
Shell as many peas as required, and put them in boiling salted water, to which has been added a sprig of mint. Boil the peas for five or ten minutes, according to age, and then drain. Place the peas on a hot vegetable dish with a shake of pepper and a piece of butter.

Ammonia is excellent for cleaning hairbrushes or brushes of any kind. To one quart of water add a teaspoonful of household ammonia. After washing the brush rinse it in clear water, shake and place it on a clean cloth to dry. Borax is equally good for the purpose.
