### PRESIDENT CASTRO WILLING

His Answer Agreeing to Reference to Hague Tribunal Has Reached Washington.

### GERMANY HAS RESERVATIONS.

Excludes From Scope Demands Amounting to \$300,000 For Seizure of Property.

Washington, Dec. 31.—The answer of President Castro to the proposals of the allies to submit to the arbitration of the Hague Tribunal the Venezuelan difficulties, has reached Washington through Minister Bowen. It amounts to a general acceptance of the principles of the proposition, President Castro being willing to submit his case to the arbitration of fair and impartial arbiters. The details of the answer will not be published in advance of its reception by the European allied powers. In fact, it may be withheld entirely from publication, on the ground that it really belongs to those powers.

To-day the answer is being prepared at the State Department for transmission to Europe. As it is quite long, and undoubtedly will require careful consideration by the Foreign Offices at London, Berlin and Rome, it is not expected any further steps toward a final settlement can be taken for a day or two. However, the feeling here is that Castro's answer practically clears the way for the submission of the case to arbitration.

### GERMANY'S RESERVATIONS.

Berlin, Dec. 31.—The German government's reservations in agreeing to submit the Venezuelan claims to arbitration, continue to be undisclosed in their entirety. But, from statements appearing to-day, it seems to be confirmed that Germany excludes from the claims which are subject to arbitration, demands amounting to \$300,000 for seizure of property and outrages on the persons of German subjects, under circumstances which are here deemed so clear that it is useless to call in arbitrators. The payment of this sum will not be demanded, inasmuch as the settlement will be insisted upon. Great Britain's preference for arbitration is in amount. Hence the statements made above that Germany is asking more than Great Britain, are incorrect.

The Lokal Anzeiger, the only German newspaper having a special correspondent at Caracas, has just received a dispatch from there, dated Dec. 29, relating the correspondent's experience in interviewing President Castro. He found him at General Alcantara's estate, at La Victoria, dancing. At midnight Gen. Alcantara was waiting with a bundle of despatches, remarked to the correspondent that "I would not do to neglect the President's pleasure, even with state business." But the correspondent says, he spoke the President's words as "after a conversational reconnaissance, inquired if he intended to give the powers satisfaction." Why, he replied the President, "I am the one demanding satisfaction for insults."

At this remark the correspondent continued, "a lady clapped the President on the back, and said: 'That's the way to talk.'"

### CLAIMS OF FRANCE.

Paris, Dec. 31.—A despatch to The Mail from Caracas confirms the statement that Venezuela has promised to France to treat her claims as those of Great Britain, Germany and Italy, but adds a similar promise refused to Belgium, Spain and Holland.

This decision was forewarned by the action yesterday of the Delaware and Pennsylvania Railroad. No price circular will be issued by the coal-carrying companies for the present.

### TRAINS COLLIDE ON BRIDGE

Two Freights Crash Together and Wrecked Cars Blaze Fiercely Over St. Lawrence.

### CONDUCTOR TREMBLAY DECAPITATED

He Was in the Act of Uncoupling the Van From Next Car—Line Soon Cleared.

Montreal, Dec. 31.—The Grand Trunk is really unfortunate, as a second grave accident took place to-day. This was almost under the eyes of the headquarters staff. By a re-arranged collision on the Victoria Bridge, shortly after 11 o'clock to-day, two Grand Trunk freight trains were brought together. Conductor Octave Tremblay was killed. The wreck at once caught fire and blazed fiercely above the St. Lawrence. The rear train pitched into the one ahead, the result being the smashing of the front of the latter. Tremblay was the conductor of the foremost train. He was standing between the van and the next car and was in the act of disconnecting them when the collision took place, and he was decapitated. The dead conductor was a married man, and leaves a widow and one child, who reside at 39 Knox-street. The trains were coming from St. Lambert, and the train in the lead stopped suddenly, without giving the rear train sufficient time to stop also. A general blockade of traffic on the bridge followed, but the line was clear at 2 o'clock p.m.

Octave Tremblay, the dead conductor, was about 40 years of age. He had been railroaded shortly after leaving school. He entered the employ of the Grand Trunk Railway Company as a brakeman, and, by industry and careful application to business, worked his way up to that of conductor, which position he has occupied for more than 12 years. Cause of the accident, which killed Engineer Bird of the International Railway, which followed the Grand Trunk, is not ascertained. ### DOUBLED IN SEVEN YEARS

Phenomenal Increase in the Customs Receipts of the Port of Montreal.

### LAST YEAR A RECORD BREAKER.

Business Exceeded That of 1901 by One Million and a Half Dollars.

Montreal, Dec. 31.—Judging from the customs receipts of the Port of Montreal, the city has, with the close of to-day, completed the most prosperous twelve months in its history. The increase in the collections has been phenomenal, being for the calendar year, which closes to-day, \$1,500,000 in excess of the year 1901, which, in its turn, was the largest on record. In referring to the subject to-day, Mr. R. S. White, Collector of Customs, stated that, in seven years' time, the business of the port had doubled itself. The number of duty-paid entries in the last six months amounted to 104,000, while in the whole twelve months of 1902, the total number of entries was 114,000, indicating an almost doubling up of the clerical work, as well as receipts.

The total collections of the port for the year ending to-night (last day of being estimated) amount to \$10,974,450, compared with \$9,465,000 for the year 1901.

Mr. White states that every branch of business appears to have been affected by the increase, the prosperity being generally distributed.

### TO RELIEVE COAL FAMINE.

B. & O. Will Not Accept Freight for Eastern Points.

Baltimore, Md., Dec. 31.—General Superintendent Hale of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad issued the following order to-day: "Until further notice we cannot accept of coal freight except live stock and perishable products, for points east of Pittsburg, Monaca, or Parkersburg. We will continue to accept our own empty cars and empty foreign cars brought home."

### NEW YORK'S DEATH RATE.

New York, Dec. 31.—Dr. Lederle, president of the board of health, in his annual report says the death rate of New York City for 1902 was 18.74 per thousand, which is considerably the lowest ever reported in this city. The rate in 1901 was 20.02.

### THE MUNICIPAL CAMPAIGN.

Only one witness, James Watson, was examined. He told the same story of the robbery and outrage of Nov. 22, as at the coroner's inquest. He positively identified Hanley and Page as the two men who had done the robbery. He said he recognized them by their build, clothing and voices. Wilkes knew both men well previous to this time, as several occasions, they had fat cattle pasturing on the farm.

Watson's evidence was the only evidence raised in the case for the prosecution. The defence had about 25 witnesses present, from Hamilton and Ancaster, but were not called, owing to Crown Attorney Wilkes being called away. The line of defence will be to prove an alibi. The case was adjourned until Wednesday, and the men were again allowed to go on bail.

### METHODISTS ACHIEVE END

Raised Over \$20,000,000 in United States for Twentieth Century Fund.

NINE MILLIONS ON CHURCH DEBTS.

One Twenty-Fifth of Whole Amount Given by Ministers' Sons—A Thank Offering.

Springfield, Mass., Dec. 31.—One of the most impressive and memorable services ever held in Springfield was that in Trinity Church this evening when Dr. E. M. Mills, secretary of the 20th Century Thank Offering Commission made the formal announcement that the Methodists of the country had raised more than \$20,000,000 in response to the movement inaugurated in Trinity Church by the Board of Bishops four years ago. Dr. Mills announced that \$9,000,000 had been raised on church debts through the country, \$8,150,000 for Methodist colleges and schools, and two and three-quarters millions for philanthropies and charities; \$600,000 has been raised for the permanent fund for the conference claimants and a little over \$380,000 has been raised to build churches in destitute communities.

### MANY RAILROAD MEN TO TESTIFY.

High Officials Propose to Learn the Truth of Wanstank Disaster.

London, Dec. 31.—(Special.)—The liveliest comment has been provoked thru this section over the verdict of the jury investigating the Wanstank wreck. That the actual responsibility for the destruction of the express and the frightful loss of life was placed with so much directness at the door of the company occasioned little surprise here. A majority of the victims reside within a radius of 50 miles of this county, and since the accident, the members of their families have been in London and the adjacent town, discussing the affair with more or less bitterness toward the company. While Little was known as to the detailed manner in which the flyer got away on its last dash without proper orders, it was apparent that the collision was the result of someone's gross carelessness. Gradually the facts developed, showing that a number of trusted employes contributed to the extraordinary chain of errors which followed one another in such alarming proportions to the very brink, where the big locomotive overturned, drawing the passenger train upon the little freight engine, and drove it into the earth. Then the indignation of those who lost mothers, fathers, children and other dear ones broke out with renewed force.

### Carson's Popularity.

The personal popularity of Andy Carson, the Watford man, has been the last man to give an order to the flyer. It is another factor which has fostered resentment against the company, because the officials generally declared his error the direct cause of the collision. Carson is a great big honest-looking chap, whose face bears every mark of candor. He was born and bred around Watford, and has worked at various stations of the Sarum and Watford lines. NINE MILLIONS ON CHURCH DEBTS.

One Twenty-Fifth of Whole Amount Given by Ministers' Sons—A Thank Offering.

Springfield, Mass., Dec. 31.—One of the most impressive and memorable services ever held in Springfield was that in Trinity Church this evening when Dr. E. M. Mills, secretary of the 20th Century Thank Offering Commission made the formal announcement that the Methodists of the country had raised more than \$20,000,000 in response to the movement inaugurated in Trinity Church by the Board of Bishops four years ago. Dr. Mills announced that \$9,000,000 had been raised on church debts through the country, \$8,150,000 for Methodist colleges and schools, and two and three-quarters millions for philanthropies and charities; \$600,000 has been raised for the permanent fund for the conference claimants and a little over \$380,000 has been raised to build churches in destitute communities.

FACTS ARE STUBBORN THINGS.

A Profitable Investment for the City—Vote for Waterworks By-Law.

Ratepayers should remember that their duties are at least twofold and equally serious. They should ensure the safety of their property and see to it that proper steps are taken to secure the safety of the lives and property of all citizens.

The necessity of maintaining the waterworks with thorough appliances is, therefore, not only self-evident, but a solemn duty, which devolves upon every freeholder, and upon the freeholders that solemn duty is, as a consequence, the object of the present consideration at the present time.

The City Engineer emphatically declares that the present pumping plant is inadequate to supply present needs economically, without endangering the efficiency and service of pumps Nos. 4 and 5. Those are the high-duty engines, from the operation of which an immense saving of coal has resulted annually, as compared with the coal consumption when Nos. 1, 2 and 3 were running.

For example, take the quantity of water pumped, and the cost of the 465 gallons. With coal at \$3 per ton, which is the cost of soft coal screenings delivered in the collection area, it would have cost \$40,348 to pump that quantity with Nos. 1, 2 and 3, as was done by the two high-duty engines, Nos. 4 and 5, for \$33,538.

Suppose the new engine to be installed and now running, the cost, with Nos. 4 and 5, and say 6, would have been \$22,488. Thus there would have been effected a saving of \$26,860 over the old plant, and \$11,050 over Nos. 1, 2 and 3.

The above figures and figures that in this matter—show most conclusively that a new engine will not only ensure the city against any serious disruption of the water supply, but would actually prove a profitable investment.

Here is the investment feature of it: The cost, \$176,000; annual Sinking Fund and charges for the same, \$300,000; excess of cost of pumping with present Nos. 1, 2 and 3, \$11,050; profit on investment, \$200,000 annually.

With these facts and figures staring them in the face, the freeholders are in duty bound to vote for the by-law sanctioning the purchase of a new engine.

BOUGHT OAK HALL PROPERTY.

The Oak Hall property at the southwest corner of Yonge and Adelaide streets was purchased by The News Company Wednesday.

It is expected that The News, under the new management, will be issued in the acquired premises some time in the spring.

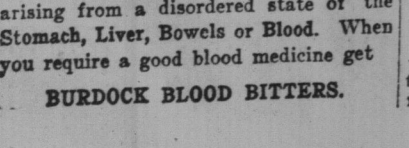
Who Owns the Potatoes?

GREAT BRITAIN AT ROME

Speculation as to the Successor to Lord Currie as Ambassador.

LORD CROMER'S NAME MENTIONED.

One of the Most Agreeable Posts in the British Diplomatic Service.

Had not Sir Michael Herbert received quite recently the appointment of British ambassador at Washington it is probable he would now be nominated to succeed Lord Currie as British envoy at Rome. Sir Michael was for several years first secretary and charge d'affaires at Rome, knows the ropes there as well as he does here. Lady Herbert, who makes her home there during part of the year, and would have been, under the circumstances, the right man in the right place. For Lord Currie has been at Rome a worse failure than he was at Constantinople, and it is due to him that the formerly close relations between Great Britain and Italy are now, if not exactly strained, at any rate distinctly chilled, and it will need a skillful hand to restore the good feeling between the two countries—a good feeling which is of considerable importance to England, since any combination with Italy would render Great Britain preponderant in the Mediterranean.

Indeed, it is by no means impossible that Sir Michael may, after all, be sent to Rome in which event he would probably be succeeded in Washington by Sir Henry Howard, who, like himself, is married to an American.

Accused of being a mediocre under ordinary circumstances, Sir Nicholas O'Connor, now ambassador at Constantinople, would receive the mission at Rome, for Lord Currie, Lord Dufferin, and Sir Francis Ford were all appointed to Rome from the Constantinople. Sir Nicholas is, like his wife, a devout Roman Catholic, and closely related to the Duke of Norfolk, who owing to his open championship of the restoration of temporal power to the holy See, is an object of Italian antipathy to the Italian court and government.

Among other mentioned for the post is Lord Cromer, who it is difficult to order a tactful hand is needed to keep in order the young Khedive, who has recently been showing signs of little he wishes the British protectorate to which both he and his country are devotedly attached.

OPPOSE AMALGAMATION.

Mr. Harecourt Waited on By Deputation of Artists.

A deputation composed of R. F. Gagen, secretary of the Ontario Society of Artists; C. M. Manly, George Reid, C. W. Jefferys and F. S. Chatterton waited upon the Minister of Education on Wednesday in connection with the proposed amalgamation of the various school boards.

They opposed the scheme, which meant amalgamation. They pointed out that professional art education requires a special school and special training. The curriculum of this school should be arranged for the use of the professional art student, as distinguished from the artisan. They recommended the following subjects: Drawing and modelling from the antique, drawing and painting from still life, drawing, modelling and painting from the draped figure, and drawing and painting from animals; design, perspective and lectures on the use of material on anatomy and history.

They also asked for the recognition of the Central School of Art, that the work of the art department of the Technical Schools should be similar to that of the Central School of Art. They also asked for the recognition of drawing in the Public Schools shall be on the same principles, but of a more primary nature, and that there should be a means of a complete understanding between the Art School and the Technical School, and such Public Schools as have an art department or teach drawing.
