S.S. "VEDIC" SAILS FROM NEW YORK FOR LIVERPOOL VIA QUEENSTOWN.

With a big list of British and Continental passengers, the new White Star Dominion liner "Vedic" sailed today from Pier 60, New York, bound for Liverpool and calling at Queenstown en route.

The "Vedic," which has been called the democratic ship, it will be remembered, made three voyages to Montreal last summer and has lately been on the Portland-Halifax-Liverpool route of the White Star-Dominion Line, having arrived at Portland on Jan. 27, being diverted later to New York in order to take the place of the White Star liner "Celtic," which is receiving her annual overhaul.

When the "Vedic" was at Montreal last summer she was an innovation in local shipping circles inasmuch as she was built and designed to carry third-class passengers only and was the first steamer to come up the St. Lawrence in this capacity. With broad and extensive promenade decks running the full length of the ship, large and airy staterooms and public rooms, the "Vedic" has proved popular with many people traveling to and from Europe, and the idea of ships carrying third-class passengers only has now been definitely and concretely realized. The "Vedic" will sail from Portland, Me., to Liverpool direct on March 18, and from Halifax on March 19.

RECOMMENDATIONS BY BOARD OF TRADE

The council of the Board of Trade had a somewhat lengthy programme for consideration at its meeting yesterday, when the chair was occupied by M. E. Agar.

The secretary reported that he had been in communication with Hon. A. B. Copp, with regard to the separation of the Intercolonial railway, and that he

had been assured that if any change was brought about in the operation of the Intercolonial branch of the C. N. R. care would be taken to protect the interests of the maritime province ports. The matter of renewal of license numbers was brought to the attention of the council by the Halifax Board of Trade, and it was decided to co-operate with the Halifax board and with other organizations in a protest against any change in the renewal methods, which might result in added costs to the business men.

The council was asked for an expression of opinion with respect to the St. Lawrence inland port plan; it was felt, however, that the subject was a broad one and should receive careful study before any opinion was expressed.

Acknowledgments were received from the minister of railways with regard to more adequate pier terminals for the C. N. R.; from the minister of public works with respect to extension of the breakwater; and from the minister of customs respecting the marking of imported goods act, these matters having been brought to the attention of the respective departmental heads.

The development of the natural resources of the province, to a larger extent than at present, was brought to the attention of the council, and the secretary was authorized to follow the matter up with the mining department and with the research institute of Canada.

The establishment of a national research institute for Canada, which would give consideration to all portions of the

dominion, was favored by the council, and a resolution passed which will be forwarded to Ottawa.

A letter was read from a leading firm in Kingston, Jamaica, expressing pleasure that a delegation from Canada proposed visiting the islands, and stated that a warm welcome would await them.

After some discussion on the matter of harbor control, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, that in the opinion of this council it is most desirable that the port of St. John should be brought under a unified form of federal control, such as is provided for in the harbor commission act of 1919, and it would suggest to His Worship the mayor that he call a conference at an early day of such persons or organizations as might be interested, to give consideration to any amendments of the act that would tend to remove objections thereto and strengthen the position and possibilities of the port, such amendments to be recommended for government acceptance when a common understanding has been reached on the part of all city interests. A progress report was presented by the legislation committee on suggested

changes in the sales tax regulation. The committee was authorized to follow up the matter with other boards of trade.

The secretary was authorized to continue his membership in the American Association of Port Authorities.

ONE CITY'S EXPERIENCE

The newspapers have featured the fact that Canadians now control the Detroit United Railway, a group in Montreal headed by Mr. A. A. Gingras having a voting control of 92,242 shares, compared with 45,429 held by Americans.

The real news, however, is that the Detroit United Railway will probably soon be owned by the city of Detroit. Mayor Couzens has issued an ultimatum to the company giving them till the end of this month to sell out or never hope to get as good an offer in the future.

In a letter to the company he reminds them that for thirty years Detroit has been preparing itself for the municipal ownership and operation of its street railways and that the company has fought the city at every point. In 1918 and again in 1919 the city council entered into contracts with the company for the purchase, but failed to get a 60 per cent. ratification by the people and the mayor declares it to be the conviction of many persons that officials of the company aided in the defeat of the 1919 agreement.

Following the defeat of the 1919 purchase plan by the electors a proposition was submitted to the people for authority to acquire an independent system, and \$15,000,000 in public utility bonds was authorized on April 8, 1920, for that purpose. Your company immediately attacked the validity of the action and sought by a series of vexatious and expensive lawsuits to defeat the entire municipal ownership programme and to enjoin the city from constructing the system or from marketing its bonds.

not been given in the annual report, and dividends had been paid when the financial position did not warrant it. When it came to a discussion of sale to the city, however, the widows and orphans cropped up, as they always do in such cases. Mr. John Butterfield of Ottawa said that many Canadian widows and orphans owned stock, and Mayor Couzens promptly replied that "Detroit widows and orphans had suffered by the conduct of the Detroit United Railway, and that if the city paid a high price for the company's lines, the money would come from the pockets of these poor tax payers."

The whole story is both interesting and enlightening as an illustration of what cities suffer when they give too much power to corporations.

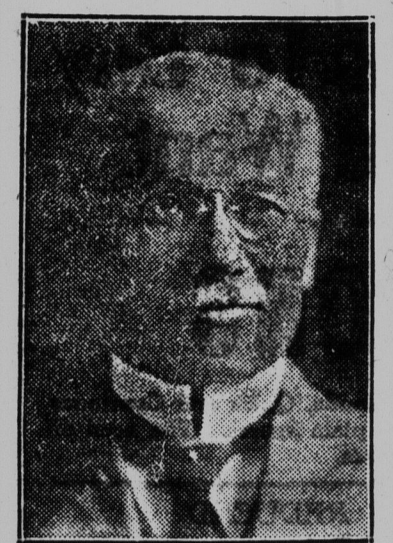

**THE NAVY LEAGUE
AND ITS WORK**

Captain George S. Laing gave an illustrated lecture on the sea before a combined meeting of the Canadian Club and the Navy League to which also the Women's Canadian Club was invited, in the Germain Street Baptist Institute last evening. H. A. Porter, president of the Canadian Club, was chairman of the meeting at which there was present an audience of about seventy people. At the conclusion of his lecture a vote of thanks was moved by Mrs. W. Edmond Raymond, president of the Women's Canadian Club, seconded by R. E. Armstrong, president of the N. B. division of the Navy League, and tendered Captain Laing by the chairman.

In introducing the speaker, Mr. Porter pointed out what an important element in the life of this community and province the sea constituted.

Captain Laing exhibited a series of slides that ranged over a wide variety of nautical subjects from ocean currents to ocean liners. He explained each slide as it was thrown on the screen. In speaking of the fishing operations in connection with a picture of trawlers at work on the banks, Captain Laing declared that Canada's fisheries were the finest in the world and that if Norway or Japan were in possession of such fisheries either country would make ten times as much money out of them as did Canada.

Captain Laing threw on the screen a picture of Admiral Nelson while G. S. Mayes sang "The Death of Nelson." At the conclusion of Captain Laing's address Mr. Armstrong said that one of the purposes of the meeting was to bring before the public the work of the Navy League, which was not alone to assist the navy but to build up a sea spirit and to emphasize what sea power meant. He suggested that Captain Laing incorporate in his lecture the great importance to Canada of the maritime province ports. He pointed out that except through these ports there was no outlet to the sea for upper Canada for several months of the year without going through the United States. He said that customers felt that those in the west needed a better idea of the real importance of these ports of the east to the nation as a whole. Captain Laing said that he would adopt the suggestion thrown out by Mr. Armstrong.

Mr. Armstrong said that the Navy League was doing good work through the Seaman's Institute. Often as many as fifty stranded sailors applied for beds, of which there were only thirty in the building.

The meeting was brought to a close by the singing of the national anthem.

Upland; councillors, Miss Charlotte Elodie, Miss L. Colston, Miss H. Short, Miss S. Collins and Miss Boyer. Heartly votes of thanks were extended to the retiring officers.

The report of the municipal chapter meeting was read by Miss Francis Alward.

The educational secretary, Miss Grace Fleming, reported that a patriotic picture and two flag charts had been purchased for the Prince Edward street kindergarten and prizes had been ordered for the children in Glen Falls school. The Echoes secretary, Miss Bolton, had a very interesting report and said that twenty-seven members subscribed to Echoes.

The treasurer's report presented by Miss H. Short showed total receipts of \$1,097.24, a balance on hand of \$65.99, and expenditures distributed as follows: For relief, given to thirty-five families, \$648.60, and for donations, \$272.92, divided among the different causes, as follows: Biscuit supplied Free Kindergarten, \$30.46; milk, \$27.70; soup kitchen fund, \$10; Boy Scouts' drive, \$10; Salvation Army drive, \$10; war memorial fund, \$100; milk fund, \$80; Grand Manan library, \$8; empty stocking fund, \$10; "Goodfellow" fund, \$15; hot plate to G. Some of the activities along educational lines was also gone into. The report ended with an appeal to renew the British flag, and to boost our city on all occasions.

CONVICT 10,291 AS 'DRUNKS'

Special Sessions Cases in 1923 Double Number in 1920.

Albany, Feb. 10.—More persons were convicted of crime in Courts of Special Sessions and courts of record in 1923 than in 1920, according to the annual report on statistics of crime just submitted to the Legislature by John J. Lyons, Secretary of State. The report showed that convictions last year totaled 55,516, as compared with 40,603 in 1920. In 1920, 2,773 women and girls were found guilty of crime, this total being increased to 2,835 last year.

The report also revealed that convictions for intoxication in Courts of Special Sessions in 1921 nearly doubled those of the previous year, the figures being given as 10,481 in 1921 and 5,287 in 1920. In the same courts last year conviction for misdemeanors totaled 26,791, for petty larceny 4,166 and for third-degree assault 1,651.

NEWMAN BROOK FILL.
The work of filling up the Newman Brook culvert is progressing rapidly. Approximately one-third of the amount of filling in necessary had been completed and that three double and three single teams were engaged in this work, as well as forty men. Twelve teams and between forty and fifty men are still engaged in hauling away the snow which had accumulated along the street car lines. Four single teams are keeping the streets sandal.

LIQUOR THEFT CHARGE.
One witness was called this morning in the case against Leo Hayes, charged with the theft of two cases of Black and White whiskey from Raymond Tobias on Jan. 18. Alexander McDermid, 201 Prince Edward street, testified that he had bought two cases of Black and White from the defendant and another man, known as Stafford, about 14 and paid \$60 to the defendant indirectly for it. He said he returned the liquor to Mr. Tobias. The case was postponed until Tuesday at 10.30 o'clock. E. J. Heeneberry appeared for Hayes.

WHARF REPAIRS.
The work of repairing Nelson wharf and No. 1 wharf, Sand Point, is proceeding rapidly under the direction of Superintendent A. L. Belyea. The work on Nelson wharf is practically completed and work will be commenced shortly along the top of the wharf. At No. 1 wharf on the east side more than 200 piles have been driven so far along the side of the slip and this work will only need a few more to be completed. About thirty-five men have been employed in connection with the work.

ENJOYED SLEIGH DRIVE.
The employees of the Colwell Fuel Co. Ltd., to the number of thirty-three had a most enjoyable sleigh drive last night. Three large sleighs left their office and drove to the home of the manager, J. O'Brien, spoke on behalf of the employees. A POWERFUL SERMON.

Isaac Brindley. The speaker of the evening was Rev. John A. Swetnam, who delivered a powerful message on "Hindrances to a Revival in Our Churches." He pointed out the fact that the many inconsistent church members and the spirit of worldliness in many of the churches today were keeping God's spirit from working. There were two classes of church members in the church today—those who were just inside and those who were living within a stone's throw from the church. The speaker made an appeal to those present to live closer to Christ and not bring reproach upon the church and religion. During the service Mr. Swetnam rendered a solo very effectively.

INVESTIGATING THE SENATOR

The captain and mate of the sunken schooner Boston left on the train last night for Boston, accompanied by J. J. Ready, local representative of the owners of the vessel and also the cargo. Mr. Ready had a consultation with Heber Vroom of Yroom & Arnold in connection with a portion of the insurance on the cargo which the company that Mr. Vroom represents is carrying. Mr. Vroom said this morning that he intends to go to Chance Harbor tomorrow to look into details in connection with the sinking of the schooner.

Reports this morning from Chance Harbor give no change in the situation. The schooner is still in the same position, with her masts showing slightly at low water. No efforts are being made at present to do any further salvage work, and it is not expected that any more steps will be taken until the underwriters have settled the matter of the insurance on the vessel and her cargo of olives. Captain A. J. Malachuk of this city was at Chance Harbor yesterday on behalf of the underwriters. He is expected to return late this afternoon.

THE STEAMERS

Furness Withy & Company, Limited, have been advised that the White-Star liner Arabic will sail from New York on July 1, for a midsummer cruise to Mediterranean ports. The first cruise will take in the ports of Madeira, Cadiz, Gibraltar, Genoa, Naples, Patras, Itea, (for Delphi), Corinth, Phaleron Bay, (for Athens), Constantinople and up the Bosphorus for 25 miles and return, Haifa, Alexandria, Naples and back to New York. The cruise will take sixty days and during that time the total steaming will be 12,182 miles.

TWO SLIGHTLY INJURED IN A CAR ACCIDENT

Tram Leaves the Rails Near King Square and Turns Half About—Operator Says Ice Formation Caused It.

A peculiar accident occurred this morning about 11.45 o'clock at the corner of Sydney street and King square, when a Haymarket square car, No. 72, left the rails and turned around until it was at right angles to the track, with the rear of the car about three feet from the sidewalk. Had it been going faster, several of the bystanders declared, it would have been sure to have overturned, and the results to the passengers might have been serious.

There were no very grave injuries received as a result of the accident, the only casualties reported being a cut wrist sustained by P. W. Downey when his hand was pushed through the glass of the window between the motorman's compartment and the main body of the car, and a shake up reported by Mrs. Thomas Simonds, 74 Brunswick street, who claims her back was injured by the shock. Policeman Dykeman took the report and assured her it would be looked into.

CALL ATTENTION TO OUR PORT

Letter of Deputy Minister of Railways to Board of Trade—The Routing of Traffic.

The board of trade, which has been impressing upon the leaders of the government the importance of a fuller utilization of Canadian ports and of improving the passenger accommodation at St. John, has received a letter from the deputy minister of railways on these subjects. He says that the management of the Canadian National Railways is giving the matter of the improvements in the terminals at St. John very serious consideration, also that they desire to further the interests of Canadian ports as ever possible, and at no time have diverted traffic to foreign ports. He drew attention to the fact that the routing of traffic in the majority of cases is largely beyond the control of the railways, as they have to respect the bill of lading.

The board pointed out that if the solicitors of Canadian railways who are sent out to solicit traffic to impress upon carriers in all parts of the dominion the importance of using Canadian ports at all times for the shipment of their products, much good could be accomplished. It has also been pointed out that it is largely through the eastern ports of Canada that the people of the dominion must look for the development of trade between the West Indies, Mexico, South America, the United Kingdom and other overseas points, hence the need for making these ports as efficient as possible.

SPECIAL TRAIN FROM ST. JOHN TO N. B. SKATING CHAMPIONSHIPS


Over 400 Fans Going from Loyalist City; Moncton Going for Fast Races Over in Good Style.

SITUATION IN IRELAND STILL CONTINUES GRAVE

Time of Release and Whereabouts of Missing in Doubt.

Some Expect Release Today—Constables Ambushed on the Tyrone Border—One Killed.

(Canadian Press Cable) London, Feb. 10.—The situation created by the kidnappings in Ulster continues to bear a grave aspect.

Expect Release Today. London, Feb. 10.—It was reported from Dublin and Belfast this morning that many of the men kidnapped in Ulster would be released today, but none except those who reached their homes yesterday yet known to be free and the whereabouts of the captives is still a mystery.

Constable Killed. Belfast, Feb. 10.—A party of Ulster special constables was ambushed last night by thirty men who opened fire on the police car at Clady, on the Donegal-Tyrone border, which previously had been the scene of several disturbances.

CARDINAL BEGIN HAD ROUGH TRIP

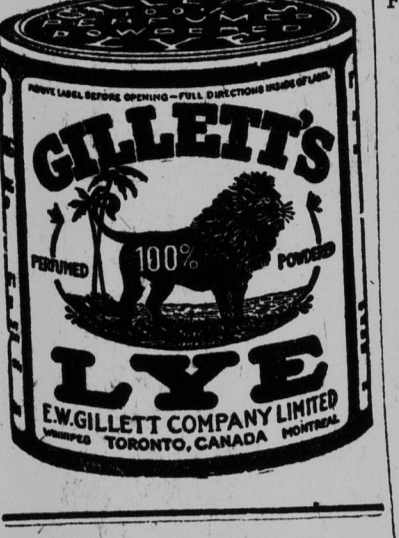

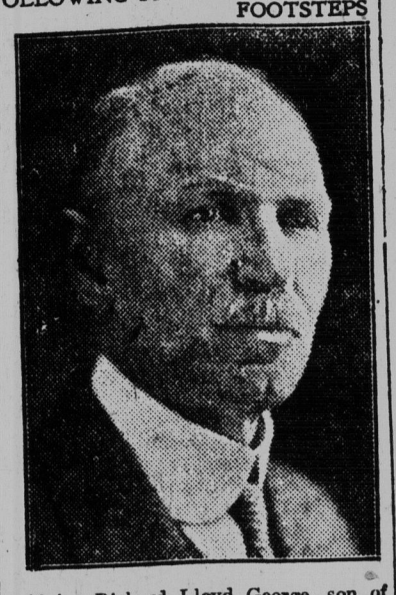


MAJOR TAYLOR HEADS VETERANS

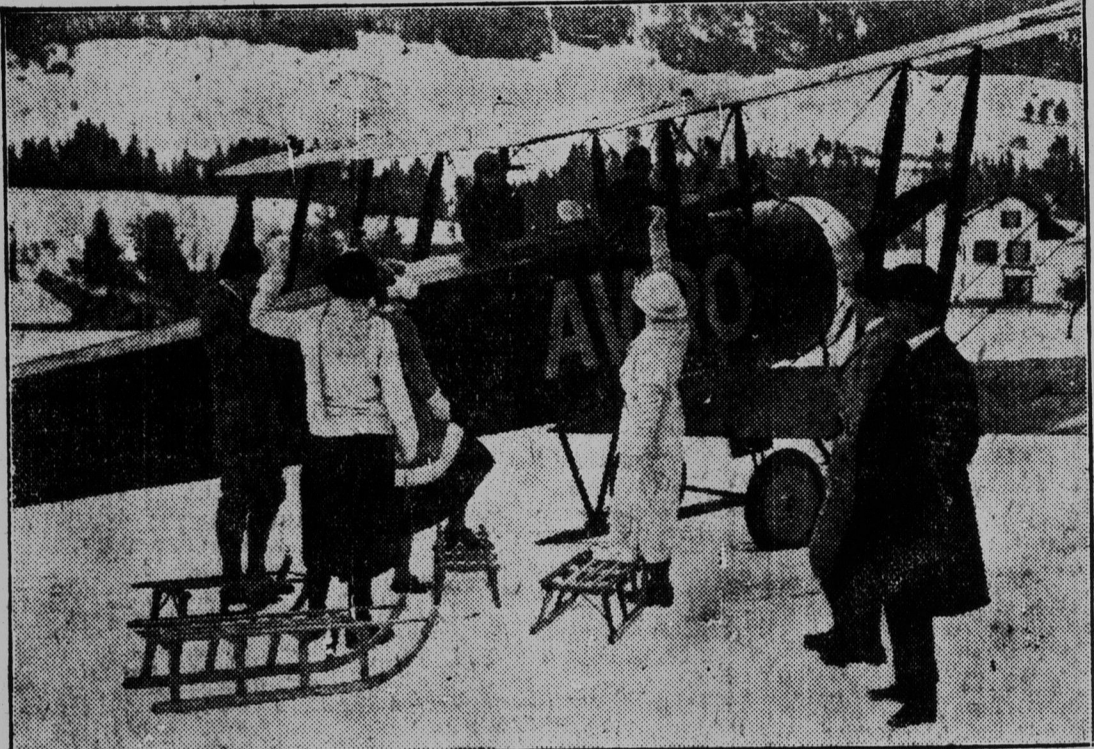

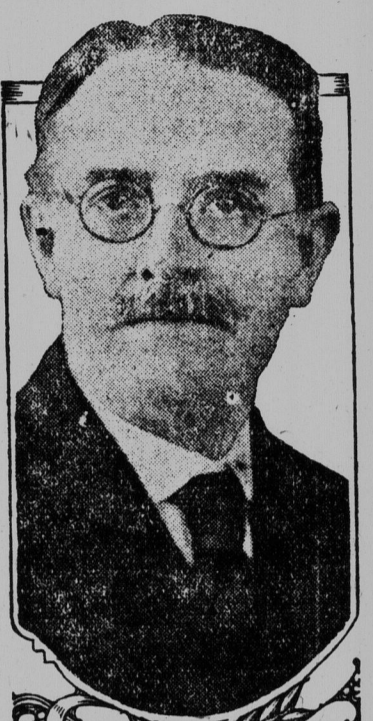
AIRPLANE TRIPS FOR WINTER SPORTS
