STILL THE BIG DEBATE

Clancy and Bennett Speak of the Shortcomings of the Liberals

AND TARTE GETS IN FRONT

Minister of Public Works Claims That the Conservatives Oppose the French-Canadians.

He Defends Himself Personally and Says That Sir Wilfrid Laurier Had Applied to the Pope For Re- ligious Freedom and Had Got It — Frenchmen, He Says, Are Loyal to the British.

Ottawa, March 28.—(Special.)—Three good speeches in one day is a pretty fair record for the seventh day of a debate on the address, when it might be supposed that nearly everything that could be said on almost every subject had been said. Yet two good speeches were made by Conservatives to-day, which were not mere rebuffs of what had been already said, and Mr. Clancy also made a speech which was good in its way and which was characterized by even more than his usual boldness. Mr. Clancy's speech this afternoon was a careful and well balanced criticism of the Government policy, especially on the so-called preferential tariff, and Mr. Bennett's attack on Mr. Tarte and his ways was a telling effort. There is not now much probability of the debate closing before the Easter recess is taken, as there are about a dozen Conservative members who intend to speak, including Sir Hilbert Tupper, and nearly half as many supporters of the Government, including Mr. Bourassa, who moved the adjournment of the debate, who may possibly tell us something about the Washington commission of which he was Canadian secretary.

IN THE COMMONS.

IS RANKIN FORCING HARDY?

Has the American Niagara Company Gone Into Another Deal With the Premier?

RUMOR HAS IT THAT THIS IS SO.

Does Arthur Sturgis Hardy Intend to Renew the Monopoly Clause Which He Promised to Kill?

It will be remembered that some time ago a resolution was introduced by Mr. Germain of Welland in the Ontario Legislature, which declared that in the event of the Canadian Niagara Falls Power Company failing to complete the work which the courts have decided they must do by Nov. 1 next, the Government may terminate their agreement. In his speech upon this resolution—which was really his resolution—Mr. Hardy explained that in case the company should perform or undertake a reasonable amount of work involving the expenditure of, say a million or half a million dollars, the Government might only cancel the monopoly clause of the agreement. That sounded well and he said to have satisfied Mr. Germain. Another company stood ready to step in and develop the power at the Cataract if the American company were disposed, and for this company Mr. Germain was supposed to be acting.

Now it is said by those who profess to know, that the Government have made an agreement with the American company and that an attempt will be made to get legislation at this session which will practically renew the agreement with the American company and give them an extension of time.

Mr. W. B. Rankin, the head of the American company, has been in the city for some time and has been frequently closeted with members of the Government, and the result has been submitted to him for his approval. In his closing hours, which will give him an assured monopoly, though ostensibly it will take away the monopoly clause of the present agreement.

The Record of Casualties to the Americans in Mon- day's Fighting.

GEN. MCARTHUR IS RESTING

He Halted His Troops Until Supplies and Ammunition Can be Brought Up.

Gunboat Yorktown Captured a Spanish Steamer After a Hot Chase and the Firing of Two Shots—An Advance Was Begun at Daybreak This Morning—Strong Position to be Attacked.

Washington, March 28.—There was a lull to-day in the reports from the scene of action north of Manila, which for a time was rather quietifying to the War Department authorities. Only one dispatch from Gen. Otis was received during the day, dealing with the situation at the front and this related to yesterday afternoon. It was not until the Associated Press despatch came late in the day, telling that the American forces were resting beyond Marila, that Gen. Otis' situation on to-day's movements was explained. After the arduous work of a three days' fight, under a fierce tropical sun, through rice swamps and jungles, it was explained by the authorities here that McArthur would conserve the energies of his men by a halt long enough to rest and take supplies before the final blow against Malolos, the insurgent capital. The supply trains are now with the troops, according to Otis' report to-day, so that the rest permits full supplies of ammunition and food to be distributed.

THE OFFICIAL ACCOUNT.
