

HE Falls are level (or still water) about three hours and an half on the Flood, and about two hours and an half on the ebb, which makes it passable four times in 24 hours, about 10 or 15 minutes each time. - No 9ther rule can be given, as much depends on the freshets in the River St. John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by winds, and in the proportion to the heigth of them.

Curious Particulars of the Customs and Manners of the English in Ancient Times.

The customs of the Anglo-Saxons (and indeed of all the northern ations) have somewhat particularly worth notice in them, as far

s they relate to matrimony.

A woman unmarried was always supposed to have a s mund bora. guardian or owner; the virgin belonged to her father, brother, unle, or nearest male relation; the widow claimed the fame protecon of her dead husband's male relatives ; the lover was obliged o buy his miltress of her 'mund-bora,' by a 'mede' or gift, the ahount of which was fettled by a law, that fet a higher price on the haid by one half, than on the relict.

If anadvifedly the wooer wedded the lady without the mund-bora's coffent, her person and goods were still the property of her guardian; and an injury offered to her was to be atoned for, not to the

We know little as to the divorces of the Anglo-Saxons, althothey sometimes appear; but the Weich laws allowed the husband to put away his wife for behaviour tending towards adultery; while on hexpart the might, on very fight accounts, separate her concerns from his; it was a sufficient cause if the discovered that he had an jil fcented breath.

With respect to conjugal authority, our neighbors of Wales allotted decifively, that, if the wife called her husband approbrious names, pulled him by the beard, squandered away his goods, or lastly, if he found her in bed with another man, the injured spoule might give her three blows with a stick on any part of her except her head. But if he should beat her more severely, or for a less cause, he was

In the education of their children the Anglo Saxons only fought to render them dauntless and apt for the two most important occupations of their future lives, war and the chafe.

It was a usual trial of a child's courage, to place him on the slop. ing roof of a building, and if without fereaming or terror he held faft, he was flyled 'a flout herce' or brave boy.

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In private life the Anglo-Saxons were devout to the extreme of credulity; and hospitable to drunken extravagance; their manners were rough, but focial; when married, each fide respected the nuptial tye, and most of the ladies suckled their own children.

At table, the ranks of the guests was strictly observed; and by the laws of Canute, a person sitting above his proper station was to be pelted out of his place by hours, at the discretion of the company, without the privilege of taking offence.

Effects of Music.

The following melancholy fact, being witnessed by a vast multitude of people, can want no further confirmation to establish it. At the first grand performance in commemoration of Handel, at Westminster Abbey, Mr Burton, a celebrated chorus singer, well known in the musical world, was, immediately upon the commencement of the Overture of Esther, so violently agitated, that after lying for some time in a fainting sit, he expired. However, at intervals he was able to speak; and but a few minutes before he drew his last breath, declared, that it was the wonderful essects of the music, which had operated so powerfully on him.

Curious Anecdotes from Wood's Ancient and Modern State of the Parish of Cramford, in Scotland.

The records of the Kirk Seffion, which begin 7th September 1651, (the Seffion books preceding that period having been carried away by Cromwell) exhibit many curious memorials of the strictmess of discipline which prevailed in the church of Scotland, during the course of last century.

February 16th 1700, Mary Millar compeared before the Seffion, and on being interrogated, confessed that Sir William Patterson of Grantoun, Bart. was the father of the child she brought forth late-

ly, and that the fact was committed in Grantoun House, the week before Fastens even, when he came out to Grantoun, and brought her out, and flayed there from Tuesday that week, till Saturday, altho' his family then lived in Edinburgh, and nobody was at Grantoun but James Anderson, Sir William's boy; and Robert Hunter, the town Treasurer of Edinburgh, care and took away the child. The minister waited on Sir William Patterson, who acknowledged his fin, but hoped the Seffion would deal discreetly with him in consideration of his age and character (he was then about 70, and held an office under Government for many years.) They were however peremptory in infifting on fatisfaction, probably on account of his having been a violent perfecutor of the Presbyterians while he was Clerk of the Privy Council: he delayed to come before them for fome time, going to Bath and other places, but on his return to this part of the country he was again fent for by the Seffion, whereupon he formally appeared before them 14th Nov. 1701, and professed his forrow for committing the fin of fornication, and his willingness to fubmit to the Session, for removing that scandal. He was then rebuked and exhorted to repent, and appointed to appear in the public congregation, to remove that scandal; but the records are Slent as to the latter point's being complied with.

One cannot but fmile at the following inflance of the Parfon's minute attention to the private concerns of his parithioners. March 4th 1698, the Minister reported to the Session, that he had spoken to my Lord Tarbat's groom and Mary Milligan, who did lie in one room, but in two separate beds, and that they had promised to for-

Of the superstition and credulity of the common people, take the following examples. January 22d 1688, a dead child having been found on Cramond Muir, near the town of Upper Cramond, and one Janet Millar having gone from thence to Comrie the fame day, she was fent for, and having appeared before the Kirk Seffion fome days thereafter, the child was raifed out of its grave, and the was caused to handle the bo. dy before the Session and a great confluence of people; but, it is remarked in the records, with no fauli furprife, no tokens of blood appeared at all! She was afterwards examined several times; but no further light being thereby obtained, the affair was referred to his Majesty's Advocate, by whom she was exculpated.

In June 1714, in the 84th year of his age, George Mackenzie, Lord Cromarty retired to his noble feat of New Tarbat in Rofsshire, with a determined resolution to stay six years there, and live thriftily, in order to fave up money that he might fpend in London; but this most commendable defign was most unexpectedly interrupted in its very onset, by death, who removed his Lordship from this transitory stage, at New Tarbat, 17th Aug. 1714, a few days after Queen Anne had given way to fate.

#### ALGIERS.

THE mole or mound of earth which connects Aigiers with an island before it, and forms the defence of the city, is the fruit of the unremitted labor of thirty thousand Christian slaves for three years. It was completed in the 16th Century by Hayradin, who succeeded Horuck Barbarossa in the government of Algiers.

It was this Hayradin who went about to meet the army of the Emperor Charles V. proposed to murder 10,000 of his Christian flaves, for fear of their rifing. His officers however rejected the proposition, and Charles soon liberated them.

In this expedition he was fuccefsful, but, foon after this he undercook another against them with 120 ships, 20 galies and 30,000

men, almost all of which were destroyed. He was landing his troops and the senate or divan, were proposing to submit, when a disciple of the prophet of Medina, rushed in as a prophet, and told them to hold out, and that in a few days their foes would be destroyed -the prediction was verified-a violent tempest arose after Charles had landed his army, and before either provisions on tents could be bro't on shore, which scattered and destroyed his fleet. His troops without shelter or provisions, most of them, who could flee from the fabre of their enemy, perished in the storm-and Charles, the " Sovereign of Spain, Germany and the Indies," returned with the miferable remnant of fo large a fitet and army, without effecting any thing against the enemy.

Some years after this the French went against them with 20 fail, and took and destroyed or dispersed their fleet. In this battle the Algerine admiral funk his own flip, himself and crew going down to

the bottom rather than surrender.

In 1683 admiral Duquesne bombarded the cay with a French Acet, and fet it in flames. While this was doing, the Algerines butchered the French prisoners, Seized the French Conful, placed him alive before the mouth of a cannon, and discharged it towards Duquefne's fquadron- The admiral, however, left not the harbor till their city was a heap of ruins, and all their fortifications and shipping deftroyed. This for once humbled the pirates-they fued for, and obtain-

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

He complied got into the coach ; but no foouer had they quitted the fireer which he refided, than they informed him he must submit to have his eyes bandaged; the perfon to whom they were about to conduct him, being a lady of rank, whose name and place of abode it was indispensable to conceal. To this requisition he likewife submitted; and after driving through a number of fixects, apparently with a view to prevent his forming any accurate idea of the part of the city to which he was conducted, the carriage at length Ropped. Ascending a narrow staircase, they entered an apartment where he was released from the bandage tied over his eyes. One of them next acquainted him, that it being necessary to put out of life a lady who had dishonored her family, they had chosen him to perform the office, knowing his professional skill; that he would find her in the adjoining chamber, prepared to submit to her fate; and that he must open her veins with as much expedition as possible; a service for the execution of which. he should receive a liberal recompence.

Ogilvie at first peremptorily refused to commit an act so highly repugnant to his feelings. But, the two ftrangers affured him with folem denunciations of vengeance, that his refusal could only prove fatal to himfelf, without effording the flightest affidance to the object of his compassion; that her doom was irrevocable, and that unless he chose to participate a similar tate, he must submit to execute the office imposed on him. Thus situated and finding all entreaty or remonstrance vain, he entered the room, where he found a Lady of a most interesting figure and appearance apparently in the bloom of youth. She was habited in a loofe undress; and immediately afterwards a female attendant placed before her a large tub filled with warm water in which the immerfed ther legs. Far from opposing any in pediment to the act which she knew he was fent to perform, the Lady affured him of her perfect relignation; entreating him to put the fentence paffed on her into execution, with as little delay as possible. She added, that she was well aware no

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After a fhort conflict with his own mind, perceiving no of extrication or of escape either for the Lady or for himse ing moreover urged to expedite his work by two persons w who, impatient at his reluctance, threatened to exercise viole him, if he procrassinated ; Ogilvie took out his Lancet, ope veins, and bled her to death in a short time. The gentleme ing carefully examined the body, in order to afcertain that ! no more; after expressing their satisfaction, offered him a p Zrchins, as a remuneration, but he declined all recompend requesting to be conveyed from a scene, on which he could flect without horror. With this entreaty they complied, a ing again applied a bandage to his eyes, they led him down t flaircase to the carriage, But it being narrow in descend steps, he contrived to leave on one or both of the walls, unpr by his conductors, the marks of his fingers, which were with blood. After observing precautions similar to those tringing him thither from his own house, he was conducte -and at parting, the two malques charged him, if he val own life never to divulge, and if possible, never to think on transaction. They added, that if he should embrace any m with a view to render it public or to fet on foot an enquiry he should be immolated to their revenge.
