### WHAT DOES IT MEAN?

The relations of the Borden government with great railway corporations is giving the people of the maritime provinces a good deal of concern. They are asking what is to be the future relation of the Canadian Pacific Railway, for example, to the traffic of these provinces. The government secured as general manager of the Intercolonial Railway Mr. Gattelus, an employee of the Canadian Pacific, who, as the minister of railways put it, was "loaned to the government for two years." Mr. Gattelus was also engaged by the government, along with Mr. Lynch-Staunton, to prepare a partisan report on the National Transcontinental Railway, which report it is alleged was made more partisan at the instigation of a member of the government after it had left their hands. Mr. Gattelus as general manager of the Intercolonial Railway had not only done a good deal to make government control unpopular in these provinces, but he has enabled the Canadian Pacific to get from the government railway specially favorable terms between Halifax and St. John, which had previously under a Liberal government been denied. Local patrons of the Intercolonial were compelled to submit to an increase in freight and passenger rates, and to a curtailment of suburban services; but the Canadian Pacific was enabled to get its traffic hauled between Halifax and St. John at extremely low rates, and what the general public is convinced are not profitable rates for the government railway. The citizens of St. John tried months ago to get a copy of the agreement which Mr. Gattelus made with the C. P. R., but though they were promised a copy of the agreement by Mr. Borden, and also by Mr. Hazen, they have not got it. As soon as parliament met, Hon. Mr. Emmerson brought up the question and tried to get the necessary information. He also has failed, and when he brought the matter up again yesterday in the house, all he got in reply was a statement from Mr. Borden that he would direct Hon. Mr. Cochrane's attention to the matter.

Aside from the manner in which this government has played into the hands of the Canadian Pacific in the maritime provinces, what is the explanation of the course it has pursued in relation to the Grand Trunk Pacific? Why has it materially changed the character of that road, by accepting heavier grades, sharper curves and generally cheapening its construction? Is there a disposition on the part of the government to play the game of the Canadian Pacific in connection with the new Transcontinental? The people are asking these questions. The feeling is steadily growing that corporation influence in this country is attaining too great proportions; and in this matter of railway transportation nothing could be more unfortunate than for the government of the country to play into the hands of the great railway company the people of the maritime provinces should be especially jealous of their rights in this matter. The government railway is their safe-guard. Whatever is done to discredit government ownership strikes directly at the vital interests of the people.

### WHERE'S THE EMERGENCY?

Considerable time has elapsed since we heard from our old friend the naval emergency. Col. the Hon. Sam Hughes and the military estimates have taken the front of the stage, and he is asking for eleven million dollars for general militia purposes, two and one-half million for armaments and the like, and supplementary estimates yet to come. In order to meet all the demands of the war minister and provide Hon. Robert Rogers with the shew of war for his department, as well as to provide the other ministers with sufficient funds to reward the faithful, it may be necessary to forget about that thirty-five million dollars which was to be used to fatten the profits of shipbuilding firms in the old country. At all events the emergency has lately failed to emerge, and the relations between Britain and Germany continue to grow more and more cordial. No doubt our war minister contributed something to this last happy result when he visited Germany last summer. The military advisors of the German government must have been impressed by the warlike mien of Col. Hughes, Col. McLeod and the other colonels who spent that seven thousand dollars for the hire of automobiles to discover the strategic points and familiarize themselves with the earliest approach to Berlin with an army from Canada. Mr. Borden and his naval minister are thrust into the background for the time being by Col. Hughes, and it may be long time before they can get enough life into the emergency to make it present the fearsome appearance of its lusty youth. In the meantime the survey for those concrete wharves at Fredrickton goes on apace, improved mail services are promised the people of York county, and the St. John suburbanite bound for Rethessy is assured that the walking is excellent.

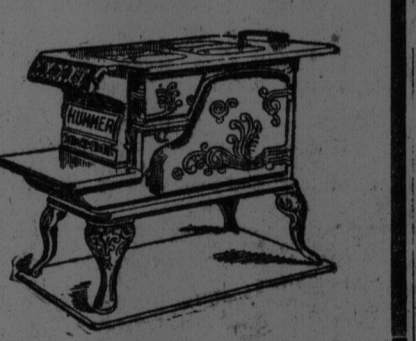

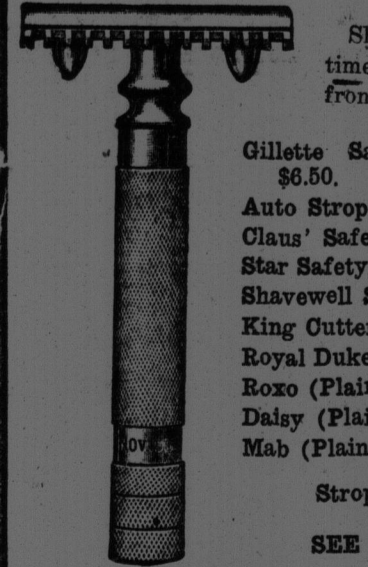

the last of which had been paid ten or more years previous to the termination of the lease referred to.
Sec. 24 repeats the St. John Paving Act of 1907, but confirms all that may have been done under that Act, notwithstanding any defect or imperfection in the procedure for applying the said Act, and brings into operation the provisions in the new act in regard to assessments made under the 1907 act.

Sec. 25 provides for providing any additional obligation being placed on the St. John Railway Co. as regards any existing statute or agreement.
Sec. 26 provides for adding to the value of improvements (buildings, etc.) on land the street paving assessments (apparently not including sidewalk assessments) in cases where the land owner purchases the improvements instead of renewing the lease, but this provision not extending to pavement assessments.

Sec. 27 provides for preventing flow of water on to the street from any building or premises, new or old, by rendering the owners liable to fine or imprisonment in all cases where a sewer at present exists or in future may be created. No time is allowed for making changes.

Laurier Asks For Fair Play

Redistribution Bill Before The House AGAIN ON THURSDAY

Deep Laid Plot Behind N. T. R. Report - Preliminary to Handing Line to C. N. R. or C. P. R.

Ottawa, Feb. 17.—Premier Borden's redistribution bill stands over for a few days. It was presented for second reading at today's sitting of the commons, when a largely attended house heard Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Liberal leader, in an earnest deliverance, almost entirely freed from anything of a contentious character, and which at times drew expressions of approval from both sides of the house, commending the action of the government in following the Liberal precedent of a decade ago, and appealing for the same devotion on the part of the members of both political parties to considerations of equity, justice and fair play.

"Let us here measure so framed," declared Sir Wilfrid, "that we will have through it at the proper time an absolute and most accurate expression of the public mind without any consideration as to who may win or who may lose." The Liberal chief submitted but one criticism. He deprecated any attempt to "play politics" with the province of Prince Edward Island by nominally referring the question of the reduction of the representation of the island province to the committee, when it was recognized that the committee had neither jurisdiction nor discretion in the matter, and urged a frank and honest statement of the conditions as they were.

Sir Wilfrid also submitted the suggestion that the membership of the committee be increased from seven to nine, in order that every part of the dominion might be represented by the minority sitting, replying briefly to some of the points that had been raised, particularly with reference to Prince Edward Island.

He moved the adjournment of the debate to Thursday next. Mr. Borden defended his course in leaving the settlement of Prince Edward Island's representation to the committee. It was desirable, he thought, that the situation in that province should be carefully considered. If there had been any departure from the Confederation compact, as had been charged, it must have been under the regime of the present leader of the opposition.

Replying to E. M. MacDonald's suggestion that the right way to deal with Prince Edward Island would be to secure an amendment to the B. N. A. Act, Mr. Borden said that there were cases where legislation had been passed by this parliament subject to the ratification of the imperial parliament.

With respect to Sir Wilfrid's suggestion that the committee consist of nine members, Mr. Borden said he saw no special reason why it was necessary to have a member from every province. In 1908 there were seven on the committee, but three of the seven were from Ontario and two from Quebec. He thought the smaller the committee the better, but he would be quite willing to confer with the leader of the opposition on the suggestion.

There is much more in the report of Messrs. Gutelius and Lynch-Staunton than appears on the surface. The real and ultimate object in view, according to a shrewd suspicion, which is now being whispered in parliamentary circles, may now be guessed from the above. The shadow of the C. P. R. is beginning to loom large over the whole "scandal" report. If the Grand Trunk Pacific does not take over the National Transcontinental in 1915 on the completion of the road there are two alternatives. The government itself might operate it as an extension of the L. C. R. to Winnipeg, or it might be picked up at a bargain by the C. N. R. on rental terms in connection with the proposition to lease the Intercolonial to the C. N. R. And finally, the grand ultimate object might then transpire. There are persistent and apparently well founded rumors that the C. P. R. has its eye on the whole C. N. R. system with a view to purchase perhaps a couple of years hence when the financial way has been properly paved. The grand coup may be pulled off by the C. P. R. taking over the C. N. R. with the National Transcontinental included at bargain rates two years hence. That would give the C. P. R., with the Grand Trunk as a lesser competitor, a virtual monopoly of the whole railway business of the nation with public ownership finally and effectually killed.

THE WATER WORKS REPORT

Commissioner Wigmore said yesterday, referring to the report of Clarence Goldsmith, water works expert, concerning St. John's system, that he would urge improvements in line with those recommended. He will first recommend that two twenty-four inch mains be brought from the Marsh Bridge to the city, and that the Marsh Bridge be scraped without delay, possibly in March or April.

Commissioner Wigmore aims at raising the distribution system then replacing the laying of a 16-inch main from Union street along Crown to Queen street; from Crown street along Queen to Prince William street; and along Prince William to the Market square and up Chipman hill to Union street. This would make a complete gridiron system for the whole section. Regarding the recommendation for a 36-inch supply line from the Marsh Bridge to Lake Latimer, the commissioner said the expense was too heavy at present and it did not seem immediately necessary.

Those of Sense, Reason and Faith - Sermon by Evangelist McPherson. Last evening Evangelist Lowell C. McPherson preached in the Coburg street Christian Church on "The Religions of Sense, Reason and Faith," (taking II Cor. 5:7 as a text, "For we walk by faith and not by sight." In part Mr. McPherson said:

"All the religions of earth may be analyzed into three—those of the senses, or Paganism; those of reason, or rationalism, and those of faith, or Christianity. The religions of the senses hold their people to creaturely and not faith. Their people even come to making their own gods and their very worship means lust and degradation unparelleled. If natural religion could possibly lift people above materiality into spirituality and progress, it would long ago have done so. Some of the lowest tribes of earth have been, and are, in the environment of nature's most romantic and majestic touch. They know little or nothing of the beginnings of a spiritual civilization, while the people of faith in God must send them to the Gospel to save them.

#### QUEEN HALL WAS OPEN TODAY AS SHELTER

Not Cots Enough Yet But Meals Being Served There

Although sufficient cots have not yet been received for the furnishing of the new shelter of the Salvation Army at Queen Hall, the hall was this morning thrown open for the feeding of the men and two meals will be served each day until the fund of \$225, raised for this purpose is exhausted. Then the army will resume the custom practiced in the old Metropole. Adjutant Cummings said this morning that there was between \$80 and \$85 left in the fund and he thought the army could make this go farther than if the men continued to eat in the restaurant where they have procured their meals since the fire.  
Two meals a day have been served to the men since the Metropole was burned, one in the morning and the other in the evening. The men got breakfast at ten o'clock this morning, but some returned at noon today and asked if dinner was to be served also, how that the army had opened their own quarters.  
Commissioner Rees who has been in ill health for some time is expected to arrive on the delayed Montreal train this afternoon on his way to Halifax to act for the old country on Saturday. While in the city he will have a conference with the army officers on matters pertaining to the army's work here. Colonel Turner, Major Moore and Adjutant Callaghan from headquarters in Toronto are expected to arrive tomorrow to go over the plans for the rebuilding of the metropole.

#### FOUR COMPANIONS HELD

Foreigner Who Cut Throat Will Likely Recover—A Statement Found

Palle Corak, a foreigner, who cut his throat last evening, was reported to be much improved in the hospital today, and will likely recover. He and four other companions had tickets to sail on the Donaldson liner Cassandra, but the injured man's companions have been detained by the police pending inquiry. There has been found a statement made by the injured man in which he admitted that he was about to end his life and a reason was given, but could not be deciphered by an interpreter, as the writing was very poor. A wife and four children are mentioned in the manuscript.

#### REV. MR. EARLE DELEGATE TO CONGRESS IN OTTAWA

At a meeting of the Fairville Brotherhood last evening, Rev. Gilbert Earle was elected official representative to the Social Service Congress to be held in Ottawa, March 4 and 5. This gathering is to be undenominational, and delegates are being sent from labor societies and fraternal organizations, and in fact every branch of effort effecting the public weal.  
It is expected that the number of visitors is to be extended by the mayor of Ottawa and Hon. R. E. Burden. Other distinguished speakers will be the minister of labor, Hon. Mr. Crothers, Hon. W. L. McKenzie King, and Mr. Stedje, a great labor leader of St. George's. During one of the sessions the Duke of Connaught will preside.  
Rev. Mr. Earle was the speaker before the local society last evening on Social Life. He touched on the most important questions now agitating the old land, including home rule for Ireland, and referred to the trend of public opinion as very different from our newer Canadian ideals.  
He also showed very forcibly the old divisions between the Conservative and Liberal parties on temperance, right of franchise, education and relations of church and state.  
Commenting on his trip to England of two years ago, Mr. Earle said that he noticed a great advancement among the people in regard to better conditions, and he believed the present strife and lack of harmony to be merely the birth throes of a happier and more prosperous England.  
The address was listened to with marked attention by the men present, and a hearty vote of thanks was extended to the speaker.  
At the next meeting, F. L. Potts is to address the brotherhood on the single tax, and invitations are being sent to the parish councillors and members of the board of trade.

#### MRS. ROSS GIVES EVIDENCE

More evidence was taken this morning in the case against Robert Ross and Mrs. Buroc. Mrs. Ross told of having been married about eleven years ago by Rev. W. B. McKel in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Fairville. Asked if there were any witnesses, she said: "Oh yes, the church was crowded to the doors." Mrs. Ross said that they went to Sussex after they were married and came to St. John about five years ago and that they had agreed to disagree about two years ago, although for a while after that they lived under the same roof.  
E. S. Ritchie acting for Ross asked Mrs. Ross if she did not wish to get a divorce from her husband, to which she replied that after this she would have good grounds for such action. Mr. Ritchie asked the witness if she had not been "hounding" her husband since they had separated. She said that if her husband had lived right she would not have bothered him. It was also said that Mrs. Ross had gained control of her husband's property some time ago. After her cross examination the witness appeared nervous and could hardly sign her name.  
The magistrate read the act dealing with such cases. The law bearing on this case was found in an old act passed many years ago and had not been repealed at the time of confederation. Under this act each of the defendants is liable to a fine of £100 or two years' imprisonment.  
The application was made for bail for Ross and the hearing was adjourned until this afternoon.

#### NO VOTES FOR SOUTH AFRICA UNION WOMEN

Capetown, Feb. 18—A bill for the enfranchisement of women in the Union of South Africa, which was introduced into the house of assembly today, was negatived on the first reading by the narrow majority of 49 to 42.
