


## FAMOUS GEMS OF PROSE BARBARISM OF OUR BRITISH ANCESTORS

By William Pitt, Earl of Chathan



Slaves were formally an established article of our exports. Great numbers were exported, like cattle, from the British coast, and were to be seen exposed for sale in the Roman market. The circumstances that furnished the alleged proofs that Africa labors under a natural incapacity for civilization might also have been asserted of ancient and uncivilized Britain. Why might not some Roman senator reasoning upon ed Britain. Why might not some Roman senator, reasoning upon the principles of some honorable members of this house, and pointing to British barbarians, have predicted, with equal boldness, "There is a people that will never rise to civilization! There is a people destined never to be free!" stined never to be free!"


We, sir, have long since emerged from barbarism; we have almost forgotten that we were once barbarians; we are now raised to a situation which exhibits a striking contrast to every circumstance by which a Roman might have characterized us, and by which we now characterize Africa. There is indeed one thing wanting to complete the contract, and to clear us altogether from the imputation of acting even to this hour, as barbarians; for we continue to this hour a barbarous traffic in slaves—we continue it even yet, in spite of all our great and undeniable pretensions to civilization. We were once as obscure among the nations of the earth, as savage in our manners, as these unhappy Africans are at present. But, in the lapse of a long series of years, by a progression slow, and, for a time, almost imperceptible, we have become rich in a variety of acquirements, favored above measure in the gifts of providence, unrivalled in commerce, preeminent in arts, foremost in the pursuits of philosophy and science and established in all the blessings of civil society. From all these blessings we must forever have been shut out, had there been any truth in those principles which some gentlemen have not hesitated to lay down as applicable to the case of Africa. Had those principles been true, we ourselves had languished to this hour in that miserable state of ignorance, brutality and degradation, in which history proves our ancestors, to have been immersed. Had other nations applied to Great Britain the reasoning which some of the senators of this very island now apply to Africa, ages might have passed without our emerging from barbarism; and we, who are enjoying the blessings of British liberty, might, at this hour, have been little superior either in morals; in knowledge; or refinement, to the rude inhabitants of the coast of Guinea. barous traffic in slaves—we continue it even yet, in spite of all our
