### S. E. Elkin, M. P., on Peace Problems

War's Legacy of Four Big Questions Discussed Before Women's Canadian Club - Review of Club's War Work

The Women's Canadian Club reviewed its tremendous war activities and listened with the keenest of pleasure and interest to a masterly address from Stanley E. Elkin, M.P., at its meeting held in the Germain street Baptist Institute last evening. In clear and concise statements Mr. Elkin reviewed industrial conditions before the war and after in Europe, Canada and the United States.

States.

He referred to the work before the Peace Conference and showed the danger which faces Canadian industry because of President Wilson's attitude to Canadian credit in Europe. He saw no chance of great immigration into Canada or of a big industrial boom, and warned his hearers of the danger of arousing dissatisfaction amongst the returned men by sentimentality. Germany's methods of technically training her industrial men, he said, must be followed in Canada.

In concluding he laid before his audience the four hig problems to be dealt with, namely, that of the deflating currency; of the government control which would deaden individual enterprise; the tendency to distribute raw material not according to price but according to political ends, and therefore cause international jealously and kill the League of Nations; and lastly, the danger of labor unrest and of harboring hopes of a new heaven and a new earth.



ing February 28, totalled \$272,756,984, an increase of \$42,990,356 over the corresponding period last year. With another month's revenue to come, the budget estimate of \$270,000,000 has already been exceeded.

Total—\$194,096,214.

War expenditure for the eleven months was \$276,296,239. In February alone, it was \$31,482,703 as compared with \$19,494,711 in February 1918, the apparent increase being due largely to the passing of overseas accounts for previous expenditures.

### HON. A. K. MacLEAN REPLIES TO CHARGES

BUY WAR STAMPS

Ottawa, March 7—Reply to charges against the civil service commission held the stage during continued debate in the house of commons today on the address. Earlier in the week Mr. Hocken, member for West Toronto, had charged that appointments were made by the civil service commission from friendship rather than from witnesses. He gave certain instances in support of his charges. Today Hon. A. K. MacLean, minister in charge of civil service matters, took up the cases, one by one.

"I believe I have demonstrated beyond controversy," he added, "that in every single instance the statements of Mr. Hocken were absolutely unfounded and cannot be supported by facts."

Mr. MacLean also took the view that it was hardly fair to the civil service commission to make such charges without some effort to substantiate them. Moreover, if Mr. Hocken requested an investigation the government would be glad to accede to the request.

The debate was continued in the evening by Arthur Trahan, of Nicolet, Dr. Thompson, member for the Yukon, and Mr. Turgeon, of Gloucester, New Brunswick. Dr. Thompson suggested the establishment of an aeroplane service for the northland. There should, he said, be a base at Edmonton. 



There were discharged 79 patients, 40 men and 39 women. Of the 79, fifty were counted as recovering and twenty-three improved. Several others were taken out to end their days at home.

There were seventy-nine deaths among the patients, forty-five men and thirty-

At the first of the year eleven patients were absent from the hospital residing with relatives. When the year closed five women were thus on trial, and five men were absent without leave.

With the changes in the population cited, there remained in the wards on the last day of October 626 patients, 387 men and 289 women, one man less and four women more than when the year began; five more men and twenty-one more women than were resident five years ago.

The number of cases under care and treatment during the twelve months totalled 794. In addition the military authorities asked us to take in soldiers belonging to this district who suffered from mental ailments, so that throughout most of the year there were from ten to fifteen such to be looked after. Some of them had seen service in France. Some of them probably would have found their way here even if peace had reigned in the world since 1914.

### TWICE WIDOWED, GETS PENSION SECOND TIME

Precedents Broken in Unique Case of Mrs. Florence Leach

(Toronto Star.) To have lost two soldier husbands chrough death is the strange experience of Mrs. Florence Leach, 391 Shaw street, city, for whom a second widow's pension has just been arranged. Word was received in the city from Ottawa Saturday that, through the efforts of the G. W. V. A., a full widow's pension, with allowance for her one child, had been granted by the Dominion Pension Board. The matter has been under adjustmen since October of last year.

Incidentally her case creates a situation with regard to the final granting of the pension, for which there is no procedent in the Dominion. It is the first time that the Canadian government has ever granted a pension to a soldier's widow after she had re-married. It is also the first time a pension has been awarded to the widow of a soldier who married her husband after he had incurred the disabilities for which he himself was entitled to a pension for the term of his Incidentally her case creates a situa

First Husband Kiffed.

In September, 1914, Mrs. Leach then Miss Florence Barnes, was married to Pte. Harold Goodall, of Blinker street, city, who came from Valcartier for the ceremony. Pte. Goodall was a member of the famous 3rd Battalion, and left Canada in October, 1914, with tnat unit, which formed a part of the first contingent. On the 23rd of April, 1915, at the immortal engagement of St. Julien, he was killed in action. In the due course of time his widow and little child were awarded a pension.

Ars. Leach would probably have remained a widow for the rest of her days had she not met at Muskoka, in 1916, Pte. Alfred E. Leach, formerly of the 23rd Battery, who had returned from the war, classed in the language of his discharge certificate as a "total disability." He had been wounded in France, having his leg broken by a shell, and had contracted tubercular trouble during his service. Leach was a fine young rnan and had been one of the brightest of soldiers. A close friendship sprang up between Mrs. Goodall and the disabled soldier, during the former's visit to Muskoka and on the second of October they were married. It was a case of a young and cheerful woman determined to make life happy for one of the boys who had given of his very best in the defence of his coun-

### Jury Suggests Removal of Teacher and Inquiry Into Punishment Methods

Finds Death of Harold Higgins Due to Cerebro-Spinal Meningitis But Too Much Punishment Administered in This School

Immediate removal of Miss Spencer as a member of the teaching staff of the Alexandra school and the appointment of a commission to investigate the administration of corporal punishment in this school were recommended by the jury in the Higgins inquest last night, although a verdict of death due to

cerebro spinal meningitis was brought in, The assembly hall of the Alexandra school was crowded to its utmost capacity and large numbers of people were not able to gain entrance to hear the final session of the inquest. This inquest has caused more public interest among the citizens of the North End than was at first anticipated, and there have been large crowds of teachers and parents at all the session. The crowd was so large last night that Dr. Kenney warned them to remain as still as possible as there were no girders under the assembly hall and there was danger of it collapsing. J. Starr Tait and J. M. Trueman appeared on behalf of James Higgins, while J. H. A. L. Fairweather and H. A. Powell appeared in the interests of Miss Spencer.

The following verdict was brought in by the jury last evening:
"We find that Harold Higgins came to his death on February 18, 1919, at
his father's residence, from cerebro spinal meningitis. It is the opinion of the jury that too much corporal punishment is administered in this school and we mend the immediate removal of the teacher, Miss Spencer;

"And we further recommend that a commission be appointed to investigate the administration of corporal punishment in this school."

The jury were: Fred McMulkin, foreman, E. Robinson, G. Reynolds, W. Wetmore, R. Dykeman, Blake Ferris and W. Turner.

The first witness last evening was Mrs. Gertrude Belyea, who resides at 39 Kennedy street. Mrs. Belyea said that as she was passing the Higgins house on Monday evening at about 7 o'clock, when she was called in by Harold was slapped, the witness replied that he couldn't remember. When asked by Mr. Fairweather as to the cause of the punishments, the was in the house she saw Harold lying down and went over to him and asked him if he was sick. In reply he just twisted his shoulders. She then asked

When questioned by Mr. Trueman as to whether or not the rod was used now as a form of punishment, Dr. Bridges replied that he hoped that nobody used it. Also when asked if a rod and ruler were not similar, Dr. Bridges replied that they were not, as a rod was round and a ruler was flat. A rod was sure to leave bruises, which a ruler was not likely to unless applied to the knuckles or applied with severity.

Dr. Bridges also said that he considered detention after school the proper method of bringing on a backward pupil.

It was pointed out by Mr. Trueman that according to Miss Robinson's evidence Miss Spencer left the school at 3.30 o'clock on Monday afternoon, and he asked Dr. Bridges if it had not been the better way for her to have kept Harold Higgins in after school.

Dr. Bridges replied by saying that no doubt if Miss Spencer was as old as he was she would have stayed in and helped the child. He also added that it must be remembered that Harold Higgins had been causing Miss Spencer infinite trouble.

Mr. Tait then asked the witness if, taking the bare facts that Higgins did not come in the morning and did not bring his books, that punishing him until his hands and wrists were swollen was not too severe, he replied that he couldn't say unless he saw the punishment. When asked if he thought the punishment would be justified by school law, Dr. Bridges answered: "It was a mistake that a younger teacher might make, and the provocations were great; but I would rather have seen some other form of punishment. When questioned further Dr. Bridges said that he would use the rod as the last resort.

When asked by Mr. Tait if he thought it he act of a wise and judicious parent to punish a child without a chance to explain, Dr. Bridges said that in the majority of cases it would be well to give the child a chance to explain, but under some circumstances it would not be necessary.

H. A. Powell then asked Dr. Bridges if in the case of the boy who is continually wrong would it not seem better to judiciously inflict corporal punishment on him than to thrust him out on society without an education, and replied that it would be better.

### MANY CASUALTIES AMONG CANADIANS IN FIERCE RIOTS

London, March 7-From eight to twenty-seven persons are estimated to have been killed and from twenty-five

have been killed and from twenty-five to seventy-three wounded in rioting during the past three days at the Kimmel military camp at Rhyl, Wales, according to a Liverpool despatch received here tonight. Great property damage was caused, the despatch adds.

According to latest reports from Liverpool the riot was started by about two hundred malcontents. There were 25,000 Canadians in the camp awaiting demobilization and embarkation. The men who caused the trouble were war casualties who had served for three years or more in France. They complained that their embarkation had been postponed while other men who had seen less service were sent home.

After the destruction of stores of all kinds on Tuesday by the discontented men, the situation took a more serious turn on Wednesday when the cavalry was called out but was forbidden to use its arms.

Troops from Chester interposed between the rioters in their march upon Abergale, near Rhyl, and also prevented a threatened raid on the latter place. Five men were killed and forty injured in the course of this fighting, it is reported.
