Andrew Bonar Law, one of the most powerful figures in political Europe preceding, during and immediately following the World War, became Prime Minister of England on October 28, 1922, upon the resignation of David Lloyd George—last of the famous war premiers and of the "Big Four" at Versailles to step down from office.

In early youth he was taken to Glasgow where he attended high school and finally became bookkeeper for an iron firm. Later he was made a member of the concern and when he retired from business to enter politics was one of the biggest iron merchants of Scotland. Golf and chess were his favorite recreations.

Nine years before his election to
Parliament he married Miss Annie Pitcairn Robley of Glasgow who died in 1909. Four children were born to them, two sons and two daughters. One daughter, Isabelle, became the bride of General Frederick Sykes in London in 1920. Two sons, Anthony and Lieutenant C. T. Bonar Law were lost

TWO MORE STEAMERS TO USE DRY DOCK PLANT NEXT MONTH

Bay Steamer Empress to Go Grant Hall to Nova Scotia, On Marine Railway-Azov Into Dock.

The auspicious opening of the big St. John dry dock yesterday, when the steamer Kongshavn was placed in the basin for survey of the damage caused by her striking on the southwest ledge of Briar Island, was followed today by the announcement that two more steam vessels will be turned over to the St. John Dry Dock and Shipbuilding Co. for general overshauling and repairs next month.

It was announced that the oil tanker, Azov, owned by the Canadian Independent Oil Co., of St. John, will be placed in dry dock for general overshauling and repairs about Nov. 13 or 15. The C. P. R. have also announced that their bay steamer, Empress, operating between St. John and Digby, will be placed on the marine rallway about November 4 or 5.

The dock, which was flooded for the first time to take the steamer Kongshavn, was pumped out today and it is expected that as uirvey of the damage to the vessel will be started this stenonen. From present estimates it is thought that, should it be decided that the Kongshavn will be repaired there, it will take at least two months to complete the job.

With this work in hand and the prospect of other jobs in the near future, the present outlook for the dry dock is exceedingly bright.


