EXPLOSION IN SAN DIEGO

39 OF THE 1000 BURNED

Boiler Disaster in San Diego Harbor Results in Horrowing Scenes—Wounded Conveyed in Open Wagons to Hospitals—Horrible Spectacle.

39 DEAD.

One officer and thirty-eight members of the crew of the United States gunboat Constantine were killed and nearly one hundred yesterday morning by a boiler explosion that shattered the vessel in San Diego harbor. Fifteen sailors are missing.

There were more than 250 men aboard when the accident occurred, and many were hurled or forced to jump into the sea by the terrific explosion, which lifted part of the deck and compelled the beaching of the ship.

San Diego, Cal., July 21.—One of the most frightful disasters in the peace history of the American navy, excepting the sinking of the Maine in Havana harbor, occurred in San Diego Bay shortly after 10:30 a. m., today, when the United States gunboat Constantine, at a moment when the warship, lying at anchor, was the object of interest to hundreds of observing people on the piers and pleasure boats, a cloud of steam suddenly burst from a point just forward of the smokestack, out of which the spectators were horrified to see bodies and human limbs hurled high in the air and scattered over the surrounding water. The outbreak was accompanied by a shock as of thunder and a shock that rocked vessels nearby. The air was filled with shrieks of pain from the wounded and fragments of human beings and pieces of the ship's superstructure.

At the water front, with blacked faces were struggling, handicapped by injuries. Others on deck were covered with blood, some dead, some wounded, frightfully, others working to rescue comrades who were yet below. The blast turned the water into a boiling sea of fire, taking them to the wharves. Ambulances were telephoned for every express wagon and driver who could be reached by telephone was summoned, physicians were called and hospital informed.

Within half an hour carriages, buggies, automobiles and street cars were bearing to the spot which met the eyes of hundreds of onlookers. Wounded men were not rare. One died eight minutes after the explosion. A boy, holding in his arms the heads of comrades near to death, all of them with faces black with soot, was carried to the shore, bearing those who were injured, some of whom were lying on a stretcher, others on the ground, some in a dazed condition, some unconscious, some with bleeding wounds.

In the meantime a more awful sight awaited those who had hastened to the dock. The ship, from which the water continued to pour in great clouds. Everywhere was blood, and in all directions bodies. The bodies of the crew were scattered all over the pier, and in some cases were carried away from them to stern, and after a hole was blown in the side of the water tank, which the water poured, causing the rapid listing of the vessel.

Most of the bodies were found embedded between decks, above the boilers, when the explosion happened. Here it was the boiler that was the cause of the disaster. No one living was able to describe what happened there, but vivid witnesses exist in the blossoming of the boiler.

BALEFOUR'S LIKELY COURSE

Convinced of Hopelessness of Attempting Another Session—Lulled into False Confidence.

London, July 22.—It is understood that Premier Balfour has decided to remain in office until the end of the session and to dissolve parliament in October. No authoritative statement, however, will be made until Monday, and in the interval this decision may be modified.

The crisis has assumed a serious aspect owing more to the circumstances attending the defeat of the government Thursday night on the vote for the support of the Irish land commission than to the intrinsic importance of the vote itself. The vote was actually due to the slackness, or rather, to the indifference of the Liberal Unionist supporters, who despite the strongest possible whip enforcing the necessity of their support.

That this was allowed to happen immediately after Mr. Balfour had called a meeting of his party to impress upon his supporters the necessity of their absolute loyalty seems to convince Mr. Balfour of the uselessness of attempting to face another session of parliament, but as the holding of elections in August on the account of the harvest and other reasons, he has decided to remain in office until the autumn before dissolving parliament.

Vegetable Growing in Cuba

EXTRACTS FROM PROFESSOR C. F. AUSTIN'S REPORT. Chief of Department of Horticulture, Cuban Experiment Station, Santiago de Las Vegas.

All Classes of Vegetables Successfully Grown in Cuba.

Comparatively few people in the United States know that nearly all classes of vegetables which they are familiar in their home gardens or markets can be successfully grown in Cuba, and the few who are aware of the main fact usually have mistaken ideas as to the conditions which govern truck gardening here.

During the past winter, from November to May, the horticultural grounds of the Cuban Experiment Station have yielded a copious supply of the following vegetables in excellent condition: Forty varieties of American lettuce, all classes of garden and stock beets, radishes, turnips, rutabagas, endive, salsify, tomatoes, egg-plant, Bermuda onions, Swiss chard, cabbage, kohlrabi, parsnip, sweet potatoes, Irish potatoes, peppers, carrots and celery.

GAVE JAP'S A HARD FISSLE FOUGHT IN HUC FOREST

Battle of Dalme Was in Progress Two Days Before Japanese Captured the Guns.

Tokyo, July 21.—A special telegram from Otsuru says that the Russian defeated at Dalme were about 200, with six field and three machine guns, and taking the fullest advantage of the topographical character of the district, offered most obstinate resistance.

The Russian positions were hidden among a thick forest, and it was impossible for the Japanese gunners to make a correct observation. The cannoneers, however, was opened by the Japanese at 6 o'clock on the morning of July 7, and was kept up until dusk. The Japanese infantry gained ground, closing in on the enemy's line of defence, awaiting an opportunity for an assault. It was made at midnight, two hours past midnight when the enemy's first line of defence, strengthened by barbed wire and trenches, was broken. This success was vigorously followed up, but it was not until 1 o'clock on the morning of July 9 that the Japanese was driven from the second line of defence, and a victory won with trophies, three or four field guns and one machine gun.

The Russian ground exposed the Japanese assailants to a great disadvantage and risk, owing to the short supplies of ammunition and provisions, the Russians at Sakhalin cannot make up their losses. It is officially announced that the Japanese have this far surrounded at various points, including Island number 46, including one colonel and one major.
