The Secretary of State for External Affairs, the Hon. Howard Green, announced today the composition of the Canadian Delegation to the eleventh session of the General Conference of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (Unesco) at the Organization's Headquarters in Paris from November 14 to December 13, 1960.

The Chairman of the Delegation will be Mr. Marcel Cadieux, Deputy Under-Secretary of State for External Affairs, and the representative of the Department on the Canadian National Commission for Unesco. The Vice-Chairman will be Mr. H. Russell MacEwan, Member of Parliament for Pictou, Nova Scotia. The other members of the Delegation will be:

Mr. Eugène Bussière, Secretary of the Canadian National Commission for Unesco and Associate Director of the Canada Council and Mr. Lionel V.J. Roy, Canadian Permanent Delegate to Unesco in Paris will act as advisers to the Delegation, together with one or two other advisers drawn from the Department of External Affairs.

MARCEL CADIEUX, OTTAWA

A native of Montreal, Mr. Cadieux was educated at the University of Montreal and McGill University. He joined the Department of External Affairs in 1941 and has served at the Office of the Canadian High Commissioner in London, and the Embassies in Brussels and Paris, and on the Delegation to the North Atlantic Council and OEEC in Paris. In 1954 he was appointed as adviser to the Canadian Commissioners on the International Supervisory Commission in Indo-China. He returned to Ottawa in 1955, where he became Head of the United Nations Division, and later an Assistant Under-Secretary.

He has held the rank of Legal Adviser since 1956 and that of Deputy Under-Secretary since June 1960.

HOWARD RUSSELL MacEWAN, M.P. NEW GLASGOW, NOVA SCOTIA

Born in Nova Scotia, Mr. MacEwan was educated at Mount Allison and Dalhousie Universities from which he received the degrees of B.A. and LL.B. He is a member of the Nova Scotia Barristers' Society and a Captain in the 1st Battalion, Nova Scotia Highlanders (Militia). He was first elected to the House of Commons in 1957 and re-elected in the General Election of March 1958 as member for Pictou, Nova Scotia.

OAKLEY DALGLEISH, TORONTO

Mr. Dalgleish was born in New Lisheard and graduated from the University of Toronto of which he is now a member of the Board of Governors.

He has had extensive experience as a journalist both in Canada and abroad. He began his newspaper career on the Vancouver Star and later wrote for the Sifton papers and the Daily Express in London, England.

He joined the European staff of the Dominion News Bureau on its establishment and was posted to Madrid, Berlin, Geneva, Vienna and Washington. Associated with the Globe and Mail since 1935, he is now Editor and Publisher.

J-MARCEL BOURBONNAIS, M.P., TERRACE VAUDREUIL, P.Q.

Mr. Bourbonnais was born in Quebec City and educated in Montreal. He holds diplomas in Commerce and Engineering. He was elected to the House of Commons in March 1958 as the Member for Vaudreuil-Soulanges.

PIERRE GENDRON, OTTAWA

Dr. Gendron was born in St. Hyacinthe and graduated with a B.Sc. Chem. from the University of Montreal in 1949, receiving his Ph.D. from the same institution in 1949. He has taught Chemistry at Columbia University, New York City and at the University of Montreal. He has been Dean of the Faculty of Science at the University of Ottawa since 1954. He is a member of the Chemical Institute of Canada and of L'Association Canadienne francaise pour l'avancement des sciences and he represents the National Research Council on the Canadian National Commission for Unesco. He was a member of the Canadian Delegation to the 1958 session of the Unesco General Conference.

VINCENT WALTER PRICE, Q.C., TORONTO

Major Price was educated in England and Canada, receiving his B.A. and his M.A. from McMaster University. He was called to the Bar of Ontario in 1920 and created K.C. in 1933. He is a partner in the law firm of Kingsmill, Mills, Price, Barrett and Finlayson.

He served in both World Wars and now holds the rank of Major in the Reserve of Officers. He has been National President of the United Nations Association in Canada and was President of the Canadian Council for reconstruction through Unesco which was established in 1947 to co-operate with Unesco in its programme for reconstruction in war-devastated areas.

ROBERT F. SHARP, VANCOUVER

Born in Sicamous, B.C., Dr. Sharp received his B.A. at the University of British Columbia in 1932. He did post-graduate work at Stanford University and became a Doctor of Pedagogy at the University of Toronto in 1940. He began his teaching career in 1926 and held various positions with the Vancouver School Board until his appointment as Superintendent of Vancouver Schools in 1954. Dr. Sharp is a Director of the Canadian Education Association and a member of its Executive Committee.

NORMA E. WALMSLEY, BRANDON, MANITOBA

Born in Winnipeg, Miss Walmsley was educated there, and later at McGill University where she received her B.Com. and M.A. From 1941 to 1946 she served in the R.C.A.F. (W.D.). Miss Walmsley has participated in seminars and model Assemblies of the United Nations and has been active in World University Service work. She is at present Assistant Professor of Political Science and International Relations at Brandon College.

EUGÈNE BUSSIÈRE, OTTAWA

Mr. Bussière was born in Normandin, Quebec and received his B.A. from Laval University in 1932 followed by an M.A. in Social and Economic Sciences in 1941. Between these years he also studied at the University of Toronto and the University of Paris.

From 1948 to 1952 he was Chief of the Adult Education Division of Unesco's Department of Education. He was Director of the Citizenship Branch of the Department of Citizenship and Immigration from 1953 to 1957. In 1957 he was appointed Associate Director of the Canada Council and on the establishment of the Canadian National Commission in the same year he was named by the Council to be Secretary of the Commission.

LIONEL V.J. ROY

Born in Quebec, Mr. Roy is a graduate of Laval University. He later studied at the University of Paris and at Oxford. From 1936 to 1942 he was professor of law at Laval University and from 1942 to 1946 was senior solicitor with the Wartime Prices and Trade Board. He joined the Department of External Affairs in 1946 and has served in Buenos Aires, Colombo, Beirut and Mexico. He also attended the National Defence College in Kingston. In April 1960 he was appointed Canadian Permanent Delegate to the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization in Paris.
