# Briand Now is Head Of French Government

Viviani to Have Position in New Cabinet But Re-organization Likely Not Complete Till Tomorrow — Second Time Since War Began

Paris, Oct. 28.—The Viviani ministry resigned today. Aristide Briand has been asked to form a new cabinet. The following statenent was made by M. Briand:

Premier Viviani took steps to enlarge his cabinet. I am con tinuing them in my turn, but I have no official mandate, since there is no ministerial crisis. Accordingly, the conversations I have had with explain that it is in that sense that my activities must be regarded. Perhaps I may be in a position to say more very soon."

Life in Brussels Unbearable Under New German Military Governor

In this connection a remarkable description is contributed to the Nieue Rotterdamsche Courant by its Brussels correspondent—and the message is all the more extraordinary because it passed the German censorship.

New York, Oct. 28—John D. Rocke-feller's efforts to keep free from trade the West 54-street block from 5th to 6th avenues on which he and his son have their homes, have proved futile, says the New York Sun. Trade has secured a foothold almost opposite the Rockefeller

James, of Paris, an art dealer, has come to New York to open a place. He has secured the residence of Commodore Morton F. Plant at 25 West 54 street for his American branch, under lease for a long term at a rental which William B. May & Co., brokers would not divulge. The Plant house is five stories, 25 feet wide and 100 feet deep. It is on the opposite of the street from the Rockofellers and about 100 feet west of their houses. It will be altered and occupied Dec. 1.

For several years Mr. Rockefeller has been buying every house in the block where trade might get in. Three years ago the first attempt was made when a dressmaker secured a lease on the residence at 81 West 54th street.



## HAVE GERMANS SIEZED STEAMER?

Many Interned Naval Men Have Escaped

SAID TO BE ON ZEALANDIA

A German Trick

New York, Oct. 27—A man in the employ of the United States government expressed the opinion yesterday that the internment of the German converted cruisers Prinz Eitel Friedrich and Kronprinz Wilhelm at Norfolk in March last was a shrewd German trick designed to aid in getting armed vessels at sea for the purpose of capturing or sinking if possible, some of the best passenger or munition ships of the allies.

"The fact that the two cruisers should make the same port at about the same time should have created suspicion in the minds of any live government official," he said. "Two officers, Lieut. Brauer and Surgeon Nolte, and 14 men of the Eitel broke their parole and word of honor last May and escaped to Germany. After this episode it might have been assumed that the United States naval authorities at Norfolk would not be fooled a second and third time.

"The Germans realized that Norfolk was a valuable port at which to intern. They have had a free run of an important section of the United States and have undoubtedly gained a thorough knowledge of that section for possible future emergiencies.

"I think a part of the German scheme was to be in a position to provide crews and officers for steamers that might be secured in Sweden or some other neutral country, and with guns concealed under coal be met near the American coast by officers and men from the interned cruisers. You may yet hear of a surprise attack on a valuable British steamer by these wily Germans on the Atlantic."




