# HUGE SLAB OF SILVER ON WAY TO TORONTO

Nothing So Big and Rich Has Come Out of North Country Since the Early Days of Cobalt—Runs Seven Thousand Ounces to Ton in Silver.

Cobalt, Ont., July 27-On Friday morning there was unloaded at the Elk Lake Station a slab of silver from the Miller Lake-O'Brien that filled a wagon. This slab is forty-two inches wide and runs 7,000 ounces to the ton in silver. It runs 7,000 ounces to the ton in silver. It is going to the Royal Museum at Toronto.
