



Banking and currency reforms are urgently demanded, and the west believes that many schedules in the Customs Act can be modified or repealed without injury and without challenging the progressive principles which underlie the national policy. Relief must come from parliament. In our present situation, is the government well advised to postpone calling parliament for six months?

RECIPROCITY IN U. S. POLÍTICS. One of the reasons against the ratification of the reciprocity deal was that its plain intention to prevent that lowering of the United States tariff which the Republican party had promised. The Payne-Aldrich Act rather increased than diminished the duties, and the demand of the workers for relief from the rising cost of living was thus practically ignored. Notwithstanding the Canadian rejection of re ciprocity it is still being used for the purpose of defeating tariff revision. 


