

### RULES AND REGULATIONS

OF

### THE ORPHANS' HOME & FEMALE AID SOCIETY,

#### TORONTO.

I. Every person paying an annual subscription of one pound shall be a Member of the Society, entitled to vote at Members of The Society, the general annual meeting; and every person presenting a donation of five pounds shall be a Life Member.

II. The Society shall, for the present, limit its exertions to affording relief and support to friendless Orphans of all objects of the denominations of the Protestant religion, admitted under the regulations hereafter provided.

III. The government of the Society shall be under the direction of twenty Managers, who shall be chosen annually Direction to e in twenty at the general meeting on the first Tuesday in June in each Managers. year; and who shall assume their duties as soon as possible after their election, and at the first meeting shall appoint from among themselves a first and second Directress, a Treasurer and a Secretary, for the year ensuing.

IV. The Managers shall meet monthly, on the last Tuesday of each month, to direct all things necessary for Managers. the benefit of the Society. At all meetings of the Managers five shall form a quorum for the transaction of any business, except the alteration of or addition to the Rules and Regulations of the Society. No such addition or alteration shall take place unless a proposal to that effect be first made and seconded at one monthly meeting, and discussed and passed at the next, when not less than twelve Managers shall be present. One of the Directresses shall preside at all meetings; and if they are absent, a presiding Directress shall propose all questions, declare the decision, and have the casting vote. On the requisition of any three of the Managers,

the Secretary may call a meeting of the Managers at any time, giving at least twenty-four hours' notice. Some of the Managers, in such order as they may determine, shall visit the house at least three times a week, to order all things necessary; and shall keep a minute book, in which they shall record their observations on the concerns of the house generally, to be held before the monthly meeting. They shall investigate the management of the Matron and the conduct of the inmates, inspect their work, and direct the domestic proceedings of the house. If a manager is by any means precluded from fulfilling the duties of her office, she shall notify the Secretary thereof before the next monthly meeting, in order that a substitute be named for the ensuing month. The Managers shall decide upon the claims of applicants for admission to the house, after a perfect investigation relative to the circumstances and situation of the claimant, and shall enquire respecting those persons who may apply to take any of the children as apprentices; and being satisfied of the respectability and competency of such persons to fulfil the terms of the indenture of apprenticeship shall make the necessary order for apprenticing.

Duties of the Treasurer.

V. The Treasurer shall keep a register of the Subscribers and Donors, and shall receive all monies, and keep an account of the same and of the disbursements; an abstract statement of which shall be presented to the Managers at each of their monthly meetings; and a full statement, with the vouchers of all receipts and disbursements for the year, shall be given to the Managers, to be audited by them, not less than eight days previous to each annual meeting of the Society. The Treasurer shall also inspect and certify the account of the Matron previous to each monthly meeting, and pay no bill without an order of the Manager at such meeting.

Duties of the Secretary.

VI. The Secretary shall keep a list of the Managers, and give them notice of the monthly meetings. She shall commence the business of each meeting of the Managers by reading the minutes of the preceding meeting, and the statement of the Treasurer. In case of the sickness or absence of the Secretary, a Secretary *pro tem.* shall be chosen by the Managers, from among themselves, at such meeting. The Secretary shall keep a record of the childrens' names

and ages, the place of their birth, the religious profession of their parents, and the time and circumstances under which each child enters and leaves the house; and shall, at least once in twelve months, enquire by writing or otherwise into the state of the children apprenticed by the Society, and, should the person who becomes responsible for the superintending care of them neglect to fulfil the promise made, she shall inform the Managers or Treasurer thereof. The Secre. tary shall keep such other books and records as the Managers may require, and conduct the correspondence of the Society. She shall place in the room in which the Managers meet the names of the Managers, with their places of abode, that any person may know to whom to apply respecting the admission or taking away of any of the children. And lastly, she shall prepare an annual report of the proceedings of the Society, to be approved of by the Managers, containing a statement of accounts and management, to be read at the general meeting of the members of the Society to be held on the first Tuesday in June in each year; of which annual meeting she shall cause advertisements to be inserted in the newspapers of Toronto at least three weeks previous to the said first Tuesday in June.

VII. The Matron shall be elected by the Managers at a monthly meeting, who shall decide on the amount of her salary Matron. (unexceptionable certificates having been previously furnished,) and she may be removed without notice, if occasion require. The management of the domestic affairs shall be vested in the Matron, under the supervision of the Managers, who shall provide such other aid as the wants of the House may from time to time require. No relative or friend shall interfere in the management of the children, nor visit them except in the presence of the Matron, nor at any time when such visits are disapproved of by the Managers. A School shall always form part of the establishment, and religious instruction of the Church of England shall be included in the daily education of the School. School hours from 9 to 12 a.m. and from 2 to 5 p.m. There shall be such diet as may be approved of by the Managers or Medical advisers. The hours of rising and retiring shall be at 6 and 9 in summer, and 7 and 8 o'clock in the winter. The Matron shall pass through the dormitories after the hour of retiring and see

that the lights are extinguished and removed. The discipline shall be strictly parental in its character, and the order and decorum of a well regulated family shall be carefully observed. The Matron is to be particular in her attention to the clergy and strangers who visit the House, and she shall not be absent or sleep out of the House without permission from one of the Managers. Upon the representation of the Matron of the failure of duty in any of the persons hired, she shall be at liberty (with the consent of the Managers) to dismiss them from service. All cases of disobedience to the orders of the Matron by the inmates to be represented to the Managers.

Regulations for the ad-mission of Children.

VIII. The objects of the charity shall consist of three classes-1st, Orphans: 2nd, Children without a Father: 3rd, Children without a Mother. Preference shall be made of applicants in the above order. All applications for the admission of children shall be made in writing to the Managers (under cover to the Secretary), and must be approved of by them; and the admission of the different classes shall be according to the priority of the applications. The election of the candidates for admission shall be determined by the Managers at their monthly meetings, and to such an extent as the funds of the Society will admit. Any of the Managers may nevertheless in their direction admit children into the Home in the interim, subject to such approval. Children admitted into the Home shall remain under the care of the Matron for at least one year previous to their being apprenticed, unless circumstances may require this rule to be deviated from.

IX. Children are to be retained in the Home until they are twelve years of age, unless a particularly good situation Regulations for Appren-should offer for a child of an earlier age, when the case may be discretionary with the Managers. The friends of the children are allowed the privilege of procuring situations for them if they can do so on as favorable terms as the Managers. Subscribers to the Society shall always have the preference in the choice of Apprentices. Children on attaining the age of twelve years may be apprenticed to such worthy Protestant families as give satisfactory evidence to the Managers by the certificates of clergymen that they are proper persons to have charge of orphan children.

They may also be apprenticed to any trade, provided the same satisfactory evidence be adduced regarding the character of those to whom they are bound. Each child on leaving shall be furnished with a copy of the Bible and Prayer Book, and be provided with a decent suit of clothes adapted to the season. No child shall be bound to a tavern-keeper or person keeping a boarding-house, and no female child shall be apprenticed to an unmarried man. The conditions of the Indenture of apprenticeship, whether to a family or for the purpose of learning a trade, shall be-to feed and clothe the child in a fit and proper manner, according to the respective situations of the parties, for a term of years-the boys until they attain the age of 21 years, the girls that of 18 years; to bring up the child in the Protestant religion; to instruct the child in reading and writing; to teach and instruct the child in the art or trade of \_\_\_\_\_ [or make perfect in domestic service] after the best manner; to remit to the Treasurer of the Society for the time being, at the expiration of each year from the date of the Indenture of Apprenticeship, the sum of fifteen shillings currency, to be placed in the Saving's Bank for the child's use when the apprenticeship shall terminate-at which period the child shall be provided by the Master with a new good and suitable suit of clothes; and lastly, it shall be particularly covenanted and agreed that a written statement shall be transmitted once a year to the Secretary, of the welfare and condition of the child. Three months after the time of the several annual payments becoming due, if they are not then paid, notice shall be sent to the clergyman who recommended the person as a master, previous to enforcing the discharge of the debt.

X. The yearly subscription shall become due and payable  $_{Yearly}$  Subon the first Tuesday in January in every year; and no per-scription to be paid first son who shall not on or before that day have paid their sub-Tuesday in January. scription for the year commencing and computed from the first Tuesday in June previous, shall be considered a member of the corporation, or be entitled to vote at any general meeting thereof.

XI. An Endowment Fund of this Society shall be estab-Endowment lished, and subscribers thereto of Fifty Pounds in one sum, or donation of land equivalent to that amount, shall be entitled to nominate one orphan to the charity, who shall be

immediately admitted if duly qualified according to the Rules and Regulations. And the said donor, on the death, apprenticeship or removal of the said orphan, may nominate another in place thereof, so that such donor shall always be entitled to have one orphan in the house during the donors' lifetime.

### REPORT.

At the expiration of their year of office, the Managers of the "ORPHANS' HOME AND FEMALE AID SOCIETY" appear before the Corporation to render an account of the manner in which they have discharged the trust reposed in them; and before doing so, they would desire humbly to record their grateful acknowledgments to Him "from whom all good gifts do come" for the success with which their efforts have been blessed, so far exceeding their fondest expectation on the assumption of office. In carrying into effect the objects for which the Orphans' Home was incorporated, the Managers feel more and more convinced of the necessity of a separate institution, such as this, wherein undivided care can be bestowed on the physical, moral, and religious training of its helpless inmates, in most cases admitted in tender years, when just deprived of a parent's watchful care and instruction. To supply as far as may be, such an irreparable loss as this, the idea of founding the Orphans' Home was first broached, and the Managers have endeavoured, as far as in them lay, to carry out this benevolent purpose. Already under its fostering care eighteen orphan children have been sheltered, most of whom, humanly speaking, would have been a prey to ignorance, destitution, and vice, were it not for the interference of this Society ; and when increased accommodation can be obtained by the completion of the "Home" now in course of erection, this shelter will be proportionably extended.

With respect to this latter subject, viz. "The New Home," the Managers have to report that, following up the action taken by their predecessors, as mentioned in last year's report, they at once advertized for tenders and contracted with Messrs. Harper & Wilcocks for the erection of the Home on the block of land so generously given to the charity by the Hon. Robert Baldwin and the Hon. Wm. Cayley, and which the Building Committee have every reason to hope will be ready for the reception of the inmates in August next. Meanwhile the Managers have taken a short renewal of the lease of the present temporary residence, as the previous lease expired last May.

Thus leaving a deficiency of £72 to meet contracts already made, in addition to which there will be required the further sum of at least £200 for the erection of fences, out-offices, &c. &c. These sums, amounting to £272, the Managers feel there will be no difficulty in collecting, as they are sure that when the Institution and its benefits are fully known among the citizens of Toronto, it will meet with universal sympathy and support. In fact, one difficulty, against which the Managers had to contend, was that the inhabitants of Toronto were not aware even of the existence of such an Institution; for, on reviewing the subscription list returned by the Collector, they see a full proof of this, from the absence of the names of many who always are foremost in every good work and labor of love. In order to meet this difficulty, the Managers determined to hold a Public Evening Meeting in the St. Lawrence Hall. Accordingly they announced a Soirie for the 9th of last month; and though the collection of funds was, on that occasion, but a secondary consideration, yet the large sum realized has helped them very materially in meeting their engagements with the Contractors.

The very numerous assemblage met on that occasion, the kindly expressions of warm sympathy for the cause of the orphan, and the several handsome donations since received, inspire the Managers with a will it

In last year's Report mention was made of a grant, by the Provincial Government, of an acre of land in Victoria Square, but, as the final arrangements connected therewith are not yet concluded, the Managers do not deem it advisable to allude further to the matter.

Among the favorable occurrences of the past year is the increased income of the charity. The Managers would call especial attention to the munificent donation of *thirty pounds*, from A. Gillespie, Esq., Billiter Place, London; received through the hands of Lewis Moffatt, Esq. Also they would name the sum of nine pounds ten shillings collected in the Church of the Holy Trinity, in this City, on the 12th of July last, from the assembled Orangemen, after an eloquent and touching sermon from the Rev. Dr. Lett.

The Managers feel that they would be ungrateful did they not here supply an omission in last year's report, by saying how much this Institution, in its first origin and subsequent progress, owes to the unwearied exertions of this Rev. Gentleman, whose watchful care over its welfare has mainly tended to place it in that firm position which it now assumes. Dr. Lett has kindly accepted the office of Chaplain to the "Home."

The special thanks of the Managers and Corporation are due to the Medical Attendant of the "Home." Had Dr. Ogden's services been rewarded by a large remuneration, instead of being gratuitous as they are, his attention could not have been more assiduous; while the general health of the Children bear ample testimony to his professional skill.

The Managers must not omit to mention a very valuable lot of land in Queen Street West, liberally offered to the Institution by Dr. Rees on a contingency which the Managers are assured is likely to occur. This gentleman was among the first, if not the very first suggester of an establishment in Toronto as a refuge for destitute orphans.

Donations in kind continue to be sent in to the Institution, which greatly relieve its funds. The Managers would name Messrs. Armstrong and others from the St. Lawrence Market, and Messrs. Webb & Reeves, the Bakers. The Fuel Association most considerately sent ten cords of wood during the inclemency of last winter; and the Incorporated Church Society of this Diocese has made a very opportune grant of Bibles, Testaments, and Prayer Books.

e kindly in, and anagers In the expenditure of their funds the Managers have endeavoured to use the strictest economy consistent with the health and comfort of those under their charge.

In the month of August the former Matron resigned, and the Managers were fortunate in securing for this important office the services of one who had had experience in a similar institution of long standing in the city of Dublin; and they have every reason to be satisfied with the care and faithfulness with which she has discharged the arduous duties of her responsible situation.

The Managers would conclude their Report in the same spirit in which they commenced it, expressing gratitude to the Father of the fatherless for the measure of good they have been able to effect; but they would also call upon the friends of the Institution to redouble their exertions during the next year; "for," to quote the eloquent words of their solicitor, Mr. Vankoughnet, "the public shculd remember that the Institution must live on their charity and support, and that unless that would be given, all that had been done would be lost, and the orphan would be left to roam about the streets of Toronto as before, unbefriended, unprotected,—a hapless little beggar, whose only resource for a livelihood can be some horrid vice, whose only happiness can be an early death."
