholders could judge what
this part of their property yiolded. It is also notable that the buhance sheet gives $\$ 32 \cdot, 610$ as the excess of assets over liabilities. It would be interesting to have an independent raluation of the works, mains, meters, lamps, accounts due and other assets, as we do not regard $\$ 322$,(6i.0, as much of a reserve on properties of a rapidly depreciable character, which are yalued it $\$ 4,464,630$.

## A FREE IMRADE DILEMAIA.

A large revenue is derived by the British Coverninent from tobaceo, in all its forms. The leal not being grown in the United lingdom, has been held, as well as its manulactured products may be fairly chargeable with customs or excise duties, for it is held to be a luxury and a duty upou it camot be regarded as of a protective nature. The situation is, however, undergoing a change. Experiments have been successiflly conducted for growing tobacco in treland. A leal has been grown which has a good merchantable value. Reports show that there is a good market for all the tobacco that ean be mised in hreland and that it would pay better than any other crop, or dairying, or cattle-riasing. There is already a demand tor some excise concessions to be grimted to lrish tobacco in order to encourage its growth. What are British free traders going to say about this?: If they stiflly refuse to recoguise an Hrisl industry of much promise by granting it some protection they will raise a ruction in lreland, and il they give some concession to Irish tobacco their sacred principle will be straned. Beacdick said: "lihen I said I would die a bachelor I did not think I should live till 1 were married." When tobacco was made the chief tax-bearer in the old land, it was never thought that it would become a native product and give rise to a large industry. We are not sanguine over trish tobaceo, but the local reports are remarkably favourable in regard to its quality. The tobacco industry of Treland will soon demand protection, and we venture to suy it will be granted $n$ spite of free traders' protests.

## AU'OMOBLLES AND AU'ROMOBLIE RACING.

On the same principle that horse-racing is regarded as a sport conducive to the breeding of a superio class of horses, antomolide racing may be considered helptul to the development of these carriages. Certainly it js haring this effect as well as being an invaluable adyortisement to the automobile builders. From in sporting point of view these machines are promising to introduco new features in racing contests. Instend of the contestants flying at full speed around a race comse extending a lew miles, or less, the struggle extends over hundreds of miles. As they have to pass through large numbers of towns and villages, where their coming excites intense interest, the racing powers of the nutomobile aro displayed before the entire population through whose district they travel. The display serves as a unique advertisoment, as well familiarises hundrets of thousands of people of all classes with the carrying and sjeed capacities of the machines.

In 1895 a race took phace between Paris and Bordenus; a distance of 730 miles. The road is hilly yet it was corcred by a Mr. Tevasseur in 48 honrs, he average speet being over 15 miles per hour. As the automobiles are to le used on ordmary ronds we regard this speed as excessive and most dangerous to themselves and other vehicles. In 1896 a race took place from Paris to Mar-
scilles, a distance of 1,100 iniles, which course wis ran in orythours, the average speed being $161-3$ iniles per hour, allhough it occurred during at lierce gale of wind in the teeth of the drivers. Mr. Levisseup was killed in this race, by being thrown out while swerving to aroid a dog. This was a very significantitecident, one which does the antomobile jidustry more ham than all the echat caused by rapid racing. Travellers, is a rule, preler salety to speed, like the (gneen did in taking th hours to run from Windsor to Holyheal, which trij, usually takes hall: that time. Naturally, this marvellous feat created great enHusiasm in France. The government even posted troops on the road to keep the course elear. But, even troojs could not control one dog, to salve whose lite the chic.' competitor sacrificed his own.

We lear the general use of antomobiles an their nse tor racing displays will he long postponed if they are roun at such high rates of epred as to necessitate troops to keep the course elear, and the chaining up of all the dogs in the districts they haverse.
In England in 1890 the necessury ate was passed by parliament do permit the ruming of automobiles on the rcad, which a presions haw prohibited. The new act arly allowed a speed to be attained of ta miles an hour, and an this law is still in force, road mang is said to be an impossibility in England; and the only contests possible there have to he conlined to the track. The tirst aytonotile race in Engtand taok place in comection with the second ammal rum of the Mator Car Club to Sheen House, where there is a private cement track. The winner of this rate, established a motor cycle record for one mile, doing the distance in 2 minutes and 8 seconils, over $2 s$ miles per hour.

At the beginning of last year the Notor Car Club of lengland set itsell to deal with the guestion of motor racing and promoted iluring the year a harge number of races in L. London and various provinctial towns of England with in inavellous amome of sucecss. These races were practically conlined to motor tricycles, and the sportwas of sulliciently exceting a character to appeal to the public tasto in a marked maner. It is thought by those who have withessed automobile aces that they would be highly popular in Camada, us they are very much nore axeiting ban ordinary cycle racing, as a very much higher rate of speed is attained. Ihe sight of four or five nen men travelling at 40 miles an hour aromed a very highly Janked track provides as muche excilouent as the ordinary man reguires. One of the most suceesslud and populai manuficherers of alutomobiles calls altention in our columins to his carriages, which have won the highest encomiums for their ease of mangement; conomy, comfort and above all for their superior safely. Those who contomplate introducing automobile meing into Canala, Where such displays woukd dan litge croveds, should lose nio tianie in commmicating with this firm: Such races would have to be on prepared tracks at our joads are not adipted to thuse velieles whein used as macers.

But, it is quite a mistake to regard these self-propelled cariagess, as mere meing machines, the meing fontures weir simply developed to "display their possibilities of speed, wad power to andure the strain of a trip eovering anny hmidreds of miles, without any delay: This form of currage is being built in vations styles"expressly for genema purposes; just as aic orditary rehicles draw by horses, The demand for them in Great Britain and on the Continent is very large as they are now so buill as to

De even safer and inore readily and, quickly controlled than any other carriage with horses. An antomobile never shies, or bolts, or kicks, or falls sick, or: "eats its head ofl" in a stable, when out of scrvice. It costs far less to store, keep, rm, and maintain in repair than are ordinary vehicles with horses and drivers. The motive power is quite easy to manage, and in every respect is so advantagenus that the automobile is certain to be the earriage ol the future fro all classes.

## AIDS 'IO FRAUDULENY TRADERS.

d.a two recent issues we gave the details of two insolvent estates for the purpose of exposing the abominable system by which insolvents assets become the prey of a number of oficials so that alter they have had their incals oll the joint the creditors have only the bones to pick. We have another statement of the attairs of an insolvent which points another moral, though we hardly regard it as capable of adoming at tale. A trader down the river some time last year assured his ereditors with the coolnoss of an iceberg and the face of: an ammallo that, over and above all his liabilities, he had a clear surplus of $\$ 8,000$. This brass of eheek and brag of tongue were olfective in securing him in large supply of goods. Last month he cane here to make an arrangement with his creditors, on the basis of a settlement at about one-third. On a statement being presented it was lound that his entive assets mounted to $\$ 7,705$, and his delts to $\$ 12,841$, leaving a deficit of $\$ 5,135$, instead of a sup phe of $\$ 8,000$ ats he elamed was the case last yenr. He lad over-estimated his assets by $\$ 13,135$, when their total amount was only $\$$ \$r, \%05! How stich an over-estimate cain have been made is too hard a conimdrum for us to solve, so we leave it lor the creditors to wory their buans over. In his three stores his entire stock of gooils only amounted to雨, 483 , in one there being $\$ 2$, , $\% 4$, in an sconel $\$ 1,20 \%$, and third, $\$ 1,501$. I' Io pile up such stocks of goods he had received merchandise to cxtent of $\$ 12,541$. His book debts amounted to $\$ 3,744$. So that, if out of the $\$ 12,841$ he had really sold goods to the value of \$3,\%4t, allowing only 10 per cent. profits to have been cliarged, he ought to have had stocks representing $\$ 9,441$, whereas they only stood at $\$ 0,483$. As the goods were chicfly boots and shoes and dry goods the theory that they evaporated will not-explain this difierence. How, then, did they disappear, That is mother comudrum. A third is this, How came it to pass that merchints turnished goods to the extent of $\$ 1.2,841$ to a jetailer whose entire stock in three stores and book debts, soon after $\$ 12,841$ worth of goods were received ondy anounted to $\$ 9,22 r^{\prime}$ ? Sellers must be tumbling head over heels to get ride of goods on credit to utterly impecunious buyers in order for such a state of things to exist as is disclosed by the statement belore us. Such reckless extensions of credit are aids to traudulent traders; who, however, none the less richly deserve severe pumishineut, such as they wonld get if we had a wise Insolvency Act. Just 198 yents ago Swilt Wrote Gulliver"s I'ravels in which ocents this passnge, in a description of the laws of the Jilliputians. ESince it is incessary that there should be a perpetan intercourse of: buyiug and selling, and deding upon credit where frand has to law to purish it the honest den er is always undone and the Fhave gets the ndraitage." After toro centuries of warning from experience we are not so wise as the people of Liliput, or the young sclolar who peined that preguant sentence relating to fraudulent traders.

THE N. Y, CENTRAL VS. THE ERTE CANAL.
, oc a vara
The movement to enlarge the Erie Canal has aroused Mr. Callaway, President of the New York Central Railway, to mak some remarks thereon of a decidedly dis agreable nature to the promoters of the camal improvement. . He affirmed, that glain and grian products were the main feights crirried by the canal; and that the New York Central could carry all the giain and grain products from Buffalo to New York for an amount of money equal to interest on the proposed appropriation of $\$ \$ 5$, 000,000 forimproving the Erie Catial and the cost of conducting the enlarged canal. Mr. Callaway said that the price per bushel for carrying grain was now so low that even arperfect canal would not be able to carry grainany lower than the New York Central could and make money. When Mr. Callaway was asked about General Greene's statement, he said: "General Greene may have some other way of gelting at the facts than $I$, but if you will look at the figures I have here, taken from the State reports, and therefore presumably accurate, you will find that they tell a very different story. From the year 1898 the total tonnage by the canal was $1,210,956$ tons, and of this $540,-$ $2{ }^{r} 2$ tons or nearly onc-half, was grain and grain products. In 1897 it was 604,929 tons, out of a total of $1,270,775$ tons; in 1896, 928,423 tons, out of a total of $1,539,03 \mathrm{~A}$ tons; in 1895, which was an off year, $4: 20,092$ tons, of a total of 1,891,454 tons, and in 1893, 1,362, 676 tons, out of a total of $1,940,783$ tons. You can trace it along back as far as you like but $I$ do not believe you will find a year where grain amounted to but one-sixth of the total traffic. As to General Greene's statement that grain constitutes but a tenth of the total tonnage of the railways, crossing New York State, that is absurd, so far as the New York .Central is concerned. He reiterated the statement that he-had no intention of entering into a controversy with the Canal Commission, but only wanted the New York Central not to be misrepresented. "Why," said Mr. Callaway, "the New York Central road is to-day carrying a bushel of grain from Bulfalo to New York for practically the same price Uncle Sam charges for transporting a letter between the same points. This is the cheapest transportation in th world." Tevidently there will be a railway. versus ennal fight before the Bric is onlargen, which will probably prevent the work ever being accomplished.

## DELAGOA BAY ATWARD.

Although a large space is being devoted to the award of the Swiss arbitrators regarding the Daligoa Bay Railway, it is really a small affair:'; so far as the public are concerned. Under circumstances needless to detail, the government of Portugal found it expedicnt a fow years ago to expropriate the milway across its teritory from Delagor Bay to the westem horders of its South African possessions. The sum to be paid to the ovners of the rond and those having a lien upon it was submitled to arbitration. It has triken over ten years to oltain an award, during which period the bondholders and other ereditors have been deprived of revenue on their clains. The award is that, $\$ 3,200,000$ be paid to the clamants, with 5 per cent: simple interest, from 25 th June, $18 s 9$, to date of payment, which will be about $\$ 1,760,000$, if paid on no before June next... The costs will also be paid. The full claim will, therefore, be over five millions of dollars.

This is a large sum for a small, poverty stricken State like Portugal to pay, but there is'al valuable asset, not, however, equal to the award. The hope is expressed that Great Britain will pay the award and in return take over the railway, as well is Delagoa Bay, which would have much value as the bearest seaport to her new colony, the Transvan. If the system of interational arbitration cannot be made to evolve awards nore expeditiously than 10 or 11 years, it will suffer' from very serious prejudice. A board of pailway engineers and managers could have acguired oll the facts of the case in half a year, and been able to give a julgment thereon in a month afterwards: The leading London papers differ widely as to the justice of tho ayury, but; as we have said, save as an illustration of the extraordinary delay incident to an international arbitration; and the remote chance of Delagoa Bay becoming a lhritisl port, the affair has no importance.

## AN EPIDEMTC OT FRAUD IN ENGLAND.

The plethorn of money in England has put many fools in possession of large sums, if we may judge by the numerons casces of fraud recently revealed in English law courts. In one case a metal merchant of Glasgow agreed to pay a money broker $£ 25,000$ for shares said to be worth that sum, which it turned out were not good value of $£ 5$,000 . The frand was exposed, the deposit ordered to be returned, and the contract annulled. In another case a Joondon jourmal was stied for libelling a company promoter. He got a surprise in Court for it was proved, out of his own mouth, that he had started 40 companies. one of which was to establish a religious newspaper after the Kansis pattern. Every one of them was proved to be a fake, so he stopped his action against the newspaper and was glad to escape arrest for perjury as well as frand. Another exposure was that of a note shaver whose rascality caused him to be denounced as " $a$ ruthless daring bird of prey." Banks had refused to recognise him in any way, yet at 35 years of age, he had made a very large fortune out of his victims. Another note shaver was roughly used in Court for trying to rob an American life insurance company of $£ 4,000$ by obtaining a policy on a bad life by fraud. A third member of that fraternity was ordered to cancel a deed binding a borrover of $£ 300$ to pay: 8600 for it in two months. The Court ordered the principat to be repaid with only 5 per cent. interest. and defendant to pay costs. All the above cases were reported in a recent Reviow. The British public seem to be losing their proverbial prudence in moncy matters. The law Courts, however, have dealt so stern]y with cases of fraud by money lenders that their operations may be checked, as they need to be nearer home.

## A MILTIONATRE'S CONTINENTAT SPECTAT.

We have records of several trips made across this vast continent by single trarellers, but there is no record of one such as was made last week by a wealthy American nor is it probable it will be repeated by him or any othor traveller. On the 27th March last Mr. Alexander Rowland Peacock, cxecutive offece and a large sharoholder in the Carnegic iron and steel works, was at Los Angoles, Californin.- He received at noon a telegram from Pitthorg summoning him to attend a mecting of the Carnegie Company to be held mid-day on the 31st, at which his attendance was of extreme importance. He went to the
railway office to secure a berth for the Santa Fe train to leave att $6 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. All had been sold. He then asked, as coolly as it he wanted a cigar: "What would a special cost to Pittslurg?" 'Ihe General Passenger Agent took this as a joke, until he lound the enquiry was made seriously: 'To his remark about the large charge, Mr. Peacock said, "Oh, that's all right. I expect to pay for such a service, of coursc; now, what will it cost?" He was informed that $\$ 3,000$ would be about the price. "I'll take it,", said Mr.'P. quictly, as though it wore a trifling purchase. The irain was prepared, orders given along the line to have thie tralfic adapted to its passage, and the entire joumey of not far from 3,000 miles, right across the American continent, was made by this remarkable "special" at an average speed of aloout 40 miles per: hour!

Whe incilont throws light upon the extraordinary success of the colossal Carnegic enterprise. While men of small idens would have been worrying themselves into a lever over being disappointed a berth on a railway train, and telegraphing excited messages to get the meeting adjeurned, this masterful executive officer instantly and coolly decided to be present at whatever cost:" He used $110^{\circ}$ more words in hiring is special train to carry himself 2,900 miles than others do in buying a ticket for a ten minutes' trip. "T’ll take it,", was all he said, when $\$ 3,000$ was stated to be the cost. That settled he quietly fixed his valise, and smoked his cigar in all serenity while the train was being made up. That man hardly needed a locomotive to draw his special, for he has a store of dynamic energy equal to any task or any emergency. But the machinery of the Carnegie works requires an cxtra sized dynamo to kecp it in activity. The Carnegic Co. is now re-organized with $\Omega$ capital of $\$ 160,000,000$, in which it outrivals all other enterprises. Mr. Charles Cassills reprosents this vist enterprise in this city, where the products of the Cornegic furmaces and mills have been very largely used in the new buildings recently constructed here, or which are in progress.

## WHIEN DOES A IITE POTIOY COMTE TN FOROTE

A remarkable case bearing upon the question, when docs a life policy come into force, was henrd recently in Tondon, in the Court of Quecn's Bench. The facts are few and ware not in dispute. A Mr. Williams, of Rangoon, Burmil, filled up a proposal for life insurance in the 20th Dec., 189\%, in the office of the Imperial Tife Co., at that place. A clerical crror in the date caused a memorandum to be written, "Policy to date from January 1st, 1898," which Williams initialed and then paid one montli's premium: At the foot of the proposal form was printed: "The full premium, or deposit on account, may be paid on making the proposal, either payment, if the examiners report be satisfactory, holding the assurance fully in forec in the interval between the date of examination and the date of nceeptance by the company, provided such interval does not exceed one month. In the event of the proposal being declined, or the terms not agreed to, the whole piyment is returned." The proposnl wns sent for acceptance to Calcitta on 23rd December, and the acceptance was posted at Calcutta at 5.30 p.m. on 2sth Dec. At 4 p.m. on same day Williams was drowned. Eis son, therefore, claimed the amount of the policy on the plea that the policy came into force on the 20 th December at the time the month's premium was paid. It was urged in reply that the decensed had paid
his money with a clear understanding that the policy began to run from the 1st January following payment of the prenum, also, that no contract existed, as he was dead before the acceptance of his proposal was posted. His Lordship, Justice Grantham, however, held that in such a case as this the question as to whether a contract was concluded was not to be determined by the time of the posting of the letter of acceptance, but by the date at which'the company's officials decided to accept the proposal. The jury thereupon returned a verdict for the plaintiff for $£ 1,000$. We doulbt whether this judgment would be sustained on áppeal. A contract can hardly be said to be in force before the time it is dated, and it was proven that the deceased only paid the promium in advance of that date because he was leaving on a journey from which he would not return in time to pay the premium on the date of the policy. A post dated policy, Jike a post dated cheque, is surely invalid prior to its date.

FIRE FROM HEATING APPARATUS.
Referring to the losses due to defective flues, chimneys and heating apparatus, Insurance Commissioner Carr, in bis report of the investigation of fires in Maine last year, said: "Having strong faith in the old adage that 'an ounce of prevention 'is worth a pound of cure,' I would suggest that if property-owners would make a more thorough and frequent inspection of all chimneys, flues and heating apparatus on their premises it would result in a material reduction in the number of fires.

In more than 2,700 cases of fire in 1898 stoves caused losses to amount of more than $\$ 3,000,000$. In more than 500 cases furnaces caused losses to the amount of more than $\$ 2,500,000$. In more.than 400 cases fireplaces and grites caused losses to the amount of more tnan $\$ 200,000$. In fifteen years, cuding with 1898, according to the "Chronicle Tire 'lables," stoves caused fires in i8,847\% dwelling houses; fire-places in 1,632; furmaces in 1,193.

In Massachusetts in 1898 over-heated stoves or furnaces caused fires in 1.63 cases. In Chicago in 1898 stoves and ranges caused fires in 153 cases; open fire-places and grates, 32 ; furnaces, 65. In Boston in Tanuary last overheated stoves caused five fires; overheated furnaces, five. So the records go, wherever they may be picked up.

In the fire record April is a disastrous month. In 1898 it was sceond in the list, with more than 6,200 fires in the United States, July being first with 6,900, and December third with more than 6,000. In April the tendency in dwelling-houses to keep furnaces a-going and, shut off heat in all except one or two hot-air pipes to "take off the chill. "The Insurance Press" advises, if the weather be warm all of the pipes may be closed, creating a dangerous condition through the confinement of hot air. Watch your furnaces at the approach of warm wenther and keep one hot-air pipe open' always!

## ITEE QUEEN IN IRELAND.

Her Majesty the Queen entered Treland on the 4th inst., for the first time since her visit with the Prince Consort thinty-nine years ago. The Ministers who advised the Queen not to visit lreland, ns it is on record they did, have a heavy responsibility for such unwise advice. Their acfion, we presume, was based upon fears lest the populace would manifest their disaffection with the Briish Government by annoying or injuring their Queen. Monarchs pay

the penalty of clevation in the danger they are constantly in of attack by some maniacal cnemy of the power they represent. But they share this with the chicf rulers of Republics, as is shown by the assassimation of Cincoln and Gartield. Unpopular as the "Castle" party has so long been in Ireland, no Lord Lieutenant has ever been hurt phystcally during his residence at Dublin, or in visiting any part of lreland. We venture to say that Lady Aberdeen when gracing the Vice-regal residence was as safe without military escort as though surrounded by an army, for every tisisman was her lover and protector. Fad the Quedn bean atlowed to visit Treland every year, paying periodic visits to the mansions of the nobility, she would have raised the loyalty of the whole people to the highest point of personal derotion. The curse of Treland- the non-resident landlord system, would have been broken up, and the land enriched by the material benefits of rentals being spent at home, and those higher ones resulting from the diffusion of aspirit. of contentment; social unity and political peace. . Had the great landed proprietors of Tngland and Scotland, with their wives and families, spent all their time away from their estates and drained their tenantry of i-ntals to curich distant capitals, as those of Treland have done for generations, Ungland and Scotland would not have been as patient under such an infamous wrong as have been those of Treland. Such a system would have created an revolution in Great Britain.

The Qucen's reception in Dublin, was, of comse, $n$ mos. enthusinstic welcome. With a touch of statesmanlike wisdom, she recognised the power of mational sentiment, passing niny shown by her advisers, the Queen asken for, and wore on her breast a spring of Shamrock as'she rocte through the erowded strects. The Queen has male, "The wearing of the green" no longer a sign of nishoylty, buta symbol of the unity subsisting between her English, Scoteh and Irish subjects. Well may the Duke of Abercorn, premier peer of Treland, have exclaimed, after witnessing the Queen's welcome to Dublin: "It is the most wonderful, chivalroue and gpontaneous exhibition $I$ have ever seen, and $T$
am immensely proud of being an Trishman. The demonstrations show that despite all political differences, Ircland is a loyal portion of the Empire."
'Lhe lesson to the rulers of the old land, happily, has not come too late. We trust the Queen's visit will inaugurate a new social era in fieland by bringing the people of the other two lingidoms into closer touch with those of the Giren Isle, whom they will learn to love and honour, the more their qualities of mind and heart are known. God save the Queen, and God bless her for giving to the people of Ireland the opportunity to display their chivalry at home, as they have done so gloriously as "Soldiers of the Queen." We bust that the royal visit will lead to a royal residence being built in Treland, where the future king will. hold lis court every year.

## ILEE IAATE ALTMRED PERRY.

The passing away of Alfred Perry removes from this city probably its best known citizen, certainly one most dèserving of popular respect. Deceased was born in the wrong age to be fully appreciated or deservedly homoured. In earlier times he would have been a distinguished chieftain, for he combined with the courage of a hero, the power of initiative, and of organisation, which would have brought. him into distinction as a lender of men, There was a tomeh of romance in his nature which hat a too narrow sphere for development or exercise in a prosaic age. Some of his daring exploits in the troublous days when Canadn was engaged in fighting for her existence, and asserting her right to self-government, as a British colony, prove him to have had both remarkable courage and political prescience. As the chief organizer of our fire brigade, and for years its inspiration, he deserves the perpetual gratitude of this city. Fe initinted the movement to estahlish one of our hospitals, which has been and yet is a blessing to thousaụds. Devotion to public daty was his ruling passion: He was often misunderstood, because so few walled on the same high plane of unselfishess, and so few shared his idenls of the needs of a great city. Through the web of Canadian life, the carcer of Alfred Perry runs like a thrend of gold. It would be a reproach to any community to allow such a memory to sink into unhonoured oblivion.

In one case where errors had oceured in a momber of shipments in sucession an invoice was refused, and it cost one lumdred dollars in cabling before satisfactory correction Was mate 'the basis of a momber of the ervors is that shipments are matle liere as though it were to the next milway lown where the goods would arrive on the same day ns the invoier, and any erom eonld be quickly nod cheaply mate right. This enmot be done here, and special eare should bo talabe to guath agninst mistakes that are sure to give annoyance and may prove costly. Th this connection it is the place to say that Camarlian shippers via New York are commonly enntent to semd inland bills of lathing or ship-
 eient for goods via Vaneowed, but not by lines sailing from New York. The shipper should insist upon his shipping agenit or malway eompary sending. him the mane of the vessel her which it is forwarded to Aushalia, and, if possible. the date of sailing. Otherwise the emsigne is but in a good deal of trouble in axaming the manifests of a numhor of ships as they arive before he finds his goods. duother apparent frifle, lmbt, it is important, is that orders should be aeknowledged as received. Cases have heen brought to my notice of outers sent five months ago which have as yet not elicited any acknowledgement from the Cimadian manufacturer. The Austualian firm sending tlic; or
der is in grave doubt as to what to do. The goods have already been sold and the purchasiss want to know when they maty expect to get them. A note from the Canadian unamfacturer siating recejpt of order and giving some iden of when it would be filled would relieve much uncertainty. There are cases where after some delay goods have come to hand and proven satisfactory, finther orders have been refused hecanse of the anoyance cansed by the failure to reply promptly on receipt of order. The New York shipping firms appear to bave come to some agrement, to raise freight rates. There is some uncertainty here as to present rates, but it has been announced that there is an increase of five shillings per fon for sailers and seven and six for steamers Fhe putlook for the year in Australia is better than in any year since 1 cane leere, luth I am not so sure that it is for Canadian trade. I hat hoped for goon results from the number of Aistralian business men who have gone to Camada to make colmections. Some of them lately have failed to make any arrangenent whatever and have gone to the United Stades and made connections. Others have foum that the relations that they had supposed to te estabilshed were broken oft when orders went forward owing to pressure of busimoss in Canati. This reaction is only temporary, as thave letters advising me that the writars have not given up the Australian thate, but intend to renew their efforts as soon as they are in position to do so. Tu it few eases some agencies have been armaged which are likely to be prodnedive. In other instances manulactarers theniselves are opening up the vide with good prospects of success."

-'The new Mayor and Council of 'Ioronto seem to have caught the "growing time" rever for high expenchtures, although, like some other author:ties, they made pre-election promises to cut then down. 'He Board of Control, a body organized with a special view to entorce economy, has adopted the folowing schdule of outlay:Interest on debentures and sinking fund, $\$ 820,957$; various depurtments of civic service, $\$ 1,321,779$; education, $\$ 720,951$; other outside bodies, \$0 S2,40; gross total, $\$ 3,255,127$; less revenue trom water rates and other sources, $\$ 000,000$; to be raised by taxalion, of local improvement rates. l'his is $41 / 2$ mills in excess of $\$ 2,755,127$. Their lonely appearanee, without enough other rarieties of spring goods to make a suilable display may lave somet thing to do with their cool reception. The market bears a waiting appearance with little beyond winter display visible. Oranges and lemons are in good demand with prices steatly. Quolations are: - California mavel ornuges, $\$ 2.75$ to $\$ 3.50$; Tamaica omners, $\$ 6$ to $\$ 6.50$; seedlings, $\$ 2.40$ to $\$ 2.50$; Vnlencia oranges, 420 's, 55 to $\$ 5.50$ : Iarge sizes, $\$ 6.50$ to $\$ 0.75 ; 714$ 's, $\$ 6.00$ to \$6.2:~ Florida oranges, $\$ 7.50$ bos: lemons, $\$ 2.50$ to $\$ 3.00 ;$ banamas, $\$ .50$ to $\$ 2.25$ bumch in cases; pincapples, 25 e to 35 e each; tomatoes, $\$ 3.75$ crate; grape fruit, $\$ 5.50$ box; tangerines, $\$ 5$ per $1 / 2$ hox. Good guality would now sell for $63 / \mathrm{ce}$ in large lots, and 7e to $7 / \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{e}$ lb., in a joblbing way. The tea market is still demoraliged on account, on this slaughetring of consigned goods on this market reently, which were evidently pue through irrospective of ralue with the object of realizing. Japan representatives have been here looking for business on new erop and it is annowned there is a very satisfactory amount, of business in prospect.
Mardware and Metads.-The market here shows no change in prices. Wholesale houses are now very busy getting ont reduced freight shipments and also lake and rail shipments. A greater accumblation of orders have been held for these shipments than during any recent year. Manilla rope has adranced to 16 c for $\gamma-16$ and larger. Sisnl reducen to $111 / 2 \mathrm{c}$ for $7-16$ and larger: Th the New York market pig tin is. a trifle higher, and spelter is very firm, also copper. Jron and steel are letd at outside quotations.
Mines and Thluow.-Prices of green bitiles remain unchanged in the absence of tumeh husiness. Dealers expect litthe arrivals before paster. Quotations

Leatifer and Shoes.-The market is firm. The recent ndwnee on sole leather in the U.S. markets, and large sales putt through, have stiffened values here, and have entirely dispelled the idea of any decline in prices, and substitute reasons for an advance. Black leather is quiet but shoc manufacturers are through with fall samples and demand for that class of stock will improve as soon as fall cutting begins. Export demand continues, good, the opouing of navigation heing expected to result in large shipments going ont.
Iumber, Shmales, Latits, Eto.Firmness is shown in all lumber transactions, and as it is sometimes a leating question whether goods of the requisite nature can be secured, the question of price often assumes second place. The Georgian Bay district is
teeming with lumber activity. The output this year will nearly double that of any former season, which is accounted for from the fact that Michigan mill owners have been moving heir plants there on account of the prohibition laws. The estimated lumber output of the Georgian Bay mills for 1000 is $480,000,000$ feet. It is expected that $100,000,000$ manufactured there will be imported to the Saginaw River during the coming season. The total cost of logs in Ontario is estimated at $800,000,000$, an unusually large quantity of which has been got out to the banks of streams.
Painis, Orms and Glass. - There is no change in glass, but the market is very firm: Turpentine and linseed oils are stendy. Cod-liver oil is much higher in primary markets, having advanced fully 25 per cent., owing to the short seal catch. Although a report gained considerable circulation that a large catch of seals was obtained by the Newfoundland fisheries, it only remains true in so far as a few stenmers are concerned. The total catel is fully 100,000 less than that of a year ago.
Provistons.-The advance which took place in dressed hogs some weeks ago and which has continued firm since, with a good demand, has eaused all other lines of pork to follow so that quotations are changed to a proportionate level. The market is steady at this date with a good business passing. The heary advance in green pork worked into the hands of the farmers to an extent equal to a sudden rise of maniy cents in whent, and has not only caused a more liberal purchasing movement among them, but has encournged farther efforts in this profitable industry.
