DOER CASUALTIES WERE 550

Lord Kitchener Confirms the Heavy Losses of the Enemy in Attack on Italia Forts.

COL. KEKEWICH TWICE WOUNDED

There is a Prospect of Guns Recently Captured at Vladivostok Being Recovered.

Lord Kitchener in his despatch says the British repelled the attack with great vigor. After the close of the fighting Col. Kekewich was found to be slightly wounded in two places.

He says that all ranks behaved extremely well. The wounded were taken to Helsingburg, half way between Portofra and Helsingborg.

Lord Kitchener confirms the heavy losses of the Boers, about 250 killed and 300 wounded, during their attack on the forts at Italia.

There is a prospect, he says, of the guns recently captured at Vladivostok, being recovered from the Boers.

Moedwill, the scene of the bold attack by Commandant Delarey on Col. Kekewich's camp, is 75 miles west of Portofra, and 15 west of Vladivostok.

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WINE GROWERS DEMAND RELIEF

Hope French Premier Has Promise of Reduction in Russian Duties.

Paris, Oct. 2.—Now that a recent interval has elapsed since the czar's departure, French wine-growers are beginning to think it proper to ask if M. Delcasse secured a promise from Russia to diminish its present disastrous tariff on French wine.

The French Foreign Office declines that it has nothing to make public on the question, though it is generally believed that M. Delcasse brought the matter to the attention of the czar, who would consent to the proposition if he could secure the necessary protection.

The hope that the czar will do something to help the wine-growers illustrates a growing tendency among Frenchmen to expect from the Russian alliance some solid results like that which Russia has got from French loans.

Camille Pelletan echoes this feeling when he writes with curious boldness in today's Echo: "It will be glad if anybody will tell me what good we get from this alliance. Russia leads us in her train and gets out a short one on the prairies to enjoy a hunting trip."

NETS TO PARADE

Regarding Port wine, Sir James says: "If some of our colonial brethren can find a rugged straggle like the Douro Valley, with steep, craggy sides, sloping to the river, of similar general formation, and under the same climate, it will have a spot for making Port within our own Empire, which will be equal that of our old friend in war and wine—Portugal."

In summing up, Sir James says it is inclined to look to the Australian continent for a large contribution to the near future of the world's total supply of wine.

The writer expects that the South African possibilities will soon resume exporting wines. He says: "It is due to the Cape Colonists to say that, and the present Imperial settlement existed during the years when their very excellent strong wine was first introduced into the market."
